MAN SLAIN TRYING TO PROTECT FIANCEE

NEVADA CITY, Calif., Jan. 13.—(AP)—Deputies had few clues in the search today for two masked slayer-bandits who shot and mortally wounded a young miner, fighting to defend his fiancée against assault.

Charles Meyer, 24, died a few hours after his assailants beat him off with a rifle bullet and tossed his body into a ditch, when he sought to protect his sweetheart's honor.

The girl, Gwendolyn Coats, 18, told officers their car became stuck in the mud on a lonely road three miles east of here. The bandits drove up and persuaded her to join them.

Meyer remonstrated, offering them all he had—a dollar. They dragged the girl away, whereupon Meyer set upon them with his fists.

Miss Coats said the highwaymen then fired at Meyer with a rifle and threw him over an embankment. She tried to fight them off with a crank handle but was felled unconscious.

Apparently frightened by approach of another car, they leaped into their own machine and drove off. Meyer died in a hospital.

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

Only one escaped from the wreck of the Southern Pacific railroad's boat.

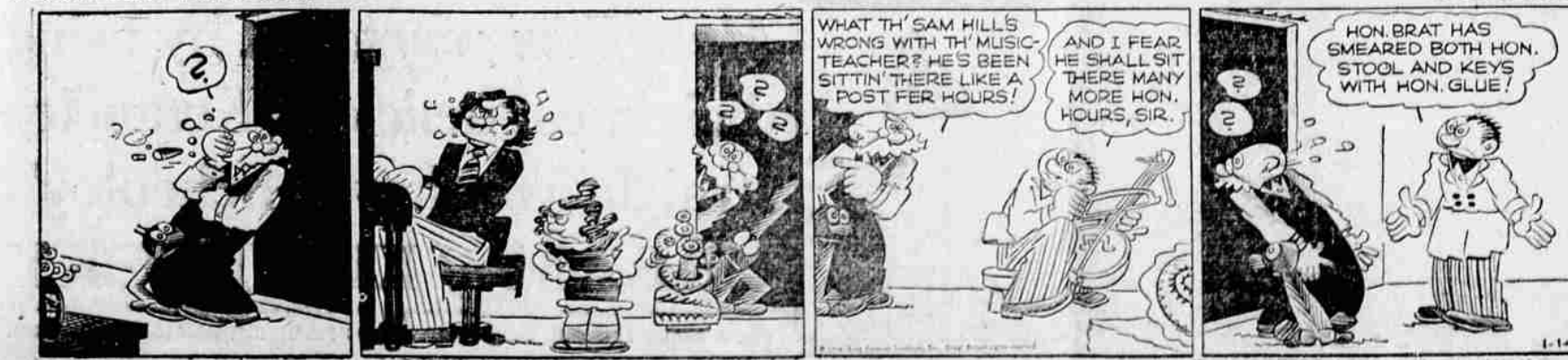
