DIET REGARDED AS SANITY INDICATOR

ELGIN, Ill., Jan. 15.—(AP)—Evidence that what we eat helps decide how sane we are was reported today by psychiatrists of the Elgin state hospital for the insane.

Diets heavy with vitamins A, B1, B2 and D apparently improve the mental equilibrium of dementia praecox victims, experiments showed.

The vitamins, plus iron, were added to the regular hospital diet of 110 male patients in the form of concentrated liver extract, yeast and cod liver oil.

After feeding this diet to one group for a year and comparing the patients' mental health with that of a similar test group not given the diet, Dr. Eugene I. Falstein, Dr. Eva Balken and Dr. Siegfried Maurer reported:

"Comparisons of the results... with respect to gains or losses in average mental age... indicate the superiority of the experimental group... The average gains... are not only appreciably larger for the experimental group, but also statistically highly significant."

Three intelligence tests were given during the experiment. The second test, the psychiatrists reported, showed a mental age gain 10.95 months since the first test for the dieting group. The other group advanced only 2.71 months. Between the first and third tests, of 10.95 months since the first test, the dieters grew 14.15 months old-improved but 2.41 months.

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

SALEM, Jan. 15.—(AP)—The total cost for Salem's school construction program will be \$1,114,460, it was revealed at last night's meeting of the school board. This figure included \$622,610 for a new senior high school building, \$180,107 for added construction at Lewis junior high school and \$127,590 for a new grade school.

SALEM, Jan. 15.—(AP)—James S. Crooks was committed to the state hospital here yesterday following an alleged attempt to pass a worthless \$4,000 check at a local bank. Crooks had formerly been a patient at the institution.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15.—(AP)—A recruiting officer at Spokane told Otto E. Klessig, 19, that his bad teeth probably would keep him out of the navy. Undeterred, Klessig pedaled to Portland on a bicycle with a specially built sprocket and pedals for arm locomotion when the legs are weary and gained enrollment on the eligible list at recruiting headquarters here.

CONDON, Ore., Jan. 15.—(AP)—Gilliam county wheat farmers adopted a resolution expressing extreme disapproval of the retention of processing taxes on wheat collected by millers. They asked that these taxes collected since attacks were instituted against the AAA be turned over to the United States treasury.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15.—(AP)—The Hudson-Duncan and company walnut packers of Port-

land questioned constitutionality of the walnut code in a federal court suit here today. The complaint asked for permanent annulment of the code which Henry A. Wallace, secretary of agriculture, reportedly said was not invalidated by the United States supreme court's death blow to the AAA.

SALEM, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Oregon 1936 automobile license plates sold to date totaled 21,000 more than sold on the corresponding date last year, the secretary of state reported. More than two-thirds of the estimated 300,000 plates for the year, or 206,372 pairs of plates, had already been distributed.

SALEM, Jan. 14.—(AP)—Announcement of the resignation of Dr. Philip Newmyer as a member of the state tuberculosis staff was made here late yesterday. Newmyer had been with the institution for the past 15 years.

LOCAL HOOP TEAMS DATED FOR FRIDAY

Basketball teams of both the senior and junior high schools will see action Friday of this week.

The senior high school team will go to Coquille for a conference game. The Coquille high school, with three lettermen in the lineup, has a strong squad this year, although the quietest has been beaten 21 to 18 at North Bend, where Roseburg won a close game by a narrow margin.

The Indians, however, are anticipating a close and hard battle with the Loggers.

The Junior high Papooses open their season with a game at the junior high gymnasium Friday night, meeting Woodrow Wilson high of Eugene. It will be the first matched game for the respective members of the team, not one of the members of this year's squad ever having appeared before in competitive basketball.

OREGON MINERAL DATA TO BE GIVEN

PORTLAND, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Ormond S. Bean, chairman of the state planning board, said today all available information obtainable on the mineral resources of Oregon will be assembled and made available to the public through a project to be undertaken at once by the planning board.

The board will cooperate with the special mining committee recently appointed by Governor Martin.

Bean said reports and published data on mineral resources will be abstracted so information will show location of deposits, general geologic type, extent of deposits, quality of ore, proven tonnage, prospective tonnage and estimated tonnage. The work will take about six months. Results will be issued in pamphlet form on each of thirteen classifications.

OREGON TOPS WEST IN TRAFFIC SAFETY

SALEM, Jan. 15.—(AP)—The annual report of the state department today revealed that motor vehicle fatalities in Oregon decreased from 313 in 1934 to 259 in 1935.

This was considered an exceptionally good showing by Secretary Earl Snell, considering the increased number of cars on the road, and the fact that gasoline sales for the year increased 9.6 per cent.

Snell declared the 1935 record placed Oregon among the leaders in the nation in safer driving, and was the best showing made by any western state.

MORE WILD LIFE REFUGES PLANNED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Approval of purchase of 23 new wild life refuges embracing 145,622 acres to cost \$856,827 was announced today by the biological survey.

The purchases, to be made by the bureau, were approved by the migratory bird conservation commission. The commission confirmed previous approval of 4 other refuges.

Refuges approved for purchase and the number of acres included: Blitzen Valley, refuge, Oregon, 1,905 acres; Lake Malheur refuge, Oregon, 4,081 acres; Turnbull refuge, Washington, 1,339 acres; Camas refuge, Idaho, 5,535 acres.

NEW PUBLIC MAIL BOX IS INSTALLED

Installation of a large mail collection box was made this week at the entrance to the Medical Arts building. The box is for general use by the public, as well as for special convenience of offices in the building. Postmaster L. L. Wimberly reports. Mail will be collected from the box twice each day and once during the evening.

Helen Hunt, a celebrated poet and miscellaneous writer, who became better known after her marriage, as Helen Hunt Jackson, was born in 1831 and died in 1885. Her most famous book is "Ramona." TEDDY'S GRANDSON FREED OF ASSAULT

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Jan. 13.—(AP) Charges of assault and battery by means of dangerous weapons against Cornelius Van Schaak Roosevelt, 20, grandson of President Theodore Roosevelt, and a college classmate, were not pressed today, District Attorney Warren L. Bishop announced.
