Build Motorcars With Engines at Rear, Urge to Convention of Auto Engineers

DETROIT, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Automotive engineers urged today to put the car before the horse by building motorcars with engines at the rear, at a meeting during which the virtues of front drive cars also were described.

E. L. Johnston, stylist for a maker of rear engine cars, and E. L. Allen, engineer for a producer of front drive machines, each advanced his company's departures from conventional practice as steps toward more efficient design.

Their papers were prepared for delivery before the 31st annual convention of the Society of Automotive Engineers.

"The deficiencies of today's cars are all due, more or less, to lack of a sound basis of design," Johnston said.

"Too much space is wasted upon non-functional elements; ventilation is still far from satisfactory; interiors are impractical—too cramped due to waste of available room," he said.

"Interior should influence exterior, and should not be the result of exterior design," Johnston said, explaining that he worked on the theory the car should be designed "from inside out."

He said that many of the objections he had cited as found in conventional cars had been overcome by application of the principles of "functional" design.

CONTINENT SPANNED BY STATION KRNR

Reports Received Indicate Extent of Broadcasts From Roseburg.

Roseburg's radio station KRNR has spanned the continent, almost from coast to coast, according to a letter received today from Bradford, New York, where the Roseburg station was heard Saturday, January 11, by Albert J. Bartholomew, member of the Newark News Radio club.

Bartholomew heard the KRNR frequency test program conducted between 1 and 6 a. m. Saturday for a check by the Federal Communications commission.

He listed the station's program for verification, and reported good reception, despite considerable static, due to weather conditions in New York at that time.

He gave the Roseburg station a rating of R-6 in volume on a scale from 0 to 10, and a clarity rating of from 2 to 5 as perfect.

A verification report for his DX record is being forwarded to him by J. B. Tolles, manager of the local station.

DX or distance reports from the test made January 11 have been received from California, Washington, Illinois and Ohio.

The test was heard by G. A. Childress of Santa Paula, California, who responded to the request for reports from listeners.

Raymond L. Swenson, 2325 Tenth St., Rockford, Illinois, a member of the Globe Circles DX club, traced in the test program, between 3:43 and 4:01 a. m. Central Standard Time.

"I have heard three other west coast 100-watt stations," he writes, "and I can truthfully say that KRNR was the best of the four."

He rated quality QSA 3-4, and audibility R-4, despite severe static. Don Newcomb at Oxnard, California, logged KRNR from 1:42 to 1:57 a. m. "Volume was extremely good and no fading," she reports.

Another DX report was received from Buck Hedrick, 131 East 63rd St., Seattle, Washington.

David F. Thomas, Proctorville, Ohio, reports: "Your program was heard but severe static interfered." He gave a rating of R-6 on volume, with quality QSA 2, due to static.

Stanley Botts, Box 286, Orange, California, reports hearing the station for the first time. "Your signal was good—R-7," he writes.

Don Martin, 1469 26th Ave., San Francisco, writes: "Your signals were exceptionally good for a 100-watt station. Your modulation sounded good, quality excellent and signals were R-9 plus."

SNOW FALLING IN SOUTHERN OREGON

CONFIDENCE VOTE EXTENDED TO LAVAL

PARIS, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Premier Laval of France was granted a vote of confidence, 315 to 257, by his chamber of deputies today.

Thus the astute premier again triumphed over leftist efforts to unseat his government.

Today's showdown was precipitated by members of the dominant radical-socialist party, who voted in caucus a condemnation of M. Laval's policies.

Previously, only the inability of the radical-socialists to agree among themselves had saved the cabinet from collapse before the chamber convened.
