

NEW GRAPE START SYSTEM IS FOUND

A new method of starting grape cuttings in clay loam or other heavy soil has been used successfully by Dr. W. P. Duruz, professor of pomology of the Oregon experiment station, on an experimental grape planting at Oregon State college. Ordinarily it is impractical to plant the calloused grape cuttings directly into such soil as is common in many parts of Oregon.

In this planting, a crow bar was used to make holes where the grapes were to be set and the calloused cutting was held in the center of this hole while ordinary sand was sifted directly around it. By having the sand instead of clay next to the cutting, much better rooting took place because of drainage and aeration supplied by the sand. Almost a 100 per cent stand was obtained by this method.

The whole process of propagating grapes has just been described by Dr. Duruz in a mimeographed circular issued by the O. S. C. experiment station. Dr. Duruz says that probably no other fruit is more easily grown than the grape and that it can be readily propagated, requires little space, and can be used as an ornamental as well as a fruit bearing vine. A previous circular written by Dr. Duruz describes grapes varieties and their adaptability to Oregon conditions.

DR. HUNTER TO AID IN EDUCATION PLAN

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 15.—(AP)—Dr. Frederick Maurice Hunter, chancellor of the Oregon system of higher education, has been appointed a member of the policies commission of the National Education association, it was announced here. He will be one of a group of nationally-known educators who will work out a five-year educational plan for the nation. Dr. Hunter has left for Chicago to attend the organization meeting of the commission. A grant of \$250,000 by an educational foundation will cover the expenses of the work.

STORAGE DAMS IN POLK PROJECTED

DALLAS—That Polk county agriculture would be benefitted by storage dams placed on the headwaters of several rivers of the county is the opinion of the soils and drainage committee which is preparing a report on this subject to be presented at the county farm outlook conference January 16 and 17. Storage dams on both forks of the Luckiamute, the La Creole, Mill Creek and South Yamhill would aid in flood control as well as furnishing a summer water supply, members of the committee believe.

CROPPING SYSTEM BEING WORKED OUT

EUGENE—County Agent O. S. Fletcher recently assisted S. J. Sullivan, a newcomer from California, in working out a cropping system for the 100-acre farm he has purchased near Cottage Grove. Reports of the forthcoming county farm outlook conference are expected to aid newcomers as well as present farmers in planning the most profitable systems for their conditions.

COMMONWEALTH CONFERENCE DATED

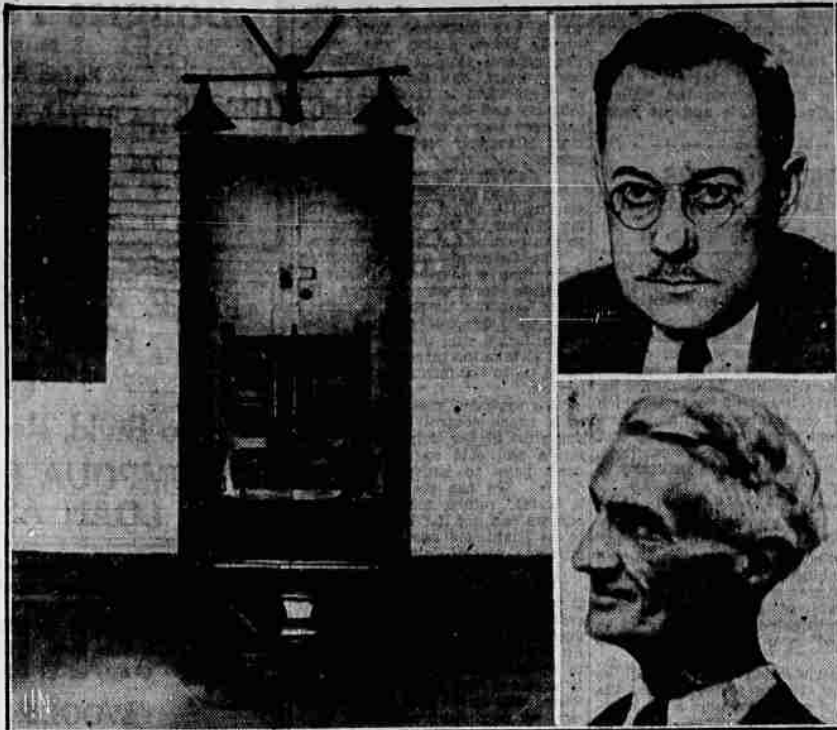

Draft U. S. "Peace Insurance"

A revised neutrality law designed to make the resolution of the last Congress ironclad, is being advocated by National Peace Conference, of which Dr. Walter W. Home Control of Destructive Moths Possible, but Attended by Difficulty

Prevention of moth damage and extermination of these pests once they have gotten into clothing and furniture is one of the most troublesome home management problems the modern housewife has to contend with, believes Mrs. Azalea Sager, extension specialist in clothing and textiles at Oregon State college. Nevertheless, such prevention and control do not require the installation of expensive equipment, she says.

Both paradichlorobenzene and naphthalene flakes or crystals will actually kill moths and their larvae, Mrs. Sager says. These materials can be bought at a drug store, either under these or various trade names. One pound of these crystals is sufficient for a trunk or small closet, but two pounds are required for a large closet.

After these crystals have been scattered over and through the articles being treated, the clothes container must be made airtight immediately, Mrs. Sager says. Trunk lids can be sealed, closet doors stuffed with paper, and furniture covered with blankets, heavy paper or canvas large enough to

be weighted to the floor. The crystals that kills the moths, but the gas has no effect unless confined in a small space. This condition must exist for at least three days, and moderately warm temperatures are best.

If an upholstered davenport, for instance, is found moth eaten or with moth deposits on it, it is best to remove it to one corner of an unused room. Then fasten butcher's paper or wrapping paper together with gummed tape or paste to make a piece large enough to cover the davenport entirely. Turn the davenport on its side and apply the crystals. Cover with the paper, fastening it down to the floor with gummed tape. It is best, if possible, to keep the room moderately warm to facilitate formation of the gas. The unpleasant odor makes it practically impossible for anyone to remain in the room.

It is important to see that eggs and moths in garments to be used again be destroyed before the garment touches any other article in the house, while those too badly damaged for further use are best burned immediately, Mrs. Sager points out.

LANDON URGES ALL TO BACK HIGH COURT

TOPEKA, Kas., Jan. 12.—(AP)—Gov. Alf M. Landon has called on Kansas farmers to accept the supreme court invalidation of the AAA in the spirit of good sportsmanship and to work for constitutional means "by which the balance in our national economic life may be restored."

The governor, in his first public utterance on the farm problem since he has been mentioned as a possible republican presidential nominee, told the 65th annual meeting of the state board of agriculture last night "if the time should ever come when the citizens of this country should repudiate the acts of the supreme court, the very foundation of our social and economic welfare will disappear."

"The vital thing for all of us — farmers, laborers, industrialists and all the rest — is that we have an absolutely stable government for the protection of us all," he said. "That is impossible unless all of us support the constitution and the judiciary by which the constitution is interpreted."

"The situation today emphasizes the urgent need for a sound national land use policy," he continued. "Our soil must not be exhausted by wasteful methods. The farmer is entitled to expect for his crops a fair price comparable to prices of other commodities. A policy that places less emphasis on immediate cash returns, re-builds the fertility of the soil, and meets the problems of flood control and soil conservation is impressed with national interest."

NEW SEED INDUSTRY BEING DEVELOPED

LA GRANDE — Expansion of small seed production, principally Ladak and Grimm alfalfa and crested wheat grass grown in rows, has resulted in a crop worth more than \$28,000 and the beginning of a new industry in Union county, reports County Agent H. Avery. Alfalfa seed yields in 1935 ranged from 100 to 300 pounds per acre and created wheat grass from 100 to more than 500 pounds. Gross returns per acre are expected to run from \$40 to \$50 for Ladak, from \$50 to \$60 for Grimm, and \$50 to \$70 for crested wheat grass.
