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GONG AWAITED BY LOUIS AND RETZLAFF

Bomber Plans Quick Kayo, But Opponent Claims He Has Winning Punch.

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Arrangements were completed today for a radio broadcast of the heavyweight fight in Chicago Friday night between Joe Louis and Charley Retzlaff. The blow by blow description will start over WJZ-NBC at 11 o'clock, eastern standard time.

CHICAGO, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Joe Louis sat around today waiting for the call to action, while his foe of tomorrow night in the Chicago stadium, Charley Retzlaff, sat and listened to a familiar refrain.

It goes something like this: "The first guy who goes right out there and slugs with Louis will beat him."

Whether there is anything to the advice remains to be determined. The refrain was sung to Primo Carnera, King Levinsky, Max Baer and Paulino Uscudun. They either forgot all about it upon taking a look at the Brown Bomber's dead pan or didn't take much stock for some reason or other.

Retzlaff's advisers sought to convince the North Dakota farmer that his only chance with Louis lay in making a fight of it. He, like Louis, was finished today with the physical part of training for the 15-round engagement, but the campaign to get Retzlaff steamed up and keep him that way was to last until fight time.

Both fighters had made the customary pre-battle statements.

"I am ready for Retzlaff," Louis said. "I will be in there to give my best. The quicker I score a knockout the better I'll like it. What's the use of foolin' I want to get it over as fast as I can."

"They can pick Louis to win," the North Dakota said, "but I'll show them that he can be hit and hurt. Down in my heart I know I have what can beat him—a right to the jaw."

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 16.—(AP)—President W. C. Tuttle sent the directors of the Pacific Coast Baseball league home today with a forecast of prosperity and an amended constitution to curb mass introduction of "sand lot" players.

A new provision was approved that stipulates each club must keep 15 class AA players or better on the reserve list throughout the year.

The penalty for violation may be forfeiture of the franchise, if voted by three fourths of the directors.

Tuttle announced he would sign young athletes to replace four veteran umpires of last season who received unconditional releases. The four are: Perle Casey, Paul Genshler, Henry Fanning and Bill Kelly.

The acquisition of Lindstrom may mean that Jersey Joe Stripp, the useful veteran who has been holding down third base for the Dodgers, is on his way out.

In the infield or outfield, however, Freddy is expected to be a big help to the club. Despite his lower batting average last season, he is regarded as a more dependable hitter than Stripp and due for a comeback this year.

Although just about as useful as an outfielder, Lindy seems slated for third.

NOTED CHURCHMAN PASSES ON AT 75

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., Jan. 16.—(AP)—Dr. G. A. Brandelle, 75, president emeritus of the Evangelical Lutheran Augustana synod, and nationally known churchman died in a hospital today of pneumonia.

Dr. Brandelle served as president of the synod from 1918 to June, 1935, when he was retired. He was a former president of the National Council of Lutheran Churches of the United States and was honored by Arch Bishop Nathan Soderblom of Sweden who awarded him the bishop's cross. He was succeeded as president of the Augustana synod by the Rev. P. O. Bersell of Ottumwa, Ia.

Dr. Brandelle, last fall as the synod's president emeritus, attended the Lutheran world convention in Paris. He was a staunch prohibition advocate.

Dr. Brandelle was born March 19, 1861, in Andover, Ill., and graduated from Augustana college and theological seminary in 1884. He was ordained the same year and received his doctor's degree from Bethany college, Lindeborg, Kans., in 1900.

From 1884 to 1918, he was pastor of the Augustana Lutheran church in Denver, Colo.

His widow and two daughters survive.

EY-GOV.-GENERAL OF AUSTRALIA DIES

LONDON, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Baron Forster of Lepe, 63, former governor-general of Australia, died here yesterday.

Newspapers paid tribute to him today as a "typical English gentleman"—cricketer, politician, overseas governor and yachtsman. He was elected to parliament at the age of 25.

Lord Forster's appointment in June, 1929, as governor-general and commander-in-chief of the Commonwealth of Australia, which carried an annual salary of 10,000 pounds, was a popular one.

PAL SHOOTING CASE APPROACHING JURY

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 16.—(AP)—Final arguments were completed in the alleged pal shooting trial of James J. Cronin, and Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon prepared today to instruct the jury of 11 men and a woman.

The state charged that Cronin left his lost hunting companion, Claud Hults, in a windfall pit on the snow-covered sides of Blain mountain last November and then returned and shot him through the head, blasting away his remaining good eye.

The state contended in its final arguments that no one else had been there and the wound could not possibly have been self-inflicted.

Cronin testified that he left Hults in a despondent mood and did not return. Cronin made his way out of the snowy woods and advised searchers, who found Hults near death.

INDICTMENTS FOR GAMBLING COMING

SALEM, Jan. 16.—(AP)—The Marion county grand jury will resume its investigation of county gambling conditions next Monday, Ralph Moody, assistant attorney general, announced today.

Moody, acting as special prosecutor for the gambling probe, said the jury would wind up its work within a week. He indicated several indictments would be returned.
