HOOVER TO ANSWER F. D. R. IN PORTLAND

LINCOLN, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover announced today his next public address will bear the same title as President Roosevelt's recent message to congress on "The State of the Union." It will be delivered at Portland, Ore., February 12.

He smiled as he uttered the words "the state of the union." It was this speech by Mr. Roosevelt that Mr. Hoover recently said might have been entitled "war on earth and ill will among men."

He said he received a "world of commendatory telegrams from all parts of the nation concerning his speech here last night on "Agriculture and the New Deal."

Although disappointed because it was necessary for radio men to cut him off the air before he completed his speech last night, Hoover said "radio officials (CBS) were very kind to me. It was entirely my fault that I ran over."

KIPLING NOW IN COMATOSE STATE

LONDON, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Rudyard Kipling's gallant fight kept the spark of life still flickering today, but attaches at the hospital where he lay in a coma said the end apparently was a matter of hours.

A hospital bulletin said the 70-year old bard's condition was "unchanged and still very critical."

It was disclosed a blood transfusion had been given Kipling last night and oxygen also had been used.

Kipling lapsed into a coma while his American-born wife, daughter and surgeon kept watch at his bedside.

SNOW PLOWS BUSY IN KLAMATH AREA

BEND, Ore., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Below freezing temperatures prevailed here early today and there was a trace of snow on the ground. Motorists arriving from Klamath Falls reported driving between walls of snow so deep that trees bordering the Dallas-California highway were scarcely visible.

One-way traffic maintained in places, while snow plows snorted along the Sun mountain highway pass.

New snow rendered roads icy. A truck driven by Ray and Roy Hild of Yakima, Wash., skidded from the highway north of Madras and caught fire. No one was injured.

ROOSEVELT GOING TO TEDDY MEMORIAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—(AP)—President Roosevelt will leave the white house tomorrow morning for New York City, where he will participate in the dedication on Sunday afternoon of a Theodore Roosevelt memorial at the Natural History museum.

Saturday night Mr. Roosevelt will talk over the radio to committees organizing for the annual birthday balls for the benefit of funds to fight infantile paralysis.

Patrolman Eugene W. Reed of the state police arrived in Roseburg last night from Portland to replace Officer Tom Sheridan, who was transferred to Portland after several years of service out of the local state police office. Reed is entering immediately upon his duties here.

REPORTER TAKING 'RAP' FOR CONTEMPT

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—(AP)—Martin Mooney, a reporter who refused to reveal sources of information used in a series of articles on racketeering, today began serving 30 days in county jail, the sentence received for contempt of court. In addition Mooney was fined \$250.

Mooney, who was employed by the New York American, was committed by Judge Otto A. Rosalsky. In refusing to reveal his sources of information Mooney pleaded

professional privilege when called before the grand jury. Judge Koenig found him in contempt of court.
