SELASSIE REPORTED FACING REBELLION

Malcontents Said Holding Many Towns; Italians Claim Big Victory.

Reports that a serious rebellion against Emperor Haile Selassie had broken out in the rich Gofja province of northwestern Ethiopia reached Djibouti, French Somaliland, today from what was described as a reliable source in Addis Ababa.

The reports said that occasional battles had taken place and that the rebels were still holding many towns although a loyal army had entered the provincial capital Debra Markos, during the past week.

Rome hailed reports of victory from the southern Ethiopian front today in a communique which said the fascist invaders had advanced 125 miles northward in a week-long running battle.

The high command, on the basis of a report relayed through the northern headquarters, raised its estimate of Ethiopian casualties to 3,000 to 5,000. The official statement did not mention Italian losses.

The Ethiopian government termed "utterly fantastic" the Italian claims of 4,000 defenders' casualties and said the territory through which the invaders had advanced was only lightly held.

In addition to claims of Ethiopian casualties, the official communique at Rome reported 3,000 more had been taken prisoner.

League to Try Again In Europe diplomats turned toward Geneva where the council of the league of nations meets Monday to consider the question of war settlement.

British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden left London pledging constituents in his Warwick dis-

trict to continue leadership in ending league measures for peace. "Aggression ought not to be allowed to succeed," he said, "and the leaders of the league, acting together, would do so wrong and useless work as they are sure to bring home to any aggressor that peace is the only successful way of removing discontent."

Official sources, recently asked as Geneva, represented Premier Mussolini as "receptive" to any peace proposals. They expressed belief the council would call attention to such measures rather than imposition of new sanctions.

Pierre Laval left behind him to raise the question of a political situation, although neither regular cabinet member was expected to give his resignation as a matter of state until the emperor's return.

DEATH OF KIRLING ENDS NOTED CAKEER

assaults on the hallowed heights of Olympus.

Ties America Born December 20, 1905, in Bombay, India, Kirling, after completing his education in England, returned to his native land and for seven years was an independent sub-editor on papers at Lahore and Allahabad, gaining fame in the country by writing on the side army ballads and tales of British life in India. Then he pulled up stakes and tried America.

He landed in San Francisco in 1933 and for the next two years made his way slowly across the continent, trying to find a place on American newspapers. He later said he always was equipped with a chance to state his qualifications. In 1931 he sailed for England and almost starved in a London garret until he found a publisher for a new edition of "Plain Tales From the Hills." It and his trunkful of India pamphlets, books and poems sold like hot cakes.

Money permitted him to indulge the wanderlust that had driven

him from India and in 1932 he roamed Ceylon, Australia and the United States.

His Home in Vermont In New York he hooked up with Walter Bales, a young New York author, with whom he had shared chambers on the Thames Embankment and fell in love with Bales' sister, Caroline.

They were married, and after a wedding trip in Japan, Kirling and his wife, settled in Brattleboro, Vt., where he wrote more than 20 volumes.

There his two children were born, and seemingly he was destined to make his permanent home in America. But too lavish attention from autograph seekers sent him fleeing in 1937 to the peaceful solitude of the Sussex downs.

In England great bitterness came to him, for his son, Lieut. John Kirling, only 18, was killed in the World War battle at Loos. The sorrowing father endowed a perpetual fund for sounding at Loos "first post," the British equivalent of "lapse," and he never forgave the Germans.

In August, 1935, he drew wrath from official Nazi newspapers which described him as a "fanatic hater of Germans and one of the bitterest enemies of Germany." The outburst resulted from a letter Kirling had written to Henry Bordeaux, French novelist, saying:

"The Roche has learned nothing from the last war, and he has suffered comparatively little from it."

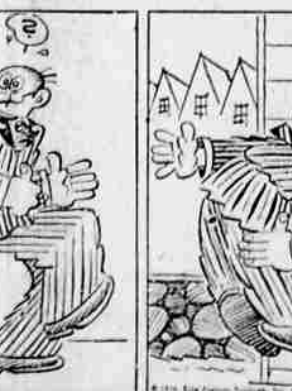

The fashion world's most painful criticism was aimed at American women today in the assertion of a style designer that the clothes they wear "all look alike."

American women fail to strive for originality, said Miss Ruth Hutton, who has spent 12 years in France and the United States as a fashion designer and illustrator. "The French woman," she said, "would rather have one beautiful gown made especially for herself than to have several cheaper ones such as the American woman prefers."

"A store cashier or clerk in France spends her spare time putting minute stitches on seams or embroidery in the most delicate lingerie, which, as a rule, she wears herself."

"The average American working girl spends her lunch hour hunting bargains, regardless of how they look or fit."

American girls, she said, get a thrill from wearing dressier clothes from those worn by movie stars, and look alike because they have a horror of looking different.

The stylist predicted the next trend in skirts will be "the long-in-back and short-in-front type, bringing us to the end of a complete cycle."
