Visits in Eugene—Gordon Stewart, of the Consolidated Truck Lines business office in this city, spent the week-end in Eugene visiting friends on the University campus.

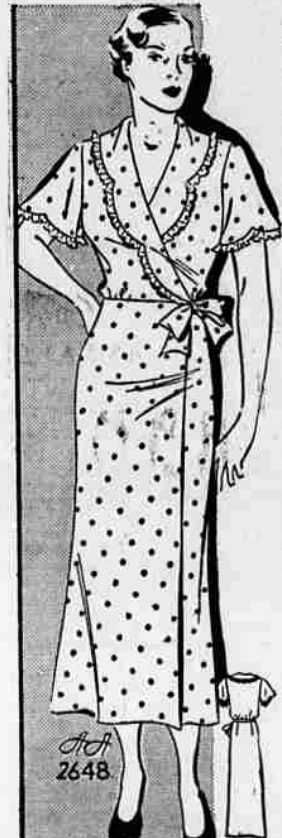

NO DAMAGE DONE AS FLUE BURNS OUT

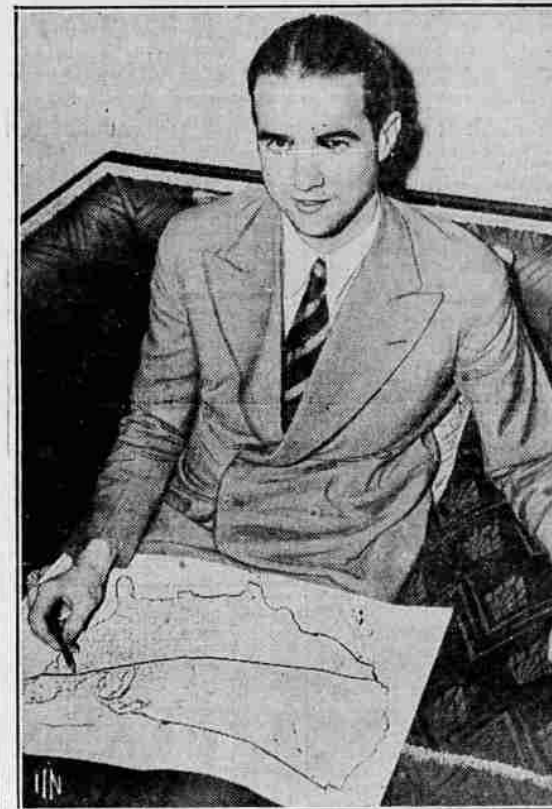
The fire department was called to the George Kohlhaugen home 232 S. Jackson street this morning as a result of a flue fire. The blaze caused no damage.

NEW REPRIEVES FOR BRUNO PREDICTED

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The New York Sun said today that despite Gov. Harold G. Hoffman's announcement of no additional reprieves for Bruno Richard Hauptmann, the New Jersey chief executive was "freely predicted" in Trenton as planning two more stays of execution for the convicted slayer of the Lindbergh child. A "high official," otherwise unidentified, was quoted as saying the governor "has no intention of allowing Hauptmann to be put to death until a thorough study has been made of several hundred depositions and affidavits" pertaining to the case.

AUTO BLOW KILLS VANCOUVER WOMAN

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 20.—(AP)—Mrs. Mary Scherrer, 60, was killed Saturday night when struck by an automobile as she walked across the street in front of her home. Joe Frohs of Orchards, the driver, was not held. Mrs. Scherrer was dressed in dark clothing and Frohs said he had no chance to stop on the wet highway when he saw her dimly in the darkness.

U. S. CONTRACTS FOR 114 BOMBER PLANES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The navy department announced today the award of a contract to the Douglas Aircraft company of Santa Monica, Calif., for the purchase of 114 new torpedo-bomber planes at a cost of \$3,536,000. The new combat ships are intended for service with the navy's aircraft carriers.

RECIPES

RAISIN DELIGHT By LAVELLE WALKER Part 1 cake: 1 cup brown sugar 1 T. butter 1 1/2 cups raisins 1/2 t. vanilla 4 cups boiling water. Mix all and cook till a medium syrup.

Part 2: 1 T. butter 1/2 cup white sugar 3 t. baking powder 1 cup sweet milk Flour to make drop batter. Drop batter from spoon into greased pan, pour part one over it and bake until thick. Any other fruit may be used in place of the raisins if desired.
