Lovely Legs 'n' Everything Required to Have Lovely Eyes, Color Expert Says

Associated Press Staff Writer. NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—(AP)—Women must have lovely legs to have lovely eyes, Henry Waxman, the color photographer, said cryptically today.

"One must be all beautiful," he said. "You start at the feet and work up."

"If the legs are beautiful, if the torso is beautiful, if the face is beautiful, then eyes must be beautiful."

It is simply that Waxman regards feminine beauty as a composite whole.

Waxman, famous for the color composition of his photographs, was looking at lovely Betty Lomax, petite brunette model from Dallas, Tex., as he spoke.

He has just started work on a series of photographs of what he considers the 15 most beautiful eyes in the world.

"Betty," he said, "is tops for brown eyes."

The search for lovely eyes started prosaically enough with a manufacturer of counterfeit eyes in a mid-western city.

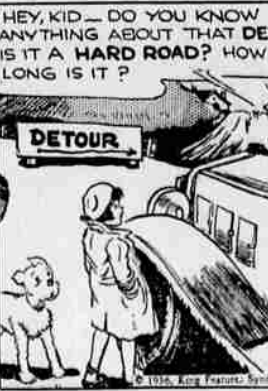

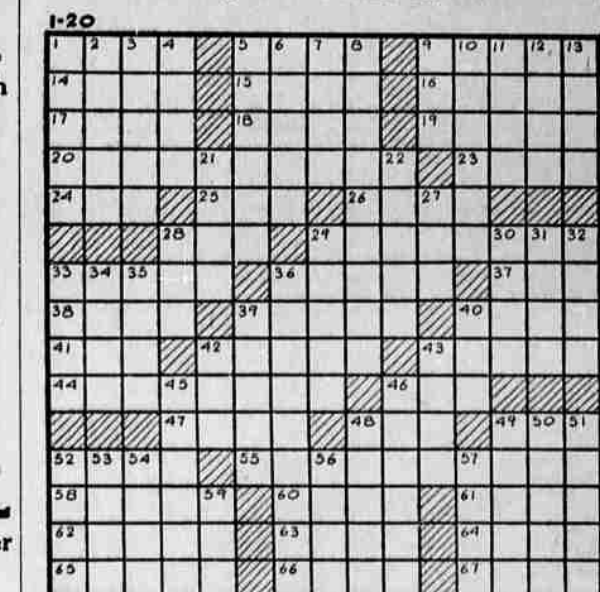

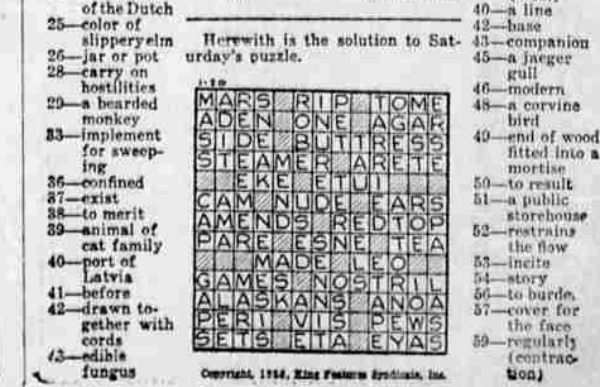
