A bloc of citizens pledged themselves to support a plan by J. P. Smith to obtain a small mill near Astoria for removal here.

War Veteran Can Make Money on Bonus By Holding Bonds Until Maturity Date

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Veterans' agencies today calculated adjusted certificate holders would receive the following amounts under the senate bill:

Holder of an average certificate of \$1,000 on which no loans have been made would be entitled to receive \$1,000 in \$50 bonds which could be cashed for the full amount at any time during the year beginning with June 15 next.

If he held the bonds until June 15, 1937, he could receive on demand, \$1,030, including 3 per cent interest.

If he held the bonds until June 15, 1945, he would get \$1,270.

A veteran who borrowed to the limit of 50 per cent on his certificate would receive just half the amounts in the above categories.

because interest on such loans would be cancelled.

A veteran who borrowed to the limit of 25 per cent allowed before October 1, 1931, and made no further loans under the fifty per cent law, would be entitled on June 15 next to \$780 on a \$1,000 certificate minus varying interest rates accrued prior to October 1, 1931.

A veteran who holds a \$1,585 certificate, the limit, could receive \$1,550 in bonds and \$35 in cash June 15 next. If he held the bonds until maturity he could get \$508 interest or a total of \$2,058 besides the cash.

While the bonds bear simple interest at three per cent, the interest is not paid to the veteran until he cashes his bond. Then he receives the principal plus the interest due, except that no interest is paid on bonds cashed the first year.

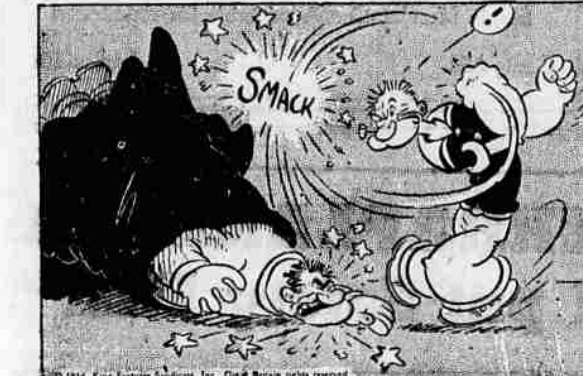

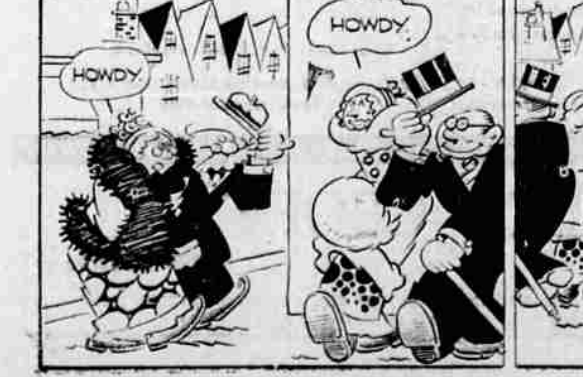
