

OSC QUINTET LOSES TO COUGARS, 32-31

Rousing Second Half Rally Not Enough to Win for Previous Victors.

PULLMAN, Wash., Jan. 23.—(AP)—A brilliant second half rally was not quite enough to save the Oregon State Braves, 1935 basketball champions of the northern division Pacific coast conference, from a 32 to 31 defeat at the hands of Washington State college last night.

The Braves trailed 23 to 19 at half time but came back to take the lead 25 to 25 by virtue of an avalanche of baskets by Hub Tuttle and a free-throw by Captain Bob Bergstrom. It was the Braves' only lead of the game.

Hotstine's field goal again put the Cougars in front 27 to 26.

Ivar Nelson put the Cougars into a 30 to 29 lead with a free throw and Carlson's long one gave the Washington State five a lead with even Tuttle's field goal could not quite cut down. Hotstine, Cougar

forward, was high scorer with 13 points.

CANZONERI KAYOES GARCIA IN NINTH

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Tony Canzoneri, the gentleman farmer from Marlboro, N. Y., still stands out as the undisputed ruler of the lightweights but the menace of the tropic threat to his position seems to be increasing.

Breco Garcia, a courageous Mexican lad from San Antonio, Tex., earned respect as another "comer" from sunny southern climes last night before he finally succumbed to Tony's punches.

Canzoneri, tuning up for a title defense in the spring, took on Garcia in a ten-round non-title bout. He won by a technical knockout in the ninth but only after a stiff battle.

Garcia's willingness to stand up and punch with the champion and his courage under severe punishment earned him the cheers of the capacity crowd of 3,500.

Canzoneri's clever boxing and sharp punching proved too much for Garcia. Falling in an early shot for a knockout, Tony boxed carefully, backing away from the Mexican's furious rushes and sparing his hand as he came in. He found his opening in the sixth and landed a right to the jaw that made Garcia's knees buckle and from there on Tony had things his own way.

Breco fought all the more furiously after being speared the first time and outpunched the champion throughout the remainder of the round. In the seventh, however, Tony swung his right again and Garcia went down for a count of nine.

Canzoneri slung that damaging right to the jaw twice more in the eighth and each time Garcia hit the canvas. Only the end of the round saved him then and after he was belted over twice more in the ninth Referee Billy Kavanaugh called a halt.

Both fighters were above the lightweight limit, Canzoneri weighing 138 and Garcia 137.

RING POST DECIDES WRESTLING MATCH

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Gino Garibaldi, 210-pound wrestler, lost a one fall decision to a nickel plated ring post at the Olympic auditorium last night.

The New York Italian, after taking the first pat over Vincent Lopez, 221-pound Mexican, dropped the second. During the last punishing period he suddenly hurled himself across the ring, skidded through the ropes and landed head first against the upright. He missed Lopez en route.

Bouncing into an aisle, Garibaldi remained motionless and Lopez, who claims a share of the world's heavyweight mat title, was awarded the match. More than 10,000 fans howled over and for the verdict.

Examination of the injured man disclosed he had a heavy scratch on his chest, a stiff collar bone, a hard head and the strength to murmur: "I'll live."

DREWS READY FOR HEADLINE BATTLE

Scrapper Matched to Fight Zimmermann Jan. 28 Has Impressive Record.

Roseburg boxing fans will have an opportunity to see one of their favorites, Jack Drews, in action next week, when Drews returns to the ring after a long lay-off. Drews is scheduled to meet Buzz Zimmermann of Klamath Falls in the headline of the card to be held at Canyonville, Tuesday, January 28, under the sponsorship of the South Unquappa Rod and Gun club.

Drews, who was a great favorite with fans at Roseburg, Marshfield, Portland and Seattle, has been out of the ring for several months, due to an injured ankle. Recently he has been serving as athletic instructor at the South Unquappa CCC camp, and is said to be in excellent condition.

Since coming to the Pacific coast from Philadelphia in 1933, Drews has fought mostly main events. The majority of his battles have taken place in Portland, Seattle and Marshfield.

He had little trouble in disposing of most of the local talent, prior to entering the game at Portland, from which place he went to Seattle.

In his 42 starts on the coast he has only one loss chalked against him, and that was a decision to Dick Johnson, now Oregon middle-weight champion.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—(AP)—Two-year aging in the wood for all "straight" whisky was projected today in standards for the distilled spirits industry made public by Miss Josephine Joche, acting alcohol administrator.

One year's aging will be required of all "straight" whisky bottled after July 1, 1936, and the age requirement will be gradually increased until the two-year rule is put in force after July 1, 1937.

The administration originally had proposed that an age requirement for "straight" whisky be enforced at once.

"As a result of testimony produced at the hearing relative to the quantities of aged whisky now in possession of the various members of the industry, the dates upon which the various requirements become effective have been advanced," Miss Joche explained.

"Age," the administrator defined, is "the period during which the whisky has been kept in new oak containers, charred if used for whisky other than corn whisky."
