## HOUSE OVERRIDES BONUS BILL VETO

ed over the week-end. Leaders there predicted the senators would join the representatives and make the bill law over the president's opposition.

F. R.'s Views Unchanged  
Mr. Roosevelt's handwritten message, returning the bonus bill "without my approval," broke precedent of a quarter of a century. Mr. Roosevelt, in his message, referred senators and representatives "respectfully" to every word of what I said "in last year's veto of a currency-expansion bonus payment bill."

"My convictions are as impelling today as they were then," the president said. "Therefore I can not change them."

Mr. Roosevelt added: "The bill I now return differs from last year's bill in only two important respects: First, it eliminates the issuance of unsecured paper currency to make the payments required and substitutes interest-bearing bonds, which, however, may be converted into cash for face value at any time; second, it adds \$262,000,000 to the total payments by forgiving interest after October 1, 1931, on amounts borrowed."

"In all other respects the circumstances, arguments and facts remain essentially the same as those fully covered and explained by me only eight months ago."

Warns On Credit  
One pertinent phrase from last year's veto message which Mr. Roosevelt evidently had in mind today was:

"The credit of the United States is safe but it can not ultimately be safe if we engage in a policy of yielding to each and all of the groups that are able to enforce upon the congress claims for special consideration."

White house aides said Mr. Roosevelt broke precedent of a quarter of a century and sent his message to Capitol Hill in his own handwriting.

While the veto did not come as a surprise, the manner of its sudden transmission to congress today upset some calculations.

Earlier in the day at a press conference Mr. Roosevelt had smilingly declined to discuss the bonus.

The senate last year upheld the veto after the house had overridden the presidential veto.

Precedent Followed  
President Roosevelt is the only president who has twice vetoed bonus legislation.

President Harding in 1922 was the first to do so. The house overrode him 255 to 54 but the senate sustained the veto 44 to 28.

President Coolidge in 1924 vetoed an "adjusted compensation" bill. The house voted him down 221 to 87 and the senate followed.

President Hoover in 1925 vetoed a bill to increase the bonus. The house overrode him 233 to 173 but the senate sustained the veto 44 to 28.

templated, but employers must insist that all maritime and longshoremen unions scrupulously observe their contracts with us if we are to continue relations with them.

"...the maritime federation and the west coast unions that have fallen under its domination, openly advocate utter disregard for labor contracts and arbitration awards."

Plant said employers would "welcome a complete and thorough government investigation of the Pacific coast maritime labor situation. In fact, we have been earnestly endeavoring for months to bring about just such an impartial inquiry."

Bridges said decision to call the lockout came after a long series of conferences of shipping interests. He declared it was "significant" that the reported move coincides with asserted plans of what he calls "professional union executives" in the east and west to form "company-controlled" federations.

"They (shipping interests) may get away with it in those places but they'll never break the Pacific federation," he asserted.

Lockout Plan Forecast  
The lockout move, he said, will start first with a series of paid newspaper advertisements stating intentions of the employers and arguments in support of their actions.

Next, he said, will come eviction of seamen and longshoremen from their jobs by laying up ships, "ostensibly because 'exorbitant' union requests make operation financially impossible."

The third step, he continued, will be public repudiation of all awards to and agreements with maritime unions, followed by withdrawal of recognition and offers to deal with the men "only on an individual basis."

Finally, he said, "shippers will attempt dictatorial control of wages and working conditions." That, he concluded, would signal destruction of the unions and an end to organized maritime labor on the coast.

"But there'll be no destruction," he said. "We propose to fight to the last to preserve our hard-won gains through the federation."

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
