RECIPES

PORK CHOPS WITH DRESSING

By Mrs. O. Earl Byrd
Box 491, Roseburg
1 1/2 pounds of pork chops
1 onion ground
3 T. butter
1 egg
3 cups stale bread crumbs
1-8 L. pepper
1 t. poultry seasoning
1 t. salt.
Place pork chops in a dripping pan, soak the bread crumbs in water to moisten, squeeze dry, and add the ground onion and the other ingredients, put mound of dressing on each chop and dot dressing with butter. Put a little water in the pan and bake in a moderate oven until meat is tender. About one hour.

Place pork chops in a dripping pan, soak the bread crumbs in water to moisten, squeeze dry, and add the ground onion and the other ingredients, put mound of dressing on each chop and dot dressing with butter. Put a little water in the pan and bake in a moderate oven until meat is tender. About one hour.
