

MARSHFIELD FIVE DEFEATS ROSEBURG

Visiting Basketeers Win in Last Minute Rally by 33 to 28 Score.

Marshfield went into leadership of the Douglas-Coos county high school basketball conference by defeating Roseburg 33 to 28 here last night. A last minute, three-basket rally brought Marshfield from behind to win the game. Marshfield led 11 to 5 at the first quarter, but Roseburg stepped ahead in the second period to lead 19 to 15 a half time and 25 to 22 at the close of the third quarter. It was Roseburg's first defeat in conference play.

Collins, Roseburg guard, with 10 points, was high scorer. Rackliff, Jutanan and Ring, each with 8 points, were high for the Marshfield team.

The game was exciting from start to finish, with first one team and then the other in the lead. The score was tied twice and neither team was ever able to gain more than a narrow margin after the first period.

Ring Starts Scoring Marshfield opened the game with a fast breaking attack led by Ring, who started the Roseburg team and fans with three long shots, before Scherner, Indian guard, closed in to hold him to a foul conversion as his only score for the balance of the game. With Scherner applying himself to Ring, who, with the aid of Jutanan and Rackliff put Roseburg in the hole 11 to 5 in the opening quarter, Collins took over the scoring duties for Roseburg and proceeded to match Ring's center floor record.

When Marshfield attempted to put a guard over Collins, Hannister broke loose with a couple of long shots and Roseburg went into the lead.

The game continued at a grueling pace through the second and third quarters and developed into a wild melee as the clock moved toward the end of the game's allotted time.

With only about four minutes left to play Jutanan broke through for a snap shot, while White and Rackliff each dropped ringers to bring Marshfield from behind with a 28 to 27 score to win the game 33 to 28.

In a fast preliminary game, the Roseburg B team defeated Glendale high school 32 to 18.

GUN COACH CITES WOMEN AT "BEST"

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 25.—(AP)—If your wife or fiancée doesn't answer you quickly, don't be surprised—she is probably concentrating, and "doing a better job of it than you are" said a University of Minnesota authority today.

Sergeant Ernest R. Mylke, who has coached the Minnesota men's rifle team to four consecutive big ten titles, said women have better powers of concentration than men "when it comes to shooting at least."

He teaches 40 coeds the fine points of rifle shooting and he has coached women's rifle clubs on several occasions.

"I'm not saying that women are better shots than men," he declared. "They are physically handicapped because it takes strength to handle a rifle properly for top-flight shooting."

"But one thing they have on men is the ability to concentrate. Once a woman gets her eye on a target—well, just try to attract her attention."

"But men, they take their eyes off the target to answer you when you aren't even talking to them."

FOOTBALL FROM HORSEBACK LATEST

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Something new in games is in process of evolution in the movie colony.

Football played on horseback is the general idea, as Victor McLaglen, the athletic actor, described it today. McLaglen has been working out the details of the game with three former college gridgers, Homer Griffith and Irvine "Cotton" Warburton, of the University of Southern California and Ted Key of the University of California at Los Angeles.

All players will be mounted, and tackles will be made by "tagging" the ball-carrier, McLaglen said, in the manner that "touch" football is played.

"We're having a little trouble figuring out what sort of a ball to use," he said. "The regulation spheroid wouldn't do because it would be too hard to pick up. Otherwise, at present, we're planning to use regular football rules."

Some of the variations: Punting will be done by the ponies, kicking the ball from a sort

The other seven planes in the formation remained in the air until the charred bodies and tangled wreckage was cleared from the field.

Wings May Have Locked

All of the planes were flying in echelon formation when the crash occurred. An echelon formation places the planes in a diagonal line, with each craft behind and slightly to one side of the leader.

In this formation it was possible the crash was caused by interlocking of the wing tips.

Lieut. Col. Asa Duncan, commanding officer of Luke field, who took charge of the rescue operations, said he was unable to tell immediately exactly what caused the deaths of the fliers. Airmen might have been killed by the collision, crash or flames.

He said the disaster was as bad as any he recalled in Hawaii's aviation history.

Lieut. John K. Gerhart, field adjutant, said the planes were engaged in night maneuvers which had been performed regularly without incident.

When the twin-engined bombers collided, one of them immediately burst into flames, and the fire quickly spread to the other doomed plane.

Apparently it was Lieut. Beard's ship which exploded. How close the third member of the element came to crashing into the other two could not be determined by ground observers through the darkness.

The planes belonged to the seven-second bombardment squadron.

The manner in which the bodies of the dead were mutilated gave rise to the belief they may have been killed by the impact of the crash.

"They never had a chance," said one officer.
