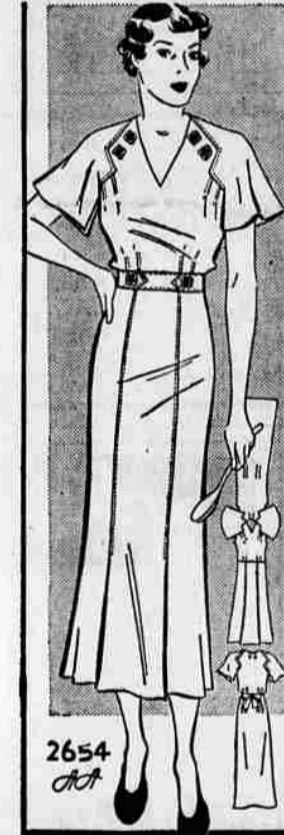

## ETHIOPIAN ARMY DEALT HARD BLOW

ADDIS ABABA, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Red Cross officials today confirmed Italian reports that Italian forces have occupied the strategic town of Nebelli in southern Ethiopia.

The defending Ethiopian army under the command of Ras Desta Demtu was reported to be completely disorganized since the bombing plane had spread their operations over an area 200 miles north of Wadara, making it impossible to transmit orders.

## AGED SLAYER GETS TERM OF 15 YEARS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 27.—(AP)—Frank La Belle, 65, pleaded guilty to manslaughter today for the slaying of Mrs. Myrtle A. Service, 37, and was sentenced to 15 years in prison and fined \$500. La Belle, a Jewell, Ore., barber, shot Mrs. Service to death in their hotel room. He was charged with first degree murder but was permitted to plead on the manslaughter charge because of his advanced age and his declaration that he was intoxicated at the time of the crime.

\$316, exceeded the \$200 budget allowance by \$116.

Elections cost \$111.50 or \$11.50 more than the \$100 budget allowance.

The miscellaneous expenditures, budgeted at \$500, totalled \$817.48, an excess of \$317.48.

Out of the \$2,000 placed in the emergency fund, the council used \$1,805.93, leaving a balance of \$194.07.

Interest on warrants created the heaviest overdraft, amounting to \$8,110.92 total expenditure, as compared with a budget allowance of \$4,500, or a total excess of \$3,610.92.

During the year the city's finances were put upon a much more substantial basis, and a decided reduction made in future interest charges.

All outstanding improvement bonds, totalling \$94,134.30, scheduled to mature in 1935, 1936 and 1937, bearing interest at the rate of 8 per cent, were refunded by the issuance of a like amount of 15-year serial, general obligation bonds, bearing interest at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent.

The council also refunded \$72,864.54 general fund warrants, bearing interest at 8 per cent, by the issuance of 10-year general obligation bonds, with an interest rate of 3 per cent.

These two refunding measures reduce interest costs approximately \$5,000 annually.

During the year, in addition to amounts paid by refunding methods, the city retired general obligation bonds in the sum of \$25,200.

Through the refunding system, the city placed all of its outstanding warrants under the 3 per cent bond, and now has money on hand to meet all warrants issued since the time of refunding.

The city's total bonded indebtedness now amounts to \$400,879.84, the entire amount being in the form of general obligation bonds to be retired serially.

Annual bond retirement payments vary from \$31,500 in round figures, to \$27,000 in 1940, then drop to an average of about \$27,000 per year until 1945, when the average is again reduced to approximately \$17,000 until the final maturity date of the last bonds in 1950.

national banks in Ohio and Pennsylvania and subsequently became examiner for the RFC in charge of bank reorganizations.

Morrison is a former railroad man and also developed the Central Power and Light company which he operated until it was sold in 1925. Since then he has been in business in San Antonio and engaged in ranching. In 1933

he was a member of the American delegation to the London economic conference.

The new board will exercise broad powers over the banking structure.

Without declaring an emergency, it may increase reserve requirements by as much as 100 per cent. Should this power be exercised, the present \$2,000,000,000 in excess reserves which some say carries credit potentialities of \$30,000,000,000, could be virtually wiped out.

The board will have the controlling voice in the system's open market policy, which determines the reserve banks' participation in the government bond market and exercises a rein on the supply of credit. The open market committee will consist of 12 members, including the seven members of the new board.

In the future, choices of the executive heads of the 12 Federal reserve banks must have the approval of the board of governors.
