GOOSE LAKE LIKELY TO FILL UP AGAIN

ALTURAS, Calif., Jan. 25.—(AP)—Is Goose lake, dry since 1927 but once the second largest fresh water lake in California, going to fill up again?

Pioneers and Indians alike predict it will. Old Chief Johnny Williams of the Modoc tribe, who died six years ago, always said it would "fill 'em up again." He asserted his people told him the lake had been dry many times, and geological studies indicate Johnny's people spoke the truth.

The lake formerly stretched 54 miles from above Lakeview, Ore., to six miles south of Davis Creek, Calif., and in one point was 25 miles wide.

Last season about three miles of surface never dried, and this winter much of the lake floor is covered to a depth of three to five feet. The current heavy snowfall is expected to deepen this covering.

When the first pioneer party reached the shores of Goose lake in 1850 the lake was dry. The pioneers drove across it, and when the lake became dry again in 1927 their old wagon road, 75 or more years old, was found, along with many curios of covered wagon days. More pioneer parties crossed the dry lake bed in 1852.

\$200,000 SHAFT TO HONOR HUEY LONG

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Political heirs of the slain Senator Huey P. Long are planning a \$200,000 tribute to his memory on the grounds of the state's skyscraper capitol at Baton Rouge.

They tentatively have decided on a broken, 30-foot marble shaft, rising from Long's tomb as the dominating figure in the group.

Symbolizing life broken by death, the shaft would be in the center

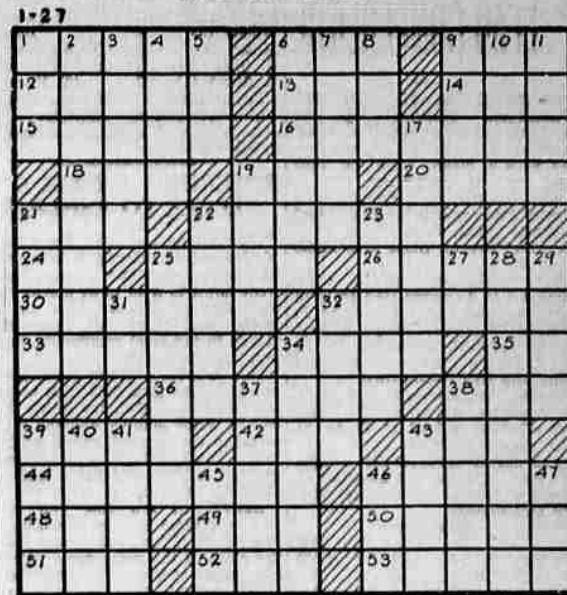
of a triangle created by three sunken lakes. One side of the column would bear a tablet reciting Long's accomplishments during the eight years of his political domination of the state.

Another tablet would detail plans which his slaying cut short. Natural gas piped into the stone would provide an "eternal light" atop the shaft.
