cost of about \$7,500,000.

Flood of Blanks Begun
All last night, presses at the government printing office roared. By today they had turned out 2,500,000 application blanks and were still rolling.

Within 24 hours, distribution of these blanks will begin through 50 offices of the veterans' administration, ex-soldiers' organizations and some members of congress, by filling them out, attaching their fingerprints and filing them with the veterans' administration, ex-soldiers will formally apply for the \$50 bonds. Under the new law, these bonds may be cashed at local post offices beginning next June 15 or held to obtain a 3 percent interest.

Before the bonds are distributed, however, the blanks must be double checked at the veterans' administration—an operation requiring 1,000,000 arithmetic calculations. Officials predicted that most of the blanks would have their bonds "by summer."

Must Be Patient
"They'll have to be patient and they'll have to wait," said Adelbert Miller, executive assistant to Veterans' Administrator Frank T. Hines. "It's going to be a tremendous job."

After the bureau of engraving produces the \$5,000,000 bonds required, it will be the treasury's job to distribute them. Asked whether "orthodox methods" would be used in raising the cash to redeem the securities, Secretary Morgenthau said "yes."

The bonus bill itself carries no appropriation; that presumably will be passed through congress later. The treasury already has indicated that the financing would increase next year's deficit, possibly to \$5,500,000,000.

Warning Issued
In the statement warning against "frittering away" cash, the White House and veterans' leaders said:

"Immediate and urgent need for funds offers, of course, a valid reason for cashing the bonds."

"In the same way, the paying off of indebtedness wholly reasonable, just as using the cash for something of permanent value such as a new home or the definite improvement of an existing home, would be reasonable."

Administration officials have expressed a belief that veterans would demand not more than \$1,000,000,000 in cash at present, but it was indicated that the treasury might plan to have \$1,500,000,000 available to ease the demand were greater.

Pensions Next?

Many members of congress predicted that demands for pension legislation would follow enactment of the bonus bill, but they differed widely on when the drive would come.

Already, many bills are before congress for pensions to widows, orphans or other dependents of World War veterans, but there has been no serious move toward general pensions such as are paid to the veterans of earlier wars.

President Roosevelt forecast last year that passage of a cash bonus

bill would be the signal for a pension drive. Most congressional leaders, interviewed today, agreed with him though they hesitated to be quoted by name.

Senator George (D., Ga.), on the other hand, took the view that it would be many years before there would be strong agitation for general pensions. He said the average veteran today was about 40 years of age, and the average would have to reach 60 before congress would give the pension idea serious consideration.

Senator Stetson also dissented from the view that the pension drive would start immediately. He said no resolution calling for pensions could pass the American Legion today, and that the most the veterans would ask, as a group, would be pensions for widows and dependents.

Many forecast that it would be several years, at least, before congress paid any serious attention to general pensions proposals. But most of them felt the drive would be underway within three to five years.

On the other hand, Senator Hastings (R., Del.), an opponent of the bonus legislation, forecast the drive would begin "tomorrow."

Restrictions Cited
Veterans will be unable to get their money for the new bonds before June 15 at the earliest, veterans' administration officials said. Harold W. Breining, assistant administrator, said the bonds are not cashable before that date and will not be issued before then.

Borrowing on the bonds will be impossible and unnecessary. They will be redeemable at government offices as soon as issued. The bonds could not be posted as collateral for a loan, however, because they are non-transferable, non-negotiable.

WOLGAST-FONTAINE BOUT HEADS CARD

This is the Pacific northwest debut of Wolgast, the former flyweight champion who has fought in every great boxing center of the world.

Since outgrowing the flyweight crown a year ago, Wolgast has been knocking the heavier boys right and left.

The fighters will weigh in at around 121 pounds.

Jimmy McLeod, Washington lightweight flash, meets Kermit Stewart of Portland in a six-round semi-main event.

Wes Hayes, negro heavyweight, meets Bud Zeller, the big soldier from Fort Lewis, in a four-rounder.

KOEHN SEES TRADE BOOM FROM BONUS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28.—(AP)—George Koehn, state commander of the American Legion, in commenting on the final passage of the soldiers' bonus bill, said: "I honestly believe that 95 per cent of the money will go into various channels of trade."

He predicted that Oregon, which he said would receive between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000, will find payment a stimulant for a real business boom over the entire state.

The Northwestern Miller, magazine the milling industry, of January 22, which said "we have yet to find one (miller) who believes himself entitled in equity and fairness, to pocket such money as may be restored to him by the tax collections."

Wallace said "it is a shame that because of legalistic theories, divorced from economic realities and social justice, the court should have created such an embarrassing situation for farmers, consumers, processors and the government."

The secretary added: "The problem now is to discover the best way out of this situation, not in any vindictive spirit, but in the spirit so clearly shown in the preamble of the constitution—to 'establish justice.' Above

everything, it seems to me that the essential spirit of the constitution is to promote the general welfare."

Wallace read excerpts from several letters he received after his attack on the court's ruling last week, some of them lauding his opinion and others criticizing him.

you see such a group as assembled here in the name of liberty to preach the gospel of reaction, it makes the issue stand out pretty clearly."

"Billion Dollar" Dinner
"A billion dollar dinner was given here the other night," Lewis said, "and that dinner was addressed by a man who had made a reputation for himself as a great commoner."

Scattered boos went up from the floor when he mentioned Smith's name.

"This man appeared before that billion dollar dinner and performed for his masters," he continued.

"He said he was supremely happy and comfortable. After having established his comfortable status, for one hour he undertook to assail every act performed by the greatest humanitarian president the United States ever had in the interest of the common people of this nation of ours."

The reference to President Roosevelt was cheered.

Al Held Inconsistent
"And Alfred E. Smith from his position of supreme happiness and comfort offered to the 14,000,000 unemployed and their dependents for their supreme happiness and comfort only the ancient face of the constitution," Lewis proceeded.

"I heard him say once that the people down in his ward when they wanted coal or food could neither burn or eat the constitution of the United States or a decision."

"I tell him today that the people of the United States have the same reaction today as did those people down in his ward when he honestly represented them."

At the same time, political observers were waiting eagerly to hear what Senator Borah who is hooped by his friends for the republican presidential nomination, will say when he takes the stump tonight in Brooklyn.

Robinson Prepares Blast
The speech which Robinson, the majority leader of the senate, will make tonight over a nationwide (Columbia Broadcasting System) network at 10 p. m., eastern standard time, is expected to give an inkling of the administration's attitude toward the "walk" that Smith threatens to take.

As Robinson labored on the address, its contents were not disclosed, but the title, "The Hands of Esau," gave a hint of its nature. It recalled the story in Genesis of how Jacob obtained the blessing of his blind father Isaac.

Jacob put the skins of kids on his hands to disguise himself as the hairy-handed Esau, and it is recorded that Isaac said:

"The voice is Jacob's voice, but the hands are the hands of Esau."

In New York it was indicated that Smith may have something more to say about Robinson's speech, Bainbridge Colby, speaking in that city last night, said attempts to "nullify" the constitution constituted America's greatest danger.

"Today," said Woodrow Wilson's secretary of state, "nullification proceeds from the legislative branch of the federal government, and is directed at the judicial branch of the government."

In the south, Governor Talmadge of Georgia and John Henry Kirby, Texas lumberman, laid last-minute plans for a rally tomorrow at Maccon. Kirby expressed hope this will spur a movement to prevent President Roosevelt's re-nomination and "return the party to the principles which made it great."

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BONUS AID BUREAU TO BE SET UP HERE

Service headquarters to aid veterans in making application for bonus payments are to be established by the Veterans of Foreign Wars at the Grand hotel, it was announced today.

Quarters are being provided in the hotel lobby by W. O. Clinger, proprietor, and typewriters and other office equipment is being furnished by Glenn Robinson, local Remington-Rand representative.

The local post has been advised that the application blanks will be received in Roseburg within 48 hours.

Ward Cummings and R. L. Preston, V. F. W. officers, will conduct the work of the office, and announce that application blanks will be filled out free of charge for all World War veterans regardless of whether or not they are affiliated with the V. F. W. or other veterans organizations. The service will be without charge.

STATE BOARD CITES SALES TAX URGENCY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28.—(AP)—Oregon will be unable to obtain federal funds for old age pensions and will be without state matching funds unless the proposed sales tax is approved, the state tax commission reported to Governor Charles Martin today.

Voters will decide Jan. 31 on the sales tax which would finance pensions up to \$50 a couple for persons 65 or more years old.

"The Oregon old-age assistance law as it now stands is not in any respect self-operative," the three tax commissioners stated. "Unless and until revenues or funds become available for payments of old-age assistance it must remain wholly in suspense."

"The one and only thing that can make United States funds available for old-age assistance is for Oregon itself first to provide matching funds for the same purpose."

At present the needy aged are cared for by county pensions or by direct relief.
