Editorials on the Day's News

DID YOU ever watch somebody light a long fuse leading to a carefully prepared blast and then stand, tense and expectant, waiting to see if the blast would go off with a loud and shattering boom or FIZZLE OUT?

IF SO, you can understand the situation existing when Al Smith arose in Washington on Saturday night to deliver his speech on the state of the nation.

It had been carefully and deliberately prepared. It had been long awaited. It had been widely advertised. By Saturday night, the whole country was waiting on tiptoe to hear it, to appraise it, to judge whether it was an epoch-making political utterance or just another disappointing dud.

It WASN'T a dud.
CONSIDER what happened on Saturday night.
Al Smith, a lifelong Democrat, speaking with sincerity so obvious as not to be doubted, attacked savagely the victorious leadership of the party that has honored him in practically every way a party can honor a man.

AUTOIST KILLED ON SEXTON MOUNTAIN

GRANTS PASS, Jan. 29.—(AP)—A man identified as Carlyle Enloe, 29, of Benson, Kansas, was killed and Hugo Anderson of the Meritt stage road was placed in the Josephine General hospital with a scalp wound by an automobile accident about 3 o'clock this morning on Sexton mountain about 18 miles north of Grants Pass and one mile south of Grave Creek.
Coroner Virgil Hull returned to Grants Pass shortly before 8 a. m. this morning with the body, having extricated it from beneath the car which had rolled about 50 feet from the highway down a steep canyon.
A hurried examination showed Enloe received a broken neck among other injuries. Identification was not positive, the name being taken from a driver's license.
The accident occurred on a straightaway.

Defense Assn. Denied Marine Band Music as Part of Navy's Boycott

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The navy's boycott of the women's patriotic conference on national defense was complete today after U. S. marine bandmen walked out on the organization in spectacular fashion last night.
The walk-out apparently was ordered by high navy officials as another tactic protest over the anti-New Deal speech which Bainbridge Colby, former secretary of state, delivered to the women Monday night.
A few hours before the musicians quit, three high ranking naval officers cancelled speeches upon orders from Henry LaSalle, assistant secretary.
"Well, we will have music," was the immediate reaction of Mrs. Harriet Vaughn Rindon, national president of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who was in the audience. She hired four hotel musicians and there was music.
"It was mean, petty and indefensible," declared Senator King (D., Utah), a conference guest.
"Outrageous," said Senator Metcalf (R., R. I.).
Mrs. Grace L. H. Brosseau, former president general of the D. A. R., was angry.
"I thought the marine band belonged to all of the people," she said. "This is the first time it ever occurred to me that it belonged to any particular person or group."
When Capt. Taylor Branson, band leader, later was asked who had ordered the players back to their barracks, he replied:
"I'm too good a marine to tell that."
Maj. Gen. J. H. Russell, commander of the marine corps, knew "nothing about it."
"Nothing to say," said Assistant Secretary Roosevelt.
The three officers who were to have addressed the gathering earlier in the day are Rear Admiral F. B. Upham, chairman of the navy's general board; Capt. Edward A. Duff, of the chaplain corps and Dr. Gen. Thomas Holcomb, commander of the marine base at Quantico, Va.
Upham said:
"I would have felt embarrassed to follow on the same platform the speaker of Monday evening, who, in my opinion, made such an aggressive attack upon the commander-in-chief of the army and navy."

Robinson's Answer to Smith, Borah's Speech In N. Y. Warms Feuds

Al Declared Turncoat by Former Running Mate in Defense of New Deal.

Own Words of Democratic Candidate of 1928 Are Quoted in Reply to His Barrage.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Political quarters waited expectantly today for any counter by Al E. Smith to the new deal contention he had "advocated and championed" his every basic principle—but now had joined "the enemy."
It was his turn, if he chose, in the democratic feud heading up behind him and Senator Robinson of Arkansas. Although Smith was understood to feel President Roosevelt should reply to his Liberty league address, Robinson took the official leadership against him by radio last night.
"Let's look at the record," he said, and called upon the Smith words of previous years in testimony against him today.
Regarding failure to fulfill the 1932 platform promise of 25 per cent reduction in government costs, the senator spoke of relief needs and said Smith himself was urging emergency appropriations at the time the plank was drafted.
The former New York governor had advocated "tactics of war" in 1933, he recalled, including power for the president to "cut, slash, dip into and run through all the red tape and through all the statutory restrictions."
Past Words Recalled.
Robinson belittled the Smith charges of socialism and communism. He reminded that Smith himself had been attacked for "socialism" when advancing social policies.
He disputed the assertion the constitution was being flouted by the administration. In that connection, the senator read a news dispatch of early 1933 in which Smith—discussing the depression emergency—was quoted:
"Let us look back a few years to 1917 and 1918. What did we do then? Why we took the constitution."

WARNING ISSUED ON DOG POISONER

Parents throughout Roseburg and in neighboring residents' districts were urged today to caution their children against eating any morsels of food found on the ground. A dog poisoner, it is reported, is apparently using meat-filled sandwiches, liberally sprinkled with strychnine. Several dogs have died after having been seen picking up pieces of sandwiches apparently tossed out on streets and roads, it is reported.

MRS. MARY C. BARR DIES AT YONCALLA

Mrs. Mary Conner Barr, 68, wife of Thomas J. Barr, died at her home in Yoncalla today after a prolonged illness. She was born at Brookville, Pennsylvania, October 11, 1867, and was married in that city in November, 1904. Following her marriage she and her husband moved to Grants Pass, and in 1905 moved to Yoncalla where she resided up to the time of her death. Mrs. Barr was a member of the Presbyterian church and a long and active member of the Eastern Star lodge.
The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral home and funeral services will be held in the Methodist church at Yoncalla Friday afternoon at two o'clock. Rev. Harold V. Myers officiating. Interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.

Townsend Plan Not Favored by Borah

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, who addressed a rally of anti-"Old Guard" republicans here last night, made it known that he does not favor the Townsend old age pension plan, but that he does favor an increased pension under the federal social security program. In answer to an inquiry, Senator Borah declared his belief the Townsend plan is impracticable.
"But I do think," he added, "that we must provide an old-age pension of \$50 or \$60 a month." He reminded his audience he had striven in congress to insert such a provision in the administration's social security program which provides pensions of \$30.

SMITH EXPLAINS PRESENT ATTITUDE

Says Criticism Aimed at Extremes; Challenge to Roosevelt Issued.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Alfred E. Smith declared today "there is only one man who should try to answer" his American Liberty league address—an open challenge to President Roosevelt issued after Senator Joseph T. Robinson's reply to the Liberty league address.
The former governor, bitter critic of the new deal, defended his course of action before the Liberty league, praised the group of anti-new deal democrats who have "put country above party" and delivered sarcastic comment on Senator Robinson's address last night.
The 1928 democratic presidential nominee said he would make no specific reply to Robinson's address—which accused Smith of an about-face in political views and beliefs—but said a "few words about my friend Joe. I was an unhappy warrior to hear him read off his speech over which he stumbled so that I felt sure it was canned and did not come from the heart of the Joe Robinson that I have known."
Al Explains
Smith's statement, issued at his offices in the Empire State building, then proceeded to list the affirmations he made in Washington and explained them briefly.
"Robinson's purpose was to belabor the issue and while I won't reply to him I want the issue kept clear," Smith said. "Of course, I said I was for farm relief—I still am. In my Omaha speech in 1928, I proposed a constitutional and effective method. That doesn't keep the American people from rising up to protest against a silly and

Mum as to Own Candidacy, but Followers Launch Campaign to Effect His Nomination.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Addressing a "Borah-for-President" rally last night in Brooklyn, the senator charged the voters of New York and of many other states "have been disfranchised" in the selection of a presidential nominee by a self-appointed and self-anointed group meeting in "secret conclave, behind closed doors, long after midnight."
It would be playing into the hands of this group, he said, if un-instructed delegations were sent to the Cleveland convention.

STATE WINE SALES PUT ON CASH BASIS

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission published a ruling today ordering that all sales of wines to retailers must be on a cash basis.
Another regulation will prohibit the bottling of wines by retailers.

EX-EAGLES OFFICIAL GETS PRISON TERM

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Virgil O. Gillette, former secretary of Medford lodge of Eagles, was sentenced today to serve an indeterminate sentence of not exceeding two and one-half years in state prison, on his plea of guilty to larceny by embezzlement of lodge funds. The shortage, the district attorney informed the court, amounted to \$2100. It was stated the embezzled funds were used in the payment of sick and death benefits of the fraternal order.

TOWNSEND'S PLAN HIT IN HOUSE SPEECH

"Magnificent Folly," Says Representative Lea; No Chance of Passage, Another Avers.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Speaking to the house against the Townsend plan, Representative Clarence F. Lea (D., Calif.), said today if the nation adopted "this magnificent folly" it would "probably long repent in sackcloth and ashes."
"The Townsend movement," he told the house, "is a mass attack against the earnings and savings of the industrious and the frugal."
"It offers not something, but much for nothing," he said. "It encourages idleness, discourages industry and frugality. It makes a vicious appeal to the electorate to use their political power to vote themselves a competence, even at the expense of those already in poverty and distress."

HOUSE HELD OPPOSED

Representative Ferguson (D., Okla.), says no member of the house, including the author of a Townsend plan bill, would vote for such old age pension legislation.
Ferguson yesterday challenged any member of the chamber to go on record as saying he would vote for the plan.

MILK PRICE RAISED IN 2 OREGON CITIES

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The Oregon milk control board announced that the minimum price of milk will be advanced one cent a quart in the Salem and Portland markets on Feb. 1.
The action followed a series of meetings in various market areas.
An increase in the price received by grade B producers was requested last September. Farmers grew more insistent after the unusual cold weather in October.
Early in December various commodities advanced the price paid for milk for manufacturing purposes to a point higher than the price being paid producers for grade B milk for the bottle and can grade. Many farmers told the control board they would be obliged to seek a condensation market, diverting their daily milk shipments from the cities, unless an increase was granted.
The new price schedule applies only to the Salem and Portland markets, but the board indicated it may be applied to all areas if those markets conform to similar basic requirements now in effect in Salem and Portland.

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The law, enacted after the supreme court ruled a previous pension plan invalid, is being challenged in District of Columbia supreme court by more than 100 railroads.

LIGHT VOTE IS FORECAST FOR NEXT FRIDAY

Four Measures Awaiting Decisions From People of Oregon; Polling Places Listed.

Douglas county voters will go to the polls Friday in a special state election called to pass upon four measures, which have been submitted for decision of the people. Observers anticipate a light vote, although the percentage of voters may be larger than expected, due to the agitation among Townsend club members and grangers in opposition to the sales tax issue.
The four measures to be voted upon involve a change in the date of primary elections from May to September; increased pay for legislators; a sales tax for the purpose of providing money for old age pensions, and a bill authorizing the imposition and collection of student fees, not to exceed \$5 per term.

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Vet Posts Getting Ready for Rush of Bond Applicants

PORTLAND, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The veterans' bureau here announced today that application blanks for bonus "baby bond" payment will be available in Portland tomorrow.
The various posts and headquarters units were busy today mobilizing their staffs to handle the expected rush of requests in every part of the state.
Carl E. Moser, state adjutant of the American Legion, said blanks will be available at each Legion post.
Dwight Alderman, department commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, said his organization will supply blanks to veterans requesting them in all parts of the state.
The organization of Disabled Veterans of the World War also will aid in distribution of the bonus blanks.

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BILL CLOUDED BY DOUBTS AS TO LEGALITY

McNary and Norbeck Voice Dissenting Votes; Plan for Money Inflation to Be Offered.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Burdened with constitutional doubts and threatened with inflationary attacks the revised administration soil-conservation subsidy plan for replacing the AAA was ordered reported to the senate today by its agriculture committee.
The vote was 15 to 2.
Chairman Smith (D., S. C.) expressed "grave doubt" as to the measure's constitutionality and said he and several others of the 15 on the affirmative side voted merely to "report" it instead of "favorably" reporting it.
He and Senator Bankhead (D., Ala.), who introduced the bill, declared, however, that a majority of those voting wanted a "favorable" report.

McNary Votes "No"

Senators McNary and Norbeck (R., S. D.) voted against the bill, which goes to the floor without material change.
Smith said the committee would meet tomorrow to decide whether to include in the report, but not in the bill, an argument by Senator Thomas (D., Okla.) for more and cheaper money to keep up farm prices.

Plan Temporary

Although Secretary Wallace and Solicitor General Stanley Reed had expressed opinions the bill is constitutional several committee members still considered it outside the bounds of the supreme court decision invalidating AAA.
The bill vests broad powers in the secretary of agriculture to make grants to farmers for economic use of their lands. It is a temporary two-year measure de-

KANSANS LAUNCH BOOM FOR LONDON

TOPEKA, Kas., Jan. 29.—(AP)—The Kansas G. O. P. state committee today commended Gov. Alf M. Landon to republicans of the nation as a candidate for the party nomination for president.
At a meeting called to set machinery in motion for selection of the state's 18 delegates to the national convention at Cleveland June 9, the committee unanimously endorsed the Kansas governor.
Governor Landon has not yet indicated whether he will be a candidate.
The governor, who will be the principal speaker at a dinner to-night climaxing a republican rally on the 75th anniversary of Kansas' admission to the union, declined further comment.
He will outline his views on national issues in the speech, which will be broadcast, but republican leaders said he would make no reference to candidacies.

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Umpqua Valley Getting Many New Residents From Kansas, Nebraska

The Umpqua valley is receiving a very pronounced influx of new residents from Nebraska and Kansas, according to observations made by Glenn Brown, examiner for the state motor vehicle department for this district. People coming to the Umpqua valley from those two states are a very high type of citizens and are, in most cases, possessors of some means.
Examinations conducted by the motor vehicle department for Oregon permits to drive cars give an excellent picture of influx of settlers, Brown states.
The movement has taken very interesting turns. Two years ago there was a heavy movement into Oregon from Oklahoma and Texas, and the Umpqua valley received a great many of such newcomers. The present trend of emigrants from Oklahoma and Texas is into the Lebanon district in the Willamette valley, where there are also many new arrivals from North and South Dakota.
In the Eugene area the greatest percentage of newcomers are from California, with a sprinkling of arrivals from mid-western states.
Around Roseburg, however, the number of new settlers from Nebraska and Kansas is most pronounced. There are also a few arrivals from California.
Out of 53 applications for drivers licenses received by Mr. Brown at the time of his last examination period here, 44 were from persons who have recently moved into Oregon, and of this number 36 were from persons who have come within the past few months from Nebraska and Kansas.
