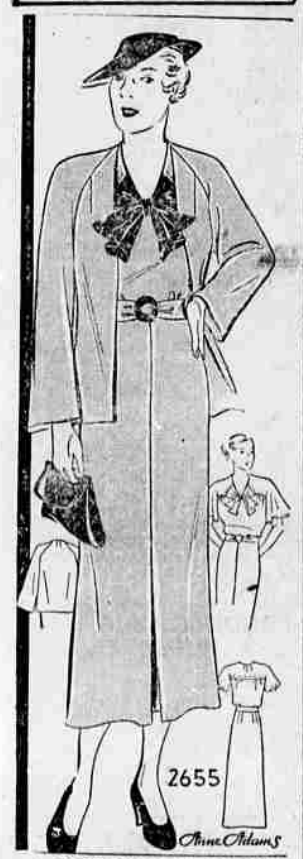

## Self-Pity Begets Song Spawn, View Of Irving Berlin

HOLLYWOOD, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Self-pity may be an emotion unworthy of mature people, but it will be a sad day for Tin Pan alley when the human race stops indulging in it. Irving Berlin, one of the top-ranking tunesmiths, said as much in surveying the successful songs of the past quarter-century, a period brought to his mind by the silver jubilee given in his honor recently. "Sometimes I think self-pity is

the strongest and most accessible human emotion," he said. "We all are prone to it."

"That's why so many songs, expressing it, are written."

He recalled some of his own "You Forgot to Remember," "All Alone," "All by Myself," and so on.

"They are all written from the standpoint of an injured person," he said. "They all say, in effect, 'look what you've done to me. Gee, have I had a raw deal?'"

He advised ambitious song-writers to take that theme as the most likely potential of success.

But almost any form of sentimentality will do, nicely, he continued.

"Americans are deeply sentimental, and they like some of their songs that way," Berlin explained. "The diet has to vary, but sentimentality is the main dish."

Other sure-fire themes, he said, were songs about home, returning to mother and the family, and melancholy reminiscences over old friends.

## Fashion Decrees Brilliant Shoes For Easter Wear

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Shoes as brilliant as the peacock's tail will deck the nation's feminine toes this Easter.

Early spring styles displayed today by manufacturers at this inland capital of the shoe trade feature pastel tints rivaling the rainbow.

"Bright colors—avenders, yellow, greens, blues, pinks—will strike the dominant note this season," said one leading stylist, "and previously untried combinations will have a new vogue."

The choice will range from a red, white and blue trimmed model for the patriotic to one rivaling Biblical Joseph's coat of many colors in variety. The pastel tints will be available in suedes, fabrics, and—absolutely new—in patent leathers.

Recent trends toward the sandal apparently will continue. Most houses emphasized a rounded toe and lower heels.

An important modification of the sandalized footwear is the practical replacement of last spring's lace-tie oxfords with broad-strapped offerings. They vary from the wide straps of Instep height to the sabot and the button. Single, large leather-covered straps add a decorative touch.

Gabardines are stressed for pre-Easter street wear, to be followed by cottons and linens for the batmy days. A chamol and white patent leather combination is being pushed for the summer trade.

Blue, rust, black, gray and tan colors are picked for early spring street wear. Sport shoes are mostly in blue, rust and white.
