

DREWS DECISIONS BUZZ ZIMMERMAN

Weight Margin Counts in Canyonville Bout; Card Pleases Big Crowd.

Despite a great advantage in weight and reach, Jack Drews, popular local fighter, had his work cut out for him in taking an eight-round decision from Buzz Zimmerman of Klamath Falls in the headliner of a fine boxing card at Canyonville last night. The boys fought at catch weights, with Drews at least 10 pounds heavier than Zimmerman.

The Klamath Falls boy, however, refused to be daunted by the weight handicap and carried the fight to Drews throughout the entire eight rounds. Drews' punches punished Zimmerman severely and in the last round Zimmerman was plainly groggy, but at no time did he let up on his speedy two-handed attack, which at times had Drews backing away.

The main event topped an excellent fight card, which was arranged by Tex Bredlove for the South Umpqua Rod and Gun club and which was witnessed by a crowd of approximately 400 fans. In the semi-final, Speed Bowers, 150, Roseburg, knocked out Tony King, 130, Portland, in the fourth round of a hectic engagement. Both boys were willing mixers and threw leather from all angles with little attempt at defense.

King was not equal to Bowers in hitting strength, although he was the better boxer. He went down for a count of six in the second round, but regained his feet and drove Bowers into the ropes with a volley of punches.

In the fourth round he went down again for a count of eight and again attempted to carry on the battle, but was dropped for the final count with a right to the head.

His gameness won him more plaudits than were given the victor. Pat Patterson, 140, and Pat Franco, 145, both of Roseburg, gave the fans a fine boxing show in a four-round special event. Both are experienced boxers and fought a good draw.

Heavies Fight Draw
The four-round heavyweight battle between Buster Carter, 255, and Max Bredlove, 190, Canyonville, appeared slow in comparison with the work of the lighter boxers in the other matches, but the fans saw plenty of real slugging.

Carter, with a considerable advantage in weight and reach, landed heavily on Bredlove in the first round, but lacked condition and tired under Bredlove's relentless body punching. Bredlove took an edge in the second and third rounds, but Carter came back in the fourth to make it a draw decision.

Dunn Kayes Miller
In a scheduled four-round preliminary, Chester Dunn, 155, Roseburg, knocked out Jack Miller, 155, Portland, in the third round. Miller gave Dunn some hard jolts with a lightning fast left in the first rounds, slowing up the Roseburg boy who had waded in vigorously at the start of the battle. In the third round, however, Dunn solved the attack by stepping inside Miller's long left swing, and connected with a left hook to the jaw which paralyzed the Portland boy for a long count.

The crowd was put in a good humor for the card by a three-round curtain raiser between Don "Slats" Bredlove and Ivan "Man Mountain" Hunter, both of Canyonville. The two boys, one slender and the other fat, slugged away willingly with neither able to get an advantage and were given a draw decision and a shower of silver coins.

Another fight card was announced for late in February.

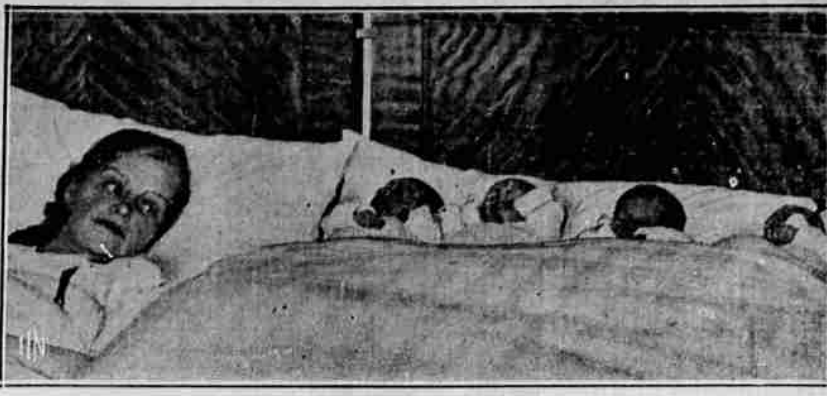

has some of the earmarks of a second Jack Dempsey, took a pretty thorough beating from Billy Treest of Batavia, Ill., last night in the Chicago stadium, but left the ring on the receiving end of a rousing ovation. LIQUOR PROFITS OF OREGON INCREASED

SALEM, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The Oregon liquor control commission made a net profit of \$1,291,611 during 1935, of which \$1,025,506.60 went toward unemployment relief, the annual report of the commission revealed.

The commission last year cleared \$208,000 more than in 1934. Gross sales totaled \$6,041,282. Profits last year included \$1,218,739 from stores and agencies, \$146,687 from the license division and \$226,215 from privilege taxes, as compared to \$644,145, \$88,881.50 and \$250,107 in 1934.

The report stated the commission operated in 1935 with a net profit of 20.57 per cent and was now on a cash basis.

There were 153,775 liquor permits sold last year with a return of \$109,084. Total assets as of December 31 were fixed at \$1,519,943. Current liabilities totaled \$572,239 and fixed liabilities, including the orig-

inal legislative appropriation of \$107,888.71, approximately \$117,184.44.

The inventory at the end of the year totaled \$587,773, including wines and other liquors.

Net earnings surplus of the commission, since its inception, were placed at \$2,874,742.50.

December sales reached the highest for any month since the state liquor law was enacted, totaling \$827,723.

RAPS WALLACE FOR COURT CRITICISM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Representative Treadway (R., Mass.), told the house today that Secretary Wallace "ought to be impeached" for his criticisms of the supreme court's decision refunding impounded processing taxes.

Treadway attacked particularly Wallace's comment that the court's order to return the processing taxes was "the greatest legalized steal in history."

"Any public official who makes a statement which calls a supreme court decision a legalized steal ought to be impeached," Treadway said.

The Massachusetts republican said Wallace should "take a sprint from the cabinet, a walk would be too slow."

"The president ought to begin cleaning out the cabinet from Wallace up or down," Treadway concluded amidst republican applause.

There was no immediately reply from the democratic side.

NATION TO DANCE AT BIRTHDAY BALL

Proceeds Will Be Used in Crusade to Stamp Out Infantile Paralysis.

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—(AP)—An army of dancers expected to total more than 5,000,000 will celebrate President Roosevelt's 54th birthday anniversary tomorrow night at dances and parties in all parts of the nation.

With everything from barn dances in rural communities to formal balls in the larger cities scheduled, Col. Henry L. Doherty, chairman of the ball committee, estimated today that more than 6,000 parties will be held.

As in the last two years, the proceeds again will be used in the fight against infantile paralysis. Seventy per cent of the proceeds will be applied in the communities where the birthday dances are held; the other 30 per cent will be used in connection with the Warm Springs foundation in Georgia.

Information at the birthday ball headquarters here indicated that every variety of celebration will be held.

Cabinet members and others prominent in Washington officialdom are among the patrons at the birthday ball to be held in the nation's capital.

Mrs. James Roosevelt, mother of the president, will be the guest of honor at New York's principal ball at the Waldorf-Astoria.

In Boston the festivities are being given a bright touch by show girls appearing in a revue there, who are selling tickets and who will officiate at the ball.

Eddie Cantor to Aid
Comedian Eddie Cantor will add to the fun at the party in Brooklyn, where the "chairman" of the affair is 8-year old Shirley Pekney, herself a sufferer from infantile paralysis.

In Rockford, Ill., 21 persons whose birthdays also fall on Jan. 29, will help the president celebrate tomorrow night. The main ball in Milwaukee will be featured by a three-ton birthday cake. A baby show will be held in conjunction with the ball at El Centro, Cal. All of the 6,000 or more parties will be linked at 11:30 p. m. eastern standard time, when the president speaks from Washington on a nation-wide radio hookup.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—President Roosevelt will interrupt his own birthday party tomorrow night to speak words of greeting over the radio to those attending more than 7,000 birthday balls throughout the country.

As usual, the president will observe his birthday with his "gang." For years he has had dinner on January 30 with intimates of his service as assistant secretary of the navy and as democratic vice presidential nominee in 1920.

WOLGAST STAYS IN SHELL, LOSES BOUT

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Midget Wolgast, 129, Philadelphia, aroused the ire of Referee Tom Louttit in the seventh round of his bout with Richard Fontaine, 132, Butte, because of his irksome boxing methods, and Louttit awarded the fight to Fontaine. The Portland boxing commission withheld Wolgast's end of the purse and called a meeting today to talk things over. In the entire 63 rounds, the willing but futile Fontaine never landed one good blow on the clever easterner, but on the other hand, Wolgast refused to take a chance and open up against his opponent. After warning Wolgast twice to cut loose, Louttit stopped the bout.

C., knocked out Howie Wise, 128, Tacoma, in the second round; Lyle Tripplet, 149, Portland, won over Johnny Dryer, 153, Portland, four rounds.

FREDDIE MILLER AGAIN BEATS PAYNE

SEATTLE, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Cecil Payne, Louisville's slugging lightweight, should be convinced today that Freddie Miller of Cincinnati, world's featherweight champion, can beat him any day in the week at any weight.

For the third time during their ring careers, Miller smashed Payne painfully in a 10-round battle here last night. It was a non-title over-weight bout with Payne scaling close to his normal weight, 135 pounds, eight more than the National Boxing association titlist.

In their second bout in the east a few months ago Payne had to cut down to 123.

Miller dodged most of Payne's haymakers but was badly mugged up at the finish. He received a gash on the bridge of his nose and he was covered with blood from a cut he opened over the Kentucky boy's right eye.

The Associated Press score sheet gave Miller six rounds, Payne one, the third, and showed three even.

WES RAMEY WINS OVER EDDIE COOL

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—(AP)—Wesley Ramey of Grand Rapids, Mich., last night belted out a ten-round decision over Eddie Cool of Philadelphia. Ramey, weighing 134½, showed he is improving as he overwhelmed the Philadelphiaan who held him to a draw three years ago. Cool weighed 135.
