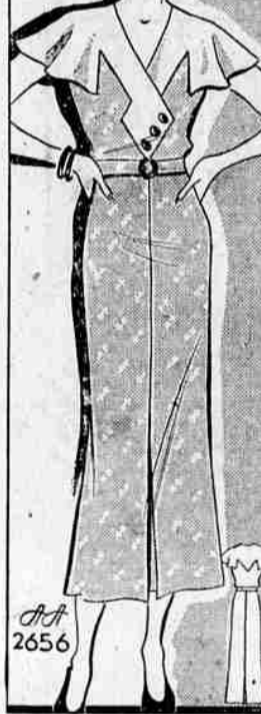

(Associated Press Foreign Staff) PARIS, Jan. 29 — (AP)—Spring bonnets, inspired by the headress of Marrot, King Henry IV's queen, made their debut today in the 1936 fashion show.

Ostrich feathers and gay flowers added the striking effects which most of feminine Paris has seen for several seasons.

Black straw bonnets, dipped in a peak over the forehead, were encircled with ostrich feathers curled over one ear or trimmed with bright, shiny flowers perched along the brim.

Veils were an outstanding feature, consisting this season of coarse, stiff, black mesh, sometimes fashioned in a circular cut extending down to fasten under the chin.

The Queen Marrot influence again prevailed in black net neck ruffles worn by several models.

Street clothes included many frocks accented with white organza, jabots under grey or navy wool coats designed in slender silhouettes, having small collars and big-top sleeves.
