

F. R. ASKS CONGRESS FOR BONUS MONEY

President's Note Suggests No Method; Inflation, Taxes Discussed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt's request for a \$2,249,178,375 appropriation to meet bonus payment costs—a formal business letter which did not mention taxes—was made public today by Speaker Byrnes. It went to the speaker's office last night. Byrnes said he would refer the letter to the appropriations committee.

Chairman Doughton (D., N. C.) of the ways and means committee, where tax legislation must originate, said he did not see that Mr. Roosevelt's request for funds—which he regarded as routine—necessarily meant new tax legislation would be sought. He reiterated it was his disposition to await definite word from the white house or the treasury before doing anything at all on taxes.

The text of the president's letter:

"I have the honor to transmit herewith for the consideration of congress for the purpose of carrying out the adjusted compensation payment act, 1936 supplemental estimates of appropriations for the veterans' administration, fiscal year 1936 and 1937, \$2,249,178,375, and for the treasury department, fiscal years 1936 and 1937, \$6,678,375, amounting to \$2,249,178,375.

"The details of these estimates, the necessity therefore, and the reasons for their transmission at this time, are set forth in the letter of the acting director of the bureau of the budget transmitted herewith, with whose comments and observations thereon I concur."

Morganthau Explains

Secretary Morganthau told his press conference that President Roosevelt's request for the appropriation was simply carrying out "orderly and regular procedure."

Morganthau said the impression had gained ground in some quarters that the president's request was "unusual."

"The president simply submitted to congress a request for an appropriation of \$2,249,000,000 to fulfill the requirements of the bonus bill," Morganthau said. "The bonus bill did not carry any appropriation. It merely stated:

"There is hereby authorized to be appropriated such sums as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this act."

"An authorization is not an appropriation."

The white house request gave impetus to plans of a house inflationary bloc to force payment through currency expansion.

Representative Patman (D., Tex.) promised a "bottle royal" to provide cash by issuing currency against idle gold in the treasury.

He said he expected to call a meeting promptly of the steering committee backing his plan.

The Patman group stepped back to let the baby bond bonus bill go through, promising to renew their campaign when the issue of finding the needed funds was reached.

Rep. Snell of New York, house republican leader, said he saw no reason for Mr. Roosevelt's request at this time. He said he thought it would have been wiser to wait for a determination of how much money actually would be needed and what the deficiency in available bonus funds would be, then incorporate a request for the money in a deficiency appropriation bill in the next congress.

Byrnes talked with Representative Taylor (D., Colo.), acting chairman of the appropriations committee, soon after the Roosevelt request reached his desk. Taylor said he thought the committee would "expedite" action.

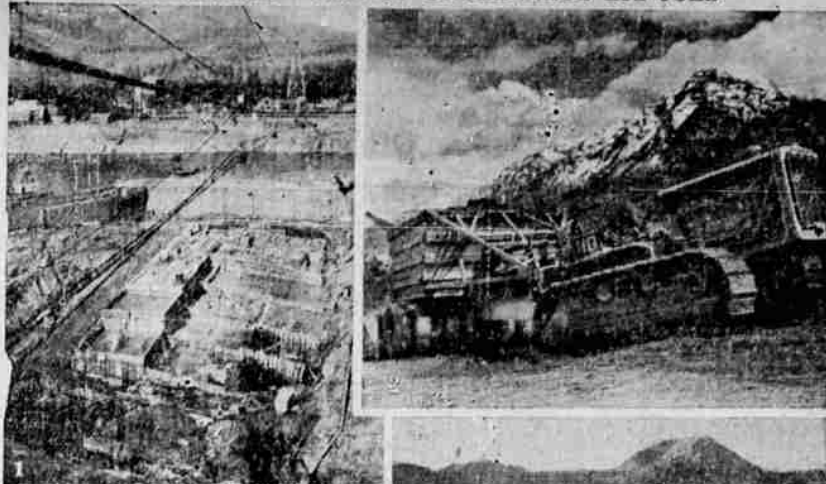
Moths On Rampage

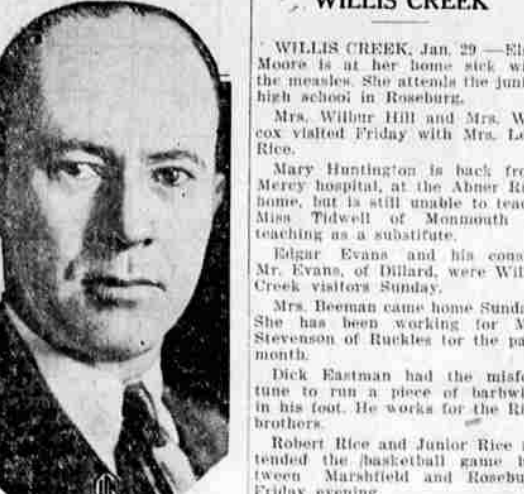
Portland on the Columbia River Highway. Thousands stop to gaze down on the herculean task every week. It is one of the great construction projects of the nation worth going a long way to see.

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RECORD SNOWFALL HITS DIXIE STATES

Discomfort Also Dealt by Cold Rains; Winds, Ice Endanger Vessels.

Cold storms on land and sea that have lashed at the North American continent for more than a week only slightly abated today while snowfall of record breaking proportions covered much of the south.

Snow drifted from Texas to the Carolinas, snarling only Florida, south Georgia and the Gulf coastal regions. There a cold rain fell. Temperatures along the east coast north to New York were slightly lower, but Boston had its coldest day of the year with a 3.8 degree temperature and recordings fell from Lake Michigan southwestward to Mexico.

Miami, Fla., had the warmest weather with a maximum of 70 for the last 24 hours. The California coast was a close runner-up. San Francisco registered 61 degrees and Los Angeles 62.

Floating ice hindered navigation along the Atlantic coast and high winds brought danger in the Gulf of Mexico.

Off the coast of Massachusetts, light buoys were being replaced with spars and in Chesapeake bay the ice was so changing the channel buoys that they couldn't be depended on.

Coast guards searched the seas off New Jersey for the 45-foot schooner, Anna and Ella, unreported since she left Cape May, N. J., January 18 with a crew of seven for Norfolk, Va.

High surf and wind prevented tugs from refloating the freighter Texas banker, around nine miles south of Arkansas pass.

Inland, the snow storm in Texas cost the life of an airline pilot who was credited with saving the lives of his five passengers. The plane crashed during a forced landing in a blinding blizzard.

Other deaths were recorded in Arkansas and Alabama, adding to the more than 200 dead over the nation since the New Year from cold.

Light snow fell in Chicago today where the temperature dropped 22 degrees to six below since yesterday afternoon.

In Nebraska few temperatures were registered above zero although a bright sun started the mercury to rise.

Other parts of the midwest registered sharp drops last night and the weather bureau forecast was for continued cold tonight with rising temperatures Friday in the western states.
