RECIPES

Cottage Cheese Pie (original) By Mrs. Herman Brown Sutherlin, Ore. 1 cup cottage cheese, 1 cup sugar, 1 T. cornstarch, 1 T. cream or butter, 2 eggs, Cinnamon and nutmeg, spices to suit. Make any good piecrust. Place in pie tin, crimp edges and prick bottom with fork. Bake until a very light brown. Place cottage cheese, sugar, cornstarch and egg yolks in bowl and cream together well. Add flavoring and cream or butter. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and pour mixture in crust. Bake in moderate oven until filling sets and top is light brown in color.
