Present Era Bad, Like Predecessor, Woman Says on 100th Birthday

OGDEN, Utah, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The "good old days," says Mrs. Mary Fild Garner, who is 100 years of age today, were not so good.

"There isn't anything very good about either of them," she said when asked how the old days compared with the present. "They are both bad."

For all her century of life, Mrs. Garner is still active and in good health. She does not wear glasses and her hearing is normal.

She thinks the radio is one of the outstanding modern inventions but she deplores the automobile and the airplane. They cause too many accidents, she believes.

The Townsend old age pension plan would be fine for the old folks, she said, but predicted it will never become a reality unless a smaller amount is provided for.

When Mrs. Garner was born in

Stanley Hall, Herefordshire, England, 100 years ago today, the first steamship had just crossed the Atlantic, Martin Van Buren had just been elected president of the United States and a new religion—Mormonism—had been established but six years.

She and her parents later embraced the new faith and spent seven weeks in sailing across the Atlantic. In Nauvoo, Ill., where they settled, she recalls hearing Joseph Smith, founder of the Latter Day Saints church, preach many times, and of his staying in the jail at Carthage, Ill.

Later she walked with her parents most of the way across the plains to this city. She has more than 440 living descendants, and some 40 others have died.

At a family gathering today at the home of a daughter-in-law here, Mrs. Garner will cut a birthday cake bearing 100 candles.

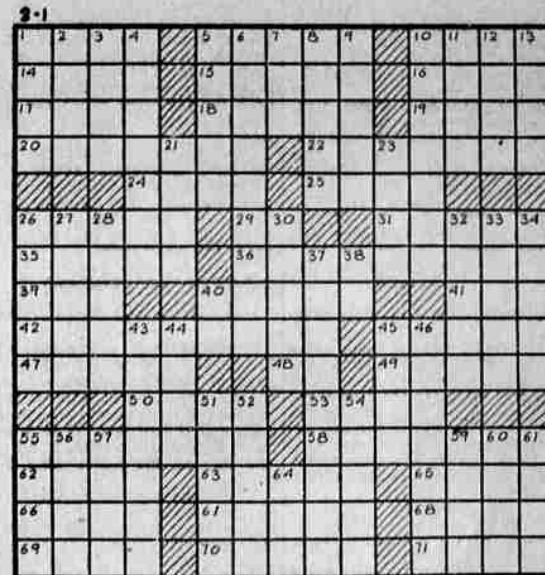
