

HUSKIES WIN THIRD TIME OVER OREGON

Washington Quintet Shows Complete Superiority in Game Ending 42-23.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 1.—(AP)—The University of Oregon had one more chance today to break into the win column against the dazzling Washington Huskies' basketball team. Three times this season the northwesterners have defeated the Webfoots—the last time by a score of 42 to 23 last night. The teams met again this evening.

The Huskies were never pushed last night after the first few minutes when Oregon led 2 to 1. Almost before the crowd had settled down the visitors opened up an attack which ran their lead to 8 to 2 before Oregon could score again. The razzle-dazzle offense kept up to give the Huskies a 25 to 13 lead at half time.

The second half was even more disastrous for the Oregon quintet. A fast-breaking offense carried the ball down the court for set-up shots time and again, and passes, screens and general floor work of the Huskies were just too much for the Webfoots to follow.

But even the Huskies missed many shots. It was merely a breakneck basketball game with neither team able to score except by main force. But the Huskies were plainly superior.

Coach Howard Hobson ran in several new combinations but none clicked satisfactorily against the fast-moving team from Seattle.

BERGLUND RALLIES TO DEFEAT ACTIS

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Feb. 1.—(AP)—Ray Actis, San Francisco knockout artist, put Swede Berglund on the canvas last night but couldn't keep him there and the San Bernardino middleweight punched his way to a ten-round decision.

Berglund took the count of two in the first round. He arose fighting and kept the offensive most of the route. Referee Jack Kennedy

gave Berglund seven rounds. Actis two and called one even. In the Legion stadium dressing room later, Actis displayed a bruised right hand and said he was unable to punch after the third round. A top heavy favorite for win, he had scored a three-round knockout over Berglund in San Francisco some time ago.

Berglund, 165, outweighed Actis by 3 pounds.

Losing Faith in Borah

A prime topic in their ranks during the day was an assertion at Cleveland by George H. Bender, president of the Ohio League of Republican clubs, that G. O. P. friends there of Senator Borah were losing faith in him as a prospect for presidential nomination.

Borah declared emphatically today there is no change in the Ohio situation.

The American Liberty league's readings to expand its anti-new deal activities stimulated renewed speculation about the future.

Joett Shouse, president, issued a report saying that the league has 75,000 members. It has numerous state divisions, he said, and is ready to create more "as soon as it may be determined to follow such a course."

There was speculation as to whether Alfred E. Smith and others of the league might support an independent ticket in pivotal states or a republican candidate, but a definite answer is not expected in the immediate future.

At Dayton, Ohio, Col. Frank Knox, Chicago publisher, assailed the new deal again, saying that it is launching numerous investigations of private enterprise to "discredit" business and business men. He said new dealers were "out to win complete control over people's affairs—the people's savings—and to make over this country of ours to suit themselves."

While Governor Talmadge of Georgia continued his anti-Roosevelt drive, congressmen from that state gathered here to discuss plans for the Roosevelt campaign.

Representative Carl Vinson called the Georgia delegation in the house to a conference with men named to conduct the new deal drive in the state.

Some observers saw a possibility that two Georgia delegations might go to the democratic convention—one pro-Roosevelt and one siding with Talmadge—leaving the convention to decide which should be seated.

Shouse, Liberty league head, said new dealers from the president down had sought to "damn" the league but there had been "no responsible attempt" to answer its arguments.

"This very fact that Mr. Roosevelt attempted to damn the league, the fact that his cabinet members and other official spokesmen have by abuse and innuendo and often outright misrepresentation made continuous efforts to destroy it, is the most striking evidence of the need for the work which the league is doing," Shouse's report said.

"Fortunately," it said, "the people have awakened. Fortunately a large part of them have begun to understand the insidious and dangerous thing that was being accomplished under the guise of relief and recovery."

POISONING FEARED IN CHILD'S DEATH

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complicated by a high fever. She was removed to Mercy hospital, where she suffered further convulsions yesterday afternoon.

Her condition appeared somewhat improved late yesterday evening, but shortly before 10 p. m. she again went into convulsions, which resulted in death.

While the physicians are inclined to believe death was due to natural causes, the slight suspicion of poison resulted in turning the case over to the coroner for a definite decision.

Many Dogs Killed

The fear of poisoning results from activities of a dog poisoner, who for several weeks has been scattering strychnine broadcast over the city and neighboring communities. Many dogs have died as a result of the poison bait. In some instances the dogs have been seen eating portions of sandwiches, dying a short time thereafter.

This situation recently resulted in the broadcast of a warning by radio and through newspapers advising parents to caution children against picking up any morsels of food.

The poison put out for dogs has apparently been thrown out of a moving automobile, investigating officers report, and has been left along streets and roads in and near the city.

Great fear has been felt that some child might die as a result of the poisoned morsels of food.

Citizens Aroused

In the event it should develop that the little Marstera girl was a poison victim, liberal rewards will be posted for the apprehension of the poisoner. A number of aroused citizens announced this morning they would contribute to a reward fund.

Donna Lou Marstera was born in Roseburg February 11, 1932. Surviving are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lou Marstera, and a brother, LaVerne. Mrs. Margaret Burland of Corvallis and Mrs. W. E. Marstera of Roseburg were the child's grandmothers.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Sunday at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel. Rev. J. Frank Cunningham officiating. Interment will be in the L. O. O. F. cemetery.

VOTERS OF OREGON REJECT ALL FOUR STATE MEASURES

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proposal to change the primary election date from May to September.

Partial Vote Totals

About 43 per cent of the registered voters—slightly more than expected—cast ballots.

Reports from 1281 of Oregon's 1631 precincts gave:

Primary date change, yes 56; 639; no 131,791.

Legislators' pay, yes 25,540; no 157,391.

Sales tax, yes 28,441; no 168,737.

Compulsory student fees, yes 46,674; no 135,642.

Governor Charles H. Martin declared that the overwhelming defeat of the sales tax—the only available means of making posi-

ble state-federal pensions for needy persons 65 years of age and older—would not alter his adamant stand against calling a special session of the legislature to seek another source of revenue.

California, Idaho and Washington all have sales taxes now in operation, and Oregon stood out today as the only Pacific coast state not resorting to that means of revenue raising.

Portland Votes Bonds

Portland and Multnomah county voted 2 to 1 in favor of a \$300,000 bond issue for a new super airport.

Victory also resulted for the proposed new 20-year franchise for Portland's mass traction system.

The voters defeated the proposal to spend \$50,000 for a valuation of Northwest Electric company property. The proposal to levy a \$25,000 tax to redeem scrip issued during the depression days likewise went down to defeat.

The airport bond vote was 56:638 to 22,579. The franchise measure carried 39,997 to 33,537.

Pensions May Halt

The sales tax was the only means of taking old age pensions out of the hands of the counties and placing them under the more secure state-federal financing. Maximum pensions are \$30 a month to needy persons 65 years of age or older under Oregon's new state law, which will be dormant until financing is arranged.

Curtailment of spring sports and other student activities at state institutions of higher education loomed as an aftermath of the death blow to the long-collected compulsory student fees to support the extra-curricular activities.

However, the optional payments and efforts to make the activities more self-supporting were expected to salvage much of the program.

INDICTMENT HITS HALL AND JUSTICE

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1.—(AP)—Leo Hall, convicted of the Erland Point "mass murder" in Washington, and Jack Bernard Justice of Portland, were indicted jointly by the county grand jury today on a first degree murder charge for the slaying of W. Frank Akin of Portland.

Akin, special investigator, was shot to death in his apartment on November 30, 1932.

Hall is under death sentence for the Erland Point massacre and will not be tried for the Akin killing. Justice, who has been held in jail here on an assault charge, will be required to defend himself against the murder charge.

It was intimated that the grand jury indicted the two largely on the testimony of Peggy Paulos, whose "tip" led to the clearing of the Erland Point case, and of Larry Paulos, her husband.

Paulos told police here several weeks ago that he attacked Akin in March, 1933, after having been hired to do so by Justice. This alleged attempted attack, eight months before Akin was shot to death, failed when Akin beat off his attacker.

Justice has denied any connection with the slaying or the previous assault on Akin, but has been held in jail since Paulos' testimony.

"Other suggestions," the governor continued, "had been considered and were turned down by the legislature. These were the diversion of the gasoline tax and a suggested two per cent on incomes. The governor added he was not surprised at the overwhelming defeat of the sales tax and the other measures voted upon yesterday. "The people who would benefit by the sales tax were out to defeat it," he concluded.

RAIN IN JANUARY EXCEEDED AVERAGE

January weather was slightly above the normal in temperature and considerably above the average rainfall, according to the monthly meteorological report compiled by D. P. Marting, meteorologist in charge of the local station of the U. S. weather bureau.

The mean temperature for the month was 44.4 degrees, as compared with a normal of 41.2 degrees, an average daily excess of 3.2 degrees. The highest temperature recorded was 61 degrees and the lowest 26 degrees.

Rainfall totalled 9.17 inches as compared with a normal of 5.31 inches, bringing the total from September 1 to 20.89 inches, as compared with a normal for the period from September 1 to February 1 of 19.19 inches, giving an accumulated excess of 1.70 inches.
