DR. JOSEPH BARTON PASSES ON AT 79

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 3.—(AP)—Dr. Joseph H. Barton, 79, head of the Bible department of College of Idaho for many years, died at a hospital here last night. He was a pioneer Presbyterian minister.

Dr. Barton came to Portland Jan. 8 for medical treatment. The body will be taken to Caldwell, Idaho, tonight by his widow, Mrs. Grace Barton.

He went to Boise about 51 years ago from Pittsburgh, served subsequently as pastor of First Presbyterian church there, in the pulp at Caldwell and at Union, Ore., and spent some years as Sunday school missionary.

LINDBERGH KIDNAP STATUTE IS UPHOLD

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—The supreme court ruled today that kidnapping of an officer to avoid arrest constitutes a violation of the Lindbergh kidnapping law.

The ruling was on an appeal by Arthur Gooch, sentenced to die for assisting in kidnapping two police officers at Paris, Texas, and transporting them into Oklahoma. A unanimous opinion, delivered by Justice McReynolds, was the first the high tribunal has handed down concerning the Lindbergh law.

MAC DONALD WINS PARLIAMENT SEAT

LONDON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Ramsay MacDonald, former prime minister of Great Britain who lost his seat in parliament in the recent general elections, will be a member of parliament again when the house of commons reconvenes tomorrow.

It was announced that he won the bye-election for the Scottish university seat, running on the national government ticket, with a total of 16,335 votes.

PLANES DROP FOOD TO NEEDY ISLANDERS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—The quaint fisherfolk of Tangier island, cut off from the rest of the world in the ice-locked lower reaches of Chesapeake bay, had a supply of food today to help them face one of the worst winters they can remember.

Drigible and plane yesterday dropped 1,800 pounds of food for the 1,500 natives and staved off threatened distress.

The general health of the rugged islanders, said to be descended from 14 families of Cornish fishermen, was reported good.

A Goodyear company dirigible, piloted by Karl Lange, landed on the ice near shore yesterday and unloaded 1,000 pounds of provisions. An airplane from Easton Md., piloted by Forrest Wenyon, brought 800 pounds more.

Only in recent years have the islanders used cash in their transactions. Formerly they took their fish hauls to markets and exchanged them for other goods.

"Shank's mare" is the means of transportation on the island where there are no roads, automobiles or horses.

BUSINESS SPURT IN NORTHWEST SEEN

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 3.—(AP)—Experts at University of Oregon said today definite business recovery in the northwest, which started early in 1935, seems assured on the basis of conditions computed for nine selected Pacific northwest cities for the year just ended.

The result of an extensive study of bank debits was published in this month's issue of "Pacific northwest commerce and industry," issued by the bureau of business research and the school of business administration.

Six of the cities studied, Portland, Seattle, Spokane, Eugene, Salem and Everett, showed a substantial gain for December, while only one—Yakima—showed a decrease. Yakima, however, ended the year 1935 ahead of 1934. Bellingham and Tacoma showed slight change in December but were continuing their gains.

Eugene led all other cities in gain for 1935 with 24 per cent increase over 1934. Spokane rated next with 20.9 per cent. Portland gained 14.7 per cent, Tacoma 14.4 per cent, and Seattle 13.5 per cent. The average gain for the year was 5.7 per cent.

TOWNSEND GOES TO DESERT FOR REST

LONG BEACH, Calif., Feb. 3.—(AP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, leader of the pension movement bearing his name, has gone to the desert to rest.

He left his home Saturday by automobile accompanied by his son-in-law, James Sheveling, of South Dakota, said Mrs. Townsend today.

His wife added she did not know his present whereabouts, beyond the fact he planned to rent a cabin somewhere. Sheveling drove off in the direction of Death valley, she said.

Dr. Townsend, who has been troubled recently by a bronchial infection and asthma, is due to start shortly on a nation-wide speaking tour.

ECCELES RENAMED TO HEAD RESERVE BODY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today designated Marriner S. Eccles of Utah, chairman of the board of governors of the federal reserve system for a term of four years.

Eccles, who will serve as chairman for four years, was appointed for a four-year term. He also headed the old board.

The new board will consist of seven members, one of whom remains to be appointed by President Roosevelt. Five are here and the other, Ralph W. Morrison, of Texas, will arrive to be sworn in later in the week.

The banking act of 1935 gives the board authority to double the margins that member banks must maintain against deposits, gives it dominant powers in the open market committee which guides the system's participation in the government bond market, and grants the board power to veto over the reserve bank heads. The board also has the right to fix margins governing relations between bankers and brokers.

The five members in addition to Eccles, are: M. S. Symczak of Chicago; Donald Ransom, Atlanta; John McKee, Ohio; Joseph A. Broderick, New York.

1 cup raisins
1 t. cinnamon
1 t. cloves
1 t. allspice
1 t. salt
11 cups sugar
1 cup milk
2 1/2 cups flour
4 t. Royal baking powder
1 t. vanilla
3 t. cocoa
1 cup shortening
3 eggs.

Method: Cream shortening, add sugar, cocoa and spices. Mix well. Add raisins. Stir in. Add egg yolks and milk. Beat well. Add flour and baking powder. Add well beaten egg whites. Add vanilla, stir well. Place in well greased muffin tin and bake for 35 minutes in a moderate oven. Makes one dozen large tea cakes.
