Filmom's New Beauty Demands Call For Increased Stature and Midnight Blue Hair

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The perfect beauty, this year, as Hollywood sees her, has expanded two inches upward, several inches around, and changed the color of her hair from blonde to very brunette.

"Midnight blue" was Lefroy Prinz's description of the hair-shade today, when the dance director explained why he selected Ann Meril as one ideal dancer out of some 500 he interviewed for the chorus of "Showboat."

Miss Meril, a Fort Wayne, Ind., girl, born Martha Merrill, is five feet five inches tall, weighs 115 pounds, has a waist measurement of 26 inches, a bust of 34, and ankles of eight inches in circumference.

And her hair, apparently natural, is "midnight blue."

As for his reasons for selecting her, Prinz said: "Ideas of what constitutes a beautiful girl change just as do the standards in clothing. I'm not the one to say why, in either case. But, from the reaction I and other directors, get in fan-mail from audiences who see the dancers, it's

perfectly apparent people are tired of blondes.

"In case of a girl who has naturally blonde hair, it is different. She might still be considered a beauty. Trouble is, too many blonde ones have been on the screen. People are tired of them."

Miss Meril's stature, five feet three, is a good two inches above the previous standard for Hollywood beauties, stars and chorus girls.

"The answer, again, is audience reaction," Prinz said. "We began getting better comments on the looks of our choruses when, more by accident than anything else, we tried using taller girls. Apparently, what the vast bulk of people want—those who are interested in a girl's looks, that is—is a taller type. Maybe it's because the race is getting bigger, generally."

"From a technical standpoint, at any rate, it is rare that we find real beauty without stature. A girl who stands around five feet, or five two may be pretty, but it's physically impossible for her to have much dignity or queenliness. She's cute, but she isn't impressive."
