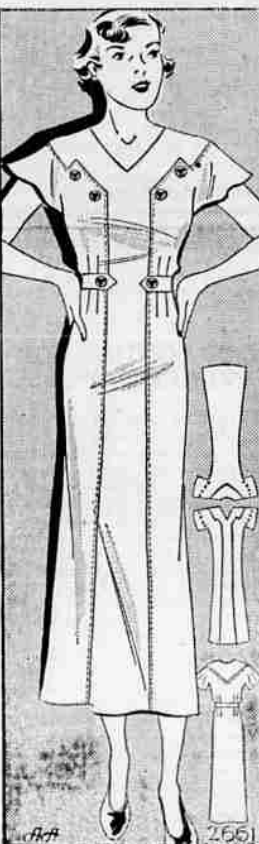

"DING" HEADS WILD LIFE CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—Jay N. Ding, biologist, former chief of the biological survey, today was unanimously elected chairman of the North American Wildlife conference which planned consideration later in the day of proposals for a national federation. Ding, continued to the conference tentative plans for the federation. It would extend from a general headquarters in Washington through thirteen regional chapters, to state, county and local organizations. "The Washington office will not be a lobbyist," Ding said, but added that "congressmen will be informed" of wildlife needs throughout the country. He reminded the conference that "congressmen would rather serve you than the other fellow, if you can show him where you can bring him more votes."

U.O. PREXY WILL BE SEATED THURSDAY

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Dr. Clarence Valentine Boyer will formally become sixth president of the University of Oregon at elaborate inaugural ceremonies here tomorrow.

Delegates representing colleges from all over the United States, educators from leading Pacific coast institutions, faculty members, students and citizens of Oregon will gather here for the occasion. The delegates and faculty members, clothed in caps and gowns representing their institutions and degrees, will participate in the impressive academic procession.

Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of higher education, will preside at the ceremony to be held at 2:30 p. m. in McArthur court. Dr. Monroe E. Deutsch, vice-president of the University of California, will deliver an address on behalf of institutions of higher education.

The university faculty will be represented by Dr. Rudolf H. Ernst and the Hon. Willard L. Marks, president of the state board of higher education, will speak on behalf of his group. Dr. Boyer will review past accomplishments of higher education and the Oregon state system in his inaugural address.

BETTER FIRE CUT SYSTEM ADVISED

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 5.—(AP)—Second growth Douglas fir in Oregon and Washington is being cut at the rate of about 3,000,000 feet a day, a survey by the forest service showed today.

From a forest management and economic standpoint the forest service says disadvantages in cutting thirty young growth stands at the time of their most rapid improvement in volume and quality while overripe and deteriorating old growth is left unharvested, the report stated.

As much of the Tillamook burn timber as possible should be salvaged before it becomes unmerchantable, it was pointed out.

"Second growth stands are the essential supply of timber which must be depended upon to maintain the lumber industry as the old growth stands are cut out and until a new crop is grown on the cut over lands," the report stated.

"To insure an adequate acreage of these second growth stands being available when needed, retention in-estate ownership such as state forests, or adjustment of economic conditions to encourage retention by private owners is highly desirable."

3-LAW REPEAL BILL PASSED BY HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—(AP)—The house today passed the senate-approved bill repealing the compulsory cotton, potato and tobacco control acts. Further senate action will be necessary, however, to enact the measure, which President Roosevelt requested only a few days ago. The house added an amendment to release from tax payments some 250,000 acres of cotton on which taxes were levied under the Bankhead act at time of signing, but not paid while the cotton has been held for marketing by farmers. The repeal action was suggested by President Roosevelt in the light of the supreme court's invalidation of AAA.
