

GUN CLUB URGES ROAD PROJECTS

Opening of Forest Road to Falls and Completion of Tiller Cutoff Desired.

DAYS CREEK, Feb. 7.—The forest service will endeavor to open the road to the South Umpqua falls in time for the early fishing this spring if at all possible, according to statements made to the South Umpqua Rod and Gun club by Jake Smith, assistant to A. E. Berry, Tiller district ranger. Monday evening at the club building at Canyonville.

Forest service officials, always working in perfect harmony with the South Umpqua sportsmen, have had the log jam in the river at the mouth of Ash creek removed, thus eliminating a serious obstacle to the upward passage of steelhead and chinook in the past several years. The attempt to open the road to the falls in time for the start of the fishing season in April, and the eventual opening of the road to year-round traffic are important steps in the joint sports and forest program.

A temporary deadline 400 feet below the South Umpqua falls as a protection to the spring run of steelhead and salmon is being requested of the state game commission by the club. This request is being placed on file this month in readiness for the game commission's session in March. It is the desire of the club to have this deadline maintained until a proper highway may be constructed around the falls.

After some discussion, the club unanimously adopted a resolution reaffirming its determination to continue working for the completion of the South Umpqua highway (Tiller-Trail road), which is now a secondary state highway. This action was considered advisable to set at rest rumors that action detrimental to the South Umpqua highway, for which the club has worked for more than ten years, had been contemplated by the club. The road committee, of which John Hamlin is chairman, was instructed to take any steps deemed advisable to see that this road gets its share of state highway funds for construction and maintenance as a secondary state highway.

NORRIS ADVISES OUSTER OF FARLEY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The prediction that "millions of votes" would be lost to President Roosevelt in the next election because of the system used in selecting postmasters was made on the senate floor today by Senator Norris (R., Neb.).

He coupled it with a new demand that James A. Farley resign as postmaster general because of his chairmanship of the democratic national committee.

Senator McKellar (D., Tenn.), hotly opposed Norris' views.

"We get infinitely better postmasters," McKellar asserted, his arms swinging, "by having congressmen appoint them than by having some one in Washington select them."

Norris advocates use of the merit system in naming postmasters.

Branding the present system of political appointments as "based on hypocrisy" and "entirely" wrong, Norris said:

"It is no secret that I supported President Roosevelt in 1932 and that I intend to support him again."

"Yet I think he can be justifiably criticized for not taking the right stand in this matter."

The Nebraska said that "one word" from Roosevelt could correct the situation and predicted that "his (Roosevelt's) road would be more thorny" as a result of continuation of the present arrangement.

"I think a man managing a campaign ought not to be postmaster general," Norris said.

DEMANDS PROBE OF TOWNSEND "PROD"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(AP)—An investigation of "intimidation" of representatives to support the Townsend old age pension movement was demanded in a resolution introduced today by Representative Zionscheck (D., Wash.).

It would authorize the speaker to name a seven-member committee to "investigate fully attempts to intimidate or influence members in behalf of a bill H. R. 7145 (the Townsend bill) or any other bills affecting old age pension schemes or rackets by which the dimes and dollars of the poor aged enrich the promoters."
