**BORAH MAY ENTER
OREGON PRIMARY**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Senator Borah of Idaho said today he is giving "serious thought" to entrance into the Oregon republican presidential primary May 15.

He told newsmen he had discussed the question with Senators McNary and Steiwer of that state, and thought that the attitude of Ralph Williams, Oregonian who is vice chairman of the republican national committee, was "friendly."

The Oregon primary comes three days after the Ohio contest, which Borah will enter.

Commenting on the Oregon situation, he said "I think we would win."

A willingness to campaign in Ohio for Borah was declared to newsmen by Senator Nye (R., N. D.).

"I want very much the opportunity to campaign in Ohio for Senator Borah," Nye said. "They know that I am ready to be at their service if they think I can be of assistance."

Nye said that he had not consulted Borah on the proposition.

The Idahoan has announced his intention to put a slate of delegates in the Ohio presidential primary.

and natural manner, but we do object to any governmental program which has for its purpose the payment of a subsidy to one group of farmers at the expense of another group engaged in an honest agricultural pursuit.

The report was signed by Representatives Anderson, Minn.; Kinner, Pa.; Tobey, N. Hamp.; Marshall, Ohio; Goodwin, N. Y.; Hope, Kan.; and Gilchrist, Iowa. Representative Holloman (Prog. Wis.) has filed a separate minority report objecting to the failure of the measure to stipulate that land taken out of production not be used for dairy or other production for sale.

The majority's report, by Chairman Jones (R., Tex.) emphasized that the AAA substitute was constitutional.

Acting in the Dark
Of the permanent program, the republicans said:
"It may be that the suggestions

embodied in the bill for a permanent program for agriculture are sound and desirable. However, since no hearings were held on these provisions of the bill, it is impossible for us or anyone to inform the house as to whether or not the proposed permanent program is acceptable to the farmers of the country or their representatives."

Insisting that "no makeshift legislation should be approved for the sake of political expediency," since "farm legislation is not a political proposition," the minority suggested four things that should be incorporated in a "well rounded and effective program:

"1. Repeal of reciprocal trade agreements. 2. Legislation to assure the American farmer full benefit of domestic market. 3. Tariff equalization benefits to the farmer. 4. Adequate appropriations for soil conservation and government purchase of marginal lands."

temperatures and a sharp east wind halted work today on a number of mid-Columbia work and construction projects.

The mercury dipped to 13 degrees last night. An inch or more of snow covered the ground.

The wind, and ice flowing in the Columbia river halted dredging work on the Celilo-Wallulah channel.

Work also was suspended on the Dalles port and on the over-head grade crossing near here. The cold weather earlier this week slowed construction work at Bon-neville power and navigation dam.

KLAMATH FALLS, Feb. 7.—(AP)—A bitter wind, sometimes sweeping a powdery snow ahead of it, blew over this region through most of the night.

Precipitation amounted to only a trace at Klamath Falls, and but little snow fell in surrounding areas. Two inches of snow was reported on Greensprings highway. The Dalles-California highway between here and Bend was icy and dangerous this morning.

BEND, Ore., Feb. 7.—(AP)—All main highways in central Oregon remained open to traffic today, despite the rising wind which caused snowdrifts in places.

The road between Bend and Burns was in excellent condition, state highway officers said.

the democratic national committee was brought into public discussion again when Representative Marcantonio (R., N. Y.), suggested sarcastically that the statue "Civic Virtue," now in City Hall park, New York, be erected "in front of the post office department" as a "memorial to that greater leader of democratic virtue."

The New Yorker said he would ask congress to appropriate money for the transfer of the statue because "they don't know what to do with it up there."

Budget Balance Demanded
Knox, in a Cincinnati address, attacked the administration's financing as "issuing paper bonds, payable in paper dollars, used to create paper credits which are drawn upon the treasury in the form of paper checks."

The publisher demanded stabilization, with "a balanced budget" as the first step. He declared he did not know why the dollar was devalued to 59 cents, but said he favored leaving it there because "more tinkering now, whether up or down, would only cause fresh perturbations, new uncertainties."

To questions as to whether he would do battle with Borah for the Ohio delegates, he replied, "I am not going to jump off the deep end. There will be no announcement today."

Dickinson accused the president of "vindictiveness." At a republican club dinner in Columbus, Ohio, he declared the new deal displays "a fundamental intolerance of spirit, a resentfulness of criticism, an impatience of opposition."

THE DALLES, Ore., Feb. 7.—(AP)—A driving snowstorm, low
