ICE BOX ROLLS

By Mrs. Charles Solomon - Impqua, Ore. 1 cup shortening, 1 cup boiling water, 2 cup sugar, Cream shortening, sugar and add boiling water, 2 Fleischmanns yeast cakes, 1 cup cold water, 2 eggs, 1 t. salt, 6 cups unsifted flour.

RECIPES

When first mixture is cold, add yeast cakes dissolved in cold water, then eggs beaten stiffly, add flour through sifter. Mix. Place in ice box. Roll and cut into tiny biscuits. Let raise two hours and bake in hot oven. This will keep several days.
