

Roseburg High Quintet Beats North Bend

RETURN OF SHORT STRENGTHENS TEAM

Brilliant Playing Enables Indians to Win Handily by 30 to 17 Score.

A hard driving offense gave the Roseburg senior high school Indians a 30 to 17 victory over North Bend in a conference basketball game played here last night. The driving formations under the basket were coupled with brilliant defensive work led by Hannerster and Baker, while Short, star from last year's squad, playing his first game of the present season, led the Indians offense, eliciting for 12 counters and high point honors.

The return of Short, who went out of the first of the year, caused Coach Paul Warren to work out a new combination, which promises to give excellent results. Baker went in at the forward position with Schermer in last night's game and played a beautiful defensive game, his speed breaking up many North Bend plays. Coupled with the steady and consistent defensive work of Hannerster this speedy floor work gave the Indians a defense which had the North Bend team tied up most of the time.

Short was also a great help in defensive play, through recovery off the back board.

Schermer and Short made an excellent offense combination, with the aid of Collins, who played a good passing game. The game was very rough with many personal fouls being called for charging, blocking and holding.

Roseburg took a 12 to 8 lead at half time and extending the margin to 28 to 13 at the third quarter.

Roseburg led 15 to 11 at the half and 19 to 16 at three-quarter time, but with only a few minutes to go Sutherlin opened a hard drive good for 13 points and a victory.

SHARKEY BEATEN BY TONY SHUCCO

BOSTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Jack Sharkey, former heavyweight boxing champion, missed defeat today at the second attempt on the comeback road as a result of his ten-round defeat by Tony Shucco, Boston Italian.

The former champion showed flashes of his former boxing skill, but tossed away all chances of victory by coasting through the first

five rounds. The judges' decision was unanimous. Two months ago Sharkey knocked out Eddie (unknown) Winston in his first battle toward another big time chance. The former champion, now 33, went into the ring at Boston garden weighing 198, less than when he was at his peak. Shucco was 163 pounds lighter and eight years younger. A crowd of 15,500 paid \$18,450 to see the fight.

One of those exhausted was Maj. E. B. Garey, head of the Maryland state police and leader of the relief expedition. Garey, along with Richard McCready of Crisfield and State Policeman C. A. Disney, was picked up unconscious on the ice and rescued by the Texas crew.

Before these men dropped in the battle with the storm, Edward L. Thompson, Salisbury amateur radio operator, and Officer Ernest L. Tillet of coast guard boat 174 had fallen into a hidden air hole in the ice. They pulled themselves out and were escorted back to Crisfield by six members of the relief party.

Thompson collapsed and was taken to a hospital but neither he nor Tillet appeared to have suffered serious injury.

The first objective of the relief party, propelling two sleds heavily loaded with provisions, was the Texas, anchored in an open stretch of water nearly midway to the island. The cutter was to put them across on the ice on the island side and they were to press on afoot.

GARCIA DECISIONS GORDON WALLACE

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Feb. 8.—(AP)—Catalino Garcia, little Los Angeles Filipino, pointed out a one-sided 10-round decision last night at the Legion stadium over Gordon Wallace, welterweight champion of Canada.

The 23-year old Vancouver, B. C. boxer, 147 pounds, was no match for the more experienced Garcia, and eked out a bare round and that by a slim margin.

It was the third meeting of the two. They boxed a ten-round draw in the first engagement and Garcia, after flooring Wallace in the first stanza, went on to win the decision after 12 rounds in the second fight.

He beat little time last night repeating his victory, shaking the Canadian in the first round with left jolts to the head.

HUSKIES, STANFORD LEAD HOOP PARADE

North Division Title Good as Settled but Race in South Undetermined.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The undefeated University of Washington Huskies and Stanford's Cardinals dominate the Pacific Coast conference basketball picture today.

Washington's string of eight victories indicated the Huskies would ride through unquestioned to the northern division championship.

But the southern division leaders are badly pressed by the Southern California Trojans and the fast-improving California Bears.

These two teams are tied for second place, only a game behind Stanford, California pulled U. S. C. down from a tie for divisional leadership with last night's thriller, when Ray Hulseby, Bear forward and spark plug, dropped in three baskets in the closing minutes to win 29 to 27.

Stanford's sharpshooters had no trouble winning 45 to 32 from the University of California at Los Angeles. The brilliant play of the Bruins' John "Blaster" Hall, with 19 points, stood out in individual play on the court.

In the only northern game, Washington State came from behind to win 46 to 33 from the last place Idaho quintet.

All three teams meet again to night while Corvallis and Oregon also climb into the picture.

Zero in Texas
The cold stretched southward into Oklahoma and Texas, sending the mercury from 43 above to one below at Oklahoma City overnight.

Violent drops in thermometer columns were noted over Texas, where a 50-mile wind drove a sled and snow storm over the panhandle in the wake of dust clouds. The temperature went to zero for the first time this winter in that state.

The mercury went up 12 points to 26 above at Chicago overnight—but the new cold was due to rage here by nightfall.

Because of the danger of coal shortage some central Illinois miners were working today, which is usually a holiday, but most miners in the south part of the state remained idle.

The weather bureau said the eastern coast could expect a brief moderation before the new chill jumps the Appalachians tomorrow. It was below zero in Virginia this morning, and Washington had only 4 above. New York state's temperatures ranged from 16 above at New York City to 18 below at Canton.

By the time New England—where the mercury stretched from zero at Northfield, Vt., to 14 above at Eastport, Me.—feels the storm, the northwest will have warmer weather.

In Iowa six trains were reported stalled in the snow today.

BAKER, 14 BELOW ZERO, OREGON'S COLDEST SPOT

(By the Associated Press)

"Fourteen below." An icy wind, cutting as a sabre, brought that low mark to Baker early today.

It was the lowest reading reported to the weather bureau of Portland from Oregon cities.

But at other Oregon points it was cold enough that shivering residents chattered the oft-heard words:

"This cold out here is damper and gets you worse than temperatures far lower in the middle-west."

And the cold will continue, with temperatures rising only slowly until some time Sunday, the weather bureau predicted.

Occasional snow or rain in northwest Oregon, and snow in northeast portion, was the forecast for tonight and tomorrow. A fresh to strong southeast wind off shore, with gales on the north coast, was predicted.

Southeast storm warnings were displayed at the Columbia river mouth and on the Washington coast.

Shorelines Frozen
The shore lines of the Columbia river were frozen in the mid-Columbia area, and the Maryhill ferries near The Dalles halted. The minimum temperature at The Dalles was six, and at Hood River it was the same. Some concern was expressed for strawberries.

The official minimum temperature in Portland today was 14 degrees. In outlying districts unofficial readings were as low as 10 or 12 degrees, and in the Council Crest heights six degrees.

The Willamette valley readings showed Salem at 16 and Eugene 18 at 5 a. m.

Walla Walla reported a temperature of four below and Umatilla two below. Bend reported 10 degrees and Arlington four above.
