FESS HANDS BORAH BATCH OF "MUSTS"

Idaho Senator's "Leanings" Toward New Deal Don't Please Ohioan.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The tilt between Senator Borah (R., Ida.) and Simeon D. Fess, former republican senator for Ohio, continued today, affording democratic leaders no small measure of delight.

The latest development was a statement, published today, in which Fess again implied that Borah had new deal leanings. The man chosen for the republican nomination must be one, he said, who had supported "more republican measures than democratic measures."

Borah, hearing that Fess had threatened to "take a walk" if the Idahoan won the presidential nomination, had challenged Fess to say what candidate he stood for and whether he favored the "old deal."

Democratic leaders maintained silence on the feud, but it was no secret that they were happy over it. Since Alfred E. Smith threatened to "take a walk" if the new deal were endorsed by the democratic convention, they have been hoping for similar signs of schism in the republican ranks.

The Borah-Fess argument was generally considered symbolic of Borah's differences with what he calls the "old guard."

Borah, in a statement Saturday, attacked the "favorite son" or unpledged state delegation plan and called for "open, candid" declarations by candidates for delegates as to their presidential choice. He said he understood Fess was for Herbert Hoover and challenged him to say so.

Fess denied this, but said he could be for Hoover without "having to make an apology."

Fess Outlines "Musts"
Fess outlined his ideas as to qualifications for a good nominee. "He must stand for the open door of opportunity for industry as against planned economy," he declared. "He must stand for private industry as against government competition in all industry. He must stand for sound money of a stabilized value as against the managed currency folly of irredeemable paper."

"He must permit a citizen to live his own life as against bureaucratic dictation from Washington. He must stand for the increased purchasing power for the increased cost of living through scarcity."

"He must stand for a protective tariff to preserve the home market for the American farmer and in the interest of the American laborer, as against the opening of that market for foreign importations."

Fess declared he would be "the happiest man" to support Borah if he would "stand for these things."

The former senator's stand for "sound money" was paralleled by a statement from Republican Chairman Henry P. Fletcher, who discussed what he termed "the evil influences of threatened inflation," and attacked the administration's fiscal policy.

Coughlin Heard From
Father Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio priest, devoted himself to the money question in his broadcast yesterday, declaring "sound money must be government money."

"Today we are suffering from deflation," he said, "not inflation, and we must put up with this nonsense about inflation. We are suffering from a financial heart disease and we must listen to the quack doctors diagnosing the malady of chills, as their real object is to protect and preserve their so-called sound money system which has done little else than breed depression and create want in the midst of plenty."

The priest also announced members of the house and candidates for congress are barred from membership in his national union for social justice.

Odds and Ends
In California the EPIC democrats awaited an answer today from President Roosevelt on a demand that the End Poverty League have a dominant voice in the California national convention delegation. They want the delegation picked from a list of 128 EPIC-compled names.

Other developments:
The American Liberty league issued a statement describing as "not only impractical, but utterly impossible" all "Utopian plans" for sharing the national wealth.

"Quack schemes for a redistribution of wealth threatened a destruction of both wealth and income," the league statement said. "Problems bearing on wealth and income remain to be solved but economic ills will not be cured by remedies of political medicine men."

The primary question remained an issue in Georgia, where the forces of a new deal foe, Governor Eugene Talmadge, control the state democratic executive committee. This committee is expected to decide next month whether there will be a presidential preference primary.

The Roosevelt campaign committee, headed by Marion Allen, met in Atlantic today to start its state drive. Allen demands a primary.

STAR BREWERY SAFE LOOTED BY "YEGGS"

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 10.—(AP)—Safe-crackers broke into the storeroom of the Star Brewery Distributing company here during the night and escaped with cash estimated by company officials to total \$4,100.

Stowe Devine, office manager, said the robbers smashed the combination of the cabinet type safe, stole all cash inside, and then took an additional \$338 from a locked filing cabinet. Devine said the loss was covered by insurance.

CAPONE AND KELLY NOT IN RIOT GROUP

Took No Part in Alcatraz Mutiny; 2 Others Still on Hunger Strike.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The Examiner said today Al Capone and George "Machine Gun" Kelly refused to join in the rioting of America's most dangerous convicts at the recent outbreak in Alcatraz island federal penitentiary.

The Examiner said it had learned from a source it did not disclose, the riot January 20 was far more serious than prison authorities had indicated and its aftermath continued today in the hunger strike of two of the leaders.

Among the leaders, the newspaper said, were Norman T. Whitaker, convicted with Gaston Means in the Lindbergh ransom hoax, Ludwig "Dutch" Schmidt, Roger Touhy, gang gunman involved in the John Factor kidnapping; Harmon Waley, kidnaper of 9-year old George Wechsauer, and John Paul Chase, lieutenant of the late "Baby Face" Nelson.

The riot started after the death of Jack Allen, a prisoner, who had been refused hospital treatment because of his frequent appearance on the sick list when there was no evidence of any ailment. The Examiner said he died after an operation for a stomach ailment. The prison announcement attributed his death to pneumonia.

When workers in the laundry, where the worst criminals are assigned, quit work, the newspaper said Capone remained at his post despite cries of "yellow rat."

Others who refused to join the outbreak, the story said, were Kelly and two of his associates in the kidnapping of Charles F. Urschel—Harvey Bailey and Albert L. Bates.

So many men were sent to the dungeon in the guards' efforts to stop the screaming and howling prisoners set up when locked in their cells, that the newspaper said, the warden ordered eight more cells built in the dungeon.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel for Raymond Burk, 25, who died Sunday at the state hospital in Salem.

Surviving are four brothers, Roy and Fred Burks, Coos Junction, and H. R. and Victor Burk of San Francisco. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Bernice Fields, San Jose, Calif., and Bertha Kent, Lakeview, Ore.

The funeral services will be conducted by Rev. J. Frank Cunningham, and interment will take place in the Civil Bend cemetery.

LINCOLN DAY TO BE HOLIDAY IN OREGON

SALEM, Feb. 10.—(AP)—Wednesday, Lincoln's birthday anniversary, is a legal holiday in Oregon.

All state offices, county offices, postoffices and banks will be closed in the state on that date, officials here announced.

State liquor stores will be open on that date, unless a special ruling by the commission closes the doors. The statute does not provide for the closing on Washington's birthday.

RECIPES

ORANGE MARMALADE
By Martha W. Paul
Tennille, Ore.
6 medium size oranges
2 lemons
1 grapefruit
4 cups of sugar
2 grapefruit

Method: Slice very thin, being careful to not get any seeds in. Measure fruit and add three cups of cold water for each cup of fruit. Set away for 24 hours. Set on stove and bring to boil slowly and boil 15 minutes. Set aside 24 hours longer, then measure again and add equal number of cups of sugar. Boil again until it will tell. Pour into jars or glasses.

This makes from four to five quarts according to the size of fruit used. Never use more than two lemons and do not use chopper to cut up the fruit.
