

LINCOLN'S BLOOD STAIN TO BE SHOWN

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. — (AP)—A bit of wallpaper, stained brown, will go on exhibition at a midtown hotel Wednesday, Abraham Lincoln's birthday; the stain is the blood of the Civil war president.

As Lincoln lay fatally wounded at the hands of the assassin Booth, April 14, 1865, blood splattered on a wall of the box the president occupied at Ford's theater in Washington, and the preserved wallpaper has been handed down to three granddaughters of a one-time governor of Washington.

The owners, Mrs. Mary Pickering Stever and the Misses Martin and Catherine Pickering, descendants of Gov. William Pickering, lent it to the Lincoln hotel for exhibition.

Also on display will be the famous Mary Todd Lincoln watch, a gift purchased by the then young Lincoln to whom the white house could have been no more than an idle dream.

A lovers' quarrel prevented presentation of the watch by Lincoln, and shortly afterward he gave it to Mary N. Curtiss, a Louisville, Ky., belle, without changing the original inscription, "To Mary Todd from A. L. 1841."

William Pickering was territorial governor of Washington from 1862 until 1866. He was appointed by President Lincoln.

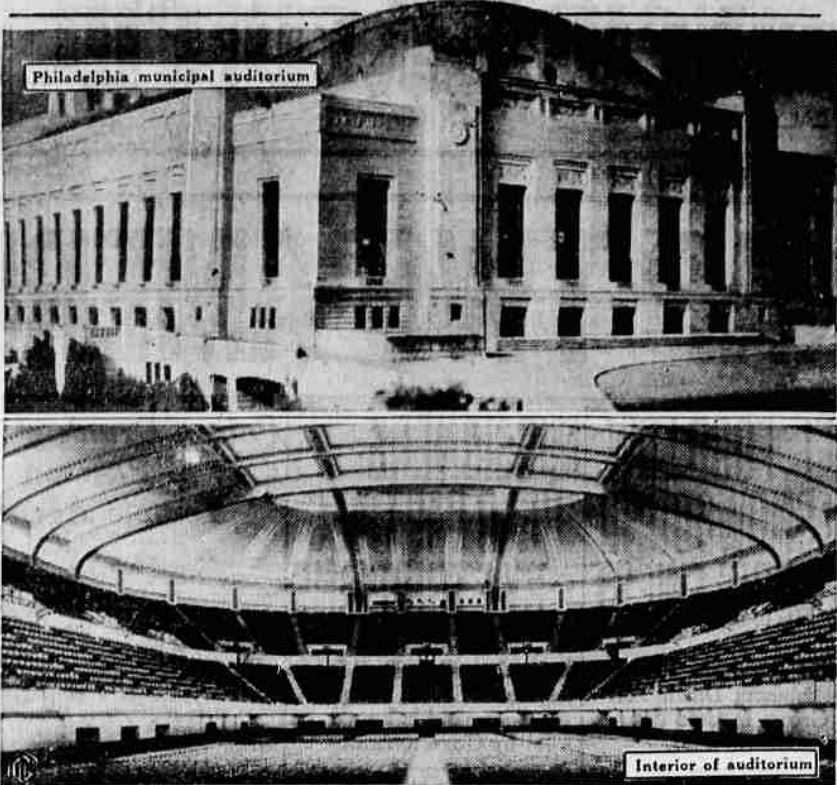
CAMAS VALLEY

The address marked the first time in Birthday Ball history that the Chief Executive spoke to the nation previous to a birthday ball, urging support for the benefits to raise funds for a nation-wide war on infantile paralysis. Col. Henry L. Doherty, chairman of the National Committee, presided at the Waldorf dinner, attended by nearly one hundred of the nation's leaders. A million of Americans listened in.

PACIFIC DEFENSE BILL INTRODUCED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The army's five-year program for modernizing Pacific coast harbor defenses, particularly in California, was started on its way today with introduction in the house of the war department appropriation bill.

Long-range guns and anti-aircraft installations are among the major projects the army plans to undertake on the west coast, the subcommittee was told by Major General Paul B. Malone, commander of the ninth corps area.

General Malone said with existing facilities the army could fulfill "only a part" of its accepted mission of denying the important harbors of San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego to an enemy.

Malone said the "next important need" of the west coast was anti-aircraft guns.

Approved plans of the war department, he said, "contemplate assigning additional mobile anti-aircraft regiments for the Pacific coast in time of war, and installing in the harbor defenses in time of peace certain fixed anti-aircraft guns."

General Malone said Puget Sound's inner harbor already was "effectively closed by the installations now in position." For the Columbia river he said it was "necessary only to reinforce existing installations."

"Any additional defense of the Columbia river can be furnished," he said, "by mobile artillery which can be moved rapidly to any point along the river where it might be needed."
