STATE'S FARM TAX POWER IS UPHELD

PORTLAND, Feb. 10. (AP)—Federal Judge John H. McNary held in a memorandum opinion today that the amended farm bankruptcy laws are void insofar as they affect the right of the state to collect taxes on farms. He refused an injunction to Elmer P. and Stella Dodd, Umatilla county farmers, who sought to enjoin the sheriff of Umatilla county from selling their lands for taxes due. Judge McNary stated the principle first voiced by Alexander Hamilton, that the federal government cannot interfere with the states in collection of taxes necessary to their existence.

The Dodds had filed an action under section 75 of the amended farm bankruptcy laws permitting extension and composition of farmers' debts. They asked the injunction pending adjudication of their debtors' petition.

Federal Judge McNary said "that part of section 75 of the bankruptcy act which attempts to empower the courts to enjoin proceedings for the collection of taxes is void."

The opinion did not touch on the validity of the other subdivisions of the farm bankruptcy laws.

JAPS AND RUSSIANS CONTINUE CLASHES

MOSCOW, Feb. 11. (AP)—A soviet news dispatch from Urumchi, outer Mongolia, charged today that Japanese and Manchoukuo troops were being concentrated along the outer Mongolian border in preparation for "new and more serious provocations."

The eastern border of Russia, where it touches Manchoukuo, has been the scene of repeated clashes in recent months with numerous casualties.

Premier Gendun of Mongolia recently returned to Urumchi after conferring with soviet officials in Moscow. While here, he declared in a newspaper interview that the Mongolians expect the soviet union to come to their assistance in case they are the victims of aggression.

A dispatch telling of a new border fight was published today. It said the trouble occurred Sunday near the Mongolian frontier post of Bulun Derasu when six truckloads of Japanese and Manchoukuo soldiers penetrated six

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miles into Mongolia.

The dispatch said the alleged invaders were driven back by the fire of Mongolian troops. No casualties were mentioned.

The dispatch stated: "Japanese militarists are continually provoking border clashes, invading the territory of the Mongolian peoples republic sometimes as much as 15 miles, attacking border posts, and destroying frontier signs."

CHICAGO, Feb. 8. (AP)—Ruth Slenczynski, 11 years old, hailed on both sides of the Atlantic as a wonder child at the piano, today heard her father describe her as a deliberate attempt to produce a musical genius.

After the Polish-born father, Josef Slenczynski, a violinist, returned to his adopted America from the World war wounded, he said he realized his own active musical career was ended. He deliberately determined, he

said in an interview, to marry and have a child who should "carry on" under his teaching.

The qualifications he sought in a prospective mother included: 1. She should be sturdy and healthy that the child might have strong hands, wrists, lungs and heart he deemed necessary for a strenuous musical career.

2. She should be non-musical, or at least not musically trained, as he intended to have charge of the child's education.

3. She had to be a non-career woman, content with home and children.

4. And she had to be a good cook. He said he found this combination in a New York stenographer of Polish descent, who became Mrs. Dorothy Slenczynski. Ruth, named for Slenczynski's mother, was born in Sacramento, Calif.

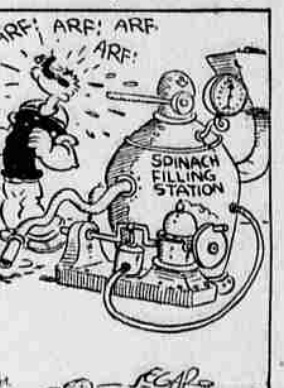

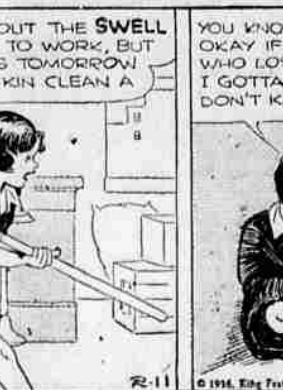
