For the wife or girl friend who deemed herself neglected there was a warning card: "If you keep on being indifferent, you'll find me in other arms." RIVAL ARMIES CLASH IN MANCHU REGION

TOKYO, Feb. 12—(AP)—A detachment of Japanese and Manchoukuan soldiers was reported today to have defeated a group of 100 Mongolians in a battle of several hours at Olahudka, southwest of Lake Bor.

The clash, as reported by the Manchukuo News agency, was on the largest scale of any which have recently taken place between the soviet-advised Mongolians and the Japanese-controlled Manchoukuan.

The report did not give details other than to say the Mongolians were compelled to evacuate Olahudka. There was no indication as to what casualties there may have been.

Olahudka is in disputed territory. The Mongols claim it is in outer Mongolia while the Japanese claim it is in Manchoukuo.

A Manchoukuan outpost was established there but was driven out by the Mongols on Jan. 26. The Japanese-Manchoukuan column reported victorious in today's engagement was sent from Hallar for the specific purpose of recapturing Olahudka and expelling the Mongols.

Friction along the northeastern corner of China where outer Mongolia, Manchoukuo, and soviet Russia meet, has been increasing for months.

The republic of China lost Manchoukuo when the Japanese established the empire of Manchoukuo in that area and lost outer Mongolia when the Mongolians declared themselves an independent soviet state.

In the one case, Chinese charged Japanese imperialists with conquest, and, in the other case, charged Russian communists with penetration.

Japan, on record as the foe of communism, meets soviet Russia and soviet Mongolia at the ill-defined frontier of northeast Manchoukuo.

A number of border incidents with losses of lives already have been reported.

POSTAL EMPLOYEES GET FRESH "BREAK"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11—(AP)—The postoffice department said today it planned to "wipe off all 'demerits' against postal employees and start afresh on a new system to "give the man a break."

Postal officials said the new system is aimed at:

"Eliminating the human element in rating postal employees."

"Giving the man a chance to wipe out his demerits with merits."

"Separating the demerits from the efficiency rating, so that one or two 'unfortunate incidents' will not ruin a man's efficiency record."

Postmasters were recently ordered to cancel all demerits as of March 31, and start with the new merit-demerit system.

Under the old system, each demerit was cancelled at the end of 12 months after being covered in to the employees' efficiency rating.

Under that system, a man having 500 demerits in a year was subject to a reduction in pay. A man having 700 demerits in a year might be removed.

Under the new system, the demerits will be kept separate from the efficiency rating, and the man will be given an opportunity to offset with demerits, starting anew at the beginning of every fiscal year.

FARMER-LABORITE LAUNCHES 3RD PARTY

ST. PAUL, Feb. 12—(AP)—A national-third party drive to reach a climax in 1940 was launched today by Howard Y. Williams, national organizer of the Farmer-Labor political federation, who named Senator Gerald P. Nye (R., N. D.) as a desirable presidential candidate for such an organization.

The new party, for which he recommended Minnesota farmer-laborites and Wisconsin progressives as leaders, possibly could elect 75 congressmen, Williams said in a formal statement, and thus swing the balance of power.

Williams, home from a month's organization and speaking trip in the east, said a new party could carry Minnesota, Wisconsin, Oregon, Washington, Oklahoma and at least 750,000 votes in California in 1936.

"Anything can happen by next November," he said. "We may win in 1936 and will certainly win in 1940."
