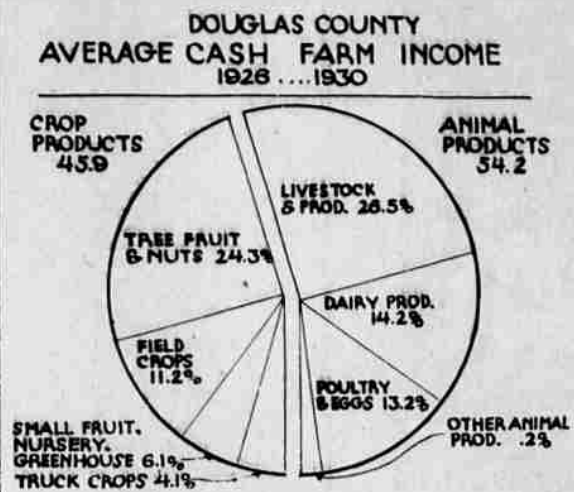

BALANCED PRODUCTION SHOWN IN FARM CHART FOR DOUGLAS

Data on Crop Yields and Income Prepared for Conference on Agricultural Economic Outlook Scheduled to be Held in Roseburg February 18 and 19.

The above chart shows the basic information on past agricultural income for Douglas county which will be considered by the farmers during the Agricultural Outlook Economic conference, to be held at the I. O. O. F. hall in Roseburg, February 18 and 19. The chart is divided into two general divisions showing the relationship of all crop products to all animal products, this accounting for the continuous blank space between the two sections.

Douglas county's average annual agricultural income for the period of 1926 to 1930, was \$3,824,000.00, according to figures just released by the agricultural extension service of the state college, working in cooperation with commodity committees preparing for the agricultural economic outlook conference to be held in the I. O. O. F. hall in Roseburg, on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 18 and 19. All crop products contributed 45.9 per cent of the total income, and all animal products 54.2 per cent.

Tree fruits and nuts provided the major portion of the incomes for all crops with 24.3 per cent, field crops followed with 11.2 per cent, with small fruits, nurseries, greenhouses, etc., with 6.1 per cent and truck crops making 4.1 per cent of the total. Livestock and their products provided 26.5 per cent of the total income, poultry and eggs 13.2 per cent, dairy products 14.2 per cent and other products 2 per cent.

Balanced Condition Shown.

All crop products provides nearly fifty per cent of the average annual agricultural income of the county and shows a balanced condition in Douglas county farm enterprises, says County Agent J. Roland Parker. Diversification and production of both crops and livestock on a majority of farms in Douglas county has enabled producers over the county as a whole to come through the depression years better than in many sections of the country.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Representative Josh Lee, bachelor of arts, doctor of laws and Oklahoma democrat, took exception today to an anti-love code prescribed for college students here.

He deplored the fact that the American university lovers' marks had fallen, but he did think their whole-hearted devotion was a good sign.

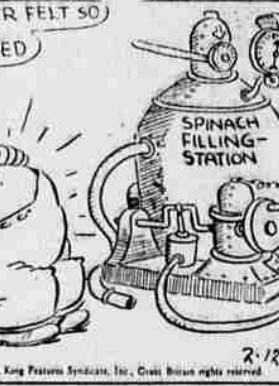
"There was a campus couple down at our school," he said, "who were just as much in love as anyone, only they didn't know it. They were trying to be blasé about it."

"I told someone I'd marry them," the girl replied, "was it you?"

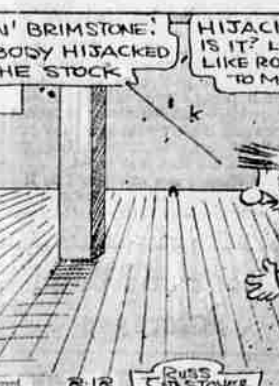
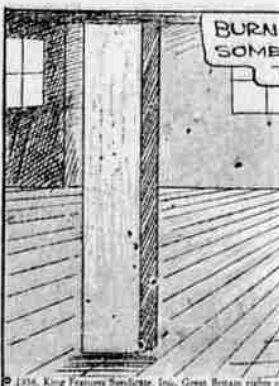
