NEW CLASH WIDENS JAP-SOVIET RIFT

North China Situation Gets Nearer Open War With Latest Episode.

TOKYO, Feb. 12.—The Manchoukuo government took a most grave view of the latest border clash with soviet-influenced outer Mongolia, a Domei (Japanese) news agency said today, especially since the enemy allegedly used bombing planes.

The dispatch from Hanking, capital of the Japanese-adviced state of Manchoukuo, quoting a spokesman for the Manchoukuo foreign office, said the encounter yesterday at Olahodka was the most serious thus far of the past year's foreign incidents.

Military reports from the border confirmed reports that planes attempted to bomb the Japanese-Manchoukuo column involved, but failed to inflict casualties, the dispatch said.

Accounts differed as to whether two or three planes took part in the engagement, and as to whether they were Russian or outer Mongolian.

War Minister Kawashima proclaimed Japanese concern over a vast alleged concentration of soviet military power in far eastern Siberia, close to the frontiers of Manchoukuo.

Warning Voiced

General Kawashima disavowed any intention by the Japanese army to take a military initiative against Russia, after the most serious in a long series of Manchoukuo-outer Mongolia border incidents was reported, he said:

"If events move in such a way as to compel us to change this attitude, we must do what we can to cope with the situation."

In view of the situation in Manchoukuo and north China, the war minister told the Associated Press, "some reinforcement of Japanese forces seems necessary" in the regions involved in international tension.

Soviet Russia has concentrated in eastern Siberia a number of troops equal to the entire Japanese army on a peace-time basis, he charged, while on the Manchoukuo side of the border, the Japanese army has made few reinforcements.

The Tokyo war office had estimated the soviet far eastern forces previously at a quarter of a million men, 800 airplanes and 650 tanks.

Would Avert Crisis

Although the dispatches from Manchoukuo indicated increasing tension and militarist demands for action on a larger scale against outer Mongolia and soviet Russia, the Tokyo government leaders—even the military—seemed anxious to localize the incidents and to avert a crisis.

Vernacular newspapers said Prime Minister Keisuke Okada promised full support to Foreign Minister Koki Hirota in efforts to prevent the Russo-Japanese friction from attaining the proportion of war.

War Minister Kawashima asserted Japan still desired peaceful relations with outer Mongolia, which has special relations with Russia, despite the numerous border clashes.

BOWERS-HICKMAN BOUT TO BE WARM

Guy Hickman and Speed Bowers, Roseburg lightweights, are expected to give boxing fans a real show on the card to be presented Saturday at Glendale. The bout will be the 8-round headliner of a fast card arranged by D. O. "Tex" Broadlove, Canyonville, matchmaker.

Hickman and Bowers each hold a decision in their two previous meetings and their third bout Saturday night will give one or the other an edge, unless the battle goes to a draw.

Hickman lost a decision to Bowers in a six-round battle at Grants Pass, but won by a substantial margin in an 8-round slugfest at Canyonville later.

Bowers, who is now employed at the Bradford City camp, has shown much improvement over his fighting days in Roseburg a few years ago, and has considerable weight advantage over Hickman, who, on the other hand, is much more experienced than Bowers and a more clever and scientific boxer.

M'NARY EVASIVE ON TOWNSEND QUERY

RUGENE, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Eviding a definite stand on the Townsend plan, Oregon's Senator Charles L. McNary drew strong disapproval from 700 Townsendites gathered here for the first congressional district convention today.

In reply to the question "what is your stand on the Townsend plan," McNary replied that he favored a better law than the present one and would support "any suitable plan that can be enacted into legislation." His letter pointed out that he did not know in what form the plan would reach the senate, as it must originate in the house.

Townsend leaders have declared that if Senator McNary refused to take a definite stand in favor of the plan, they would "sacrifice" him in favor of a Townsendite. They indicated a candidate would be put into the field to seek his position in the senate if he failed to support the movement.

No plan of action has been announced, however, as no official endorsement can be made till the new advisory board is selected. This board must pass on all candidates before they can receive Townsend support. The state board and finally the national board must then pass on the candidates.

TWO HOOP GAMES SET HERE FRIDAY

Roseburg basketball fans are assured of good entertainment Friday night in the doubleheader basketball program at the junior high school gymnasium.

The Roseburg and Medford junior high school teams, and the 8th grade teams from the two towns will play, the first game being scheduled to start at 7:30 o'clock.

This will be the first game for the local 8th graders, but Coach "Red" Turner, who has been working the youngsters hard this week, promises they will give a good performance.

The junior high team, which started from scratch this year, none of the players having had previous experience, has been showing improvement in each game, and hopes to be able to give the Medfordites a real battle.

The pep band and "Howling Hundred" will be in attendance at the game to lend encouragement to the home team.

PARTNER OF DEAD FIGHTER IS HELD

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 12.—Lorenzo "Pete" Pedro, 21-year-old professional fighter, was booked on a charge of manslaughter today after the death of his sparring partner, Eddie Kimm, 24.

Kimm died yesterday in a hospital after collapsing in the ring from a blow under the heart. The two San Franciscans were wearing the big 12-ounce training gloves.

Kimm fought here several years ago as an amateur, but records do not show he appeared either in the amateur or professional ring in the last two years.

Aerial "Hindenburg" Line Seen Menacing France From Frontiers of the Rhineland

PARIS (AP)—France's general staff is credited with seeing an aerial "Hindenburg line" menacing the Rhineland frontiers.

Army observers report a double line of more than 50 modern military airbases has been strung from Switzerland to the North Sea on the edge of the Rhineland demilitarized zone.

Beginning at Friedrichshafen on the Swiss border, the lines extend northward to converge at Kloppeburg near the Dutch frontier. A single line runs from there to Bokun Island in the North Sea.

Even from the second line, French observers say, German bombing planes could easily reach French territory within an hour.

It is believed the double line of airbases is Germany's answer to France's great system of steel and concrete frontier fortifications.

Most of the airports, it is reported, are equipped with subterranean hangars and can accommodate 100 fighting planes. They are provided with repair shops, living quarters for pilots and mechanics, and gas-proof shelters in case of reprisal raids.

While French observers realize the airports are not constructed in the demilitarized zone and therefore do not violate the Locarno and Versailles treaties, they do believe that Nazi Germany is prepared to send troops into the zone at a moment's notice.

Three Allies Concerned

The three German army corps which occupied the district before 1914 have been reconstituted, it is reported, and are being trained in the interior of Germany. But in a few hours, it is believed, they could march into the zone and find administrative framework and barracks there to receive them.

Under the Locarno pact such an occupation would constitute "aggression" and England, Belgium and Italy would be obliged to march to France's assistance.

France puts great importance on the demilitarized zone to help her in case of war with Germany. Although modern motorized units could overcome the handicap of the demilitarized zone in a few hours, French army officials believe it would take Germany from 24 to 36 hours to cross the zone with its heavy guns, an important delay in the lightningfast warfare of the future.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12.—(AP)—President E. J. Scheffer of the Portland Coast League baseball club said today that most of his players have signed contracts or come to terms.

Tom Flynn, southpaw pitcher bought from Sacramento, sent back one contract which increased his salary over last year.

Negotiations have been resumed with outfielder Moose Claybaugh, bespectacled ball-cloutin' star who said he would continue in his winter job unless his contract is sweetened.

Herman Breffs, southpaw chucker, bought conditionally from St. Joseph, said he would wait until reaching camp before signing.

Players who have returned signed contracts or come to agreement are Johnny Frederick, outfielder who batted .347 in average, who was bought from Sacramento; Bill Sweeney, first baseman from Baltimore; Fred Bedore, third sacker from Indianapolis; Catcher Bill Cronin; Utility Man Goldie Holt; Outfielder Nino Bougiouanni, and Pitchers Duth Ulrich and Bill Poseidel.

Flynn, Breffs, Radonits and Dick Schulz indicated they would come to camp before signing. George Caster, pitcher, who returns from the Philadelphia Athletics, has not signed yet.

The shortstop position has yet to be plucked. Manager Max Bilechop from the Philadelphia Athletics is slated to fill the second base post.


