## ROYALIST GROUPS BANNED IN FRANCE

PARIS, Feb. 13.—(AP)—President Lebrun issued a decree today disbanding all militant royalist organizations in France.

The president's drastic action followed an emergency session of the cabinet called by Premier Albert Sarraut.

The governmental action came hard on the heels of the royalist-socialist disturbances which began early in the day with a group of young "king's henchmen" beating up Deputy Leon Blum, socialist party leader.

Socialist deputies threatened the life of the Sarraut government. Younger socialists threatened direct reprisals against royalists, suggesting they might wreck royalist headquarters and the royalist newspaper, L'Action Francaise, of which Leon Daudet is editor.

Blum was attacked in a taxicab. He was hit over the head with a cane and injured sufficiently to be taken to a hospital.

Other socialist deputies, angered by the attack, voted to abstain from parliamentary action until President Sarraut dissolved the royalist organization, L'Action Francaise, of which the king's henchmen body is the youth movement.

The Sarraut government is dependent upon the good will of the socialists, who control a large proportion of the seats in the chamber of deputies.

The socialists charged that Mme. Georges Monnet, the wife of a socialist deputy, was also struck. She was riding in the taxi with her husband and Blum.

WAR LOOMS, SAYS  
SPEAKER AT ROTARY

The world at the present time is dominated completely by the seven great powers, Harry Stone, world traveler of Portland, told the Roseburg Rotary club yesterday. Four of these great powers—Great Britain, France, Russia and the United States—are contented with present territorial limits, he said, while Japan, Germany and

Italy are restless and seek outlets for their growing populations.

The speaker, well versed in world opinions, gave his opinion that nearly the entire world is right on the verge of war; any small spark or fire can touch off major conflict. He described the Italian campaign in Ethiopia as a minor conflagration which might ignite the "powder keg."

Mr. Stone is a Rotarian and has visited Rotary clubs in various countries. The Rotary club and the Y. M. C. A. are the two outstanding influences toward peace existing in the world today, he said.
