MURDER ALLEGED IN AUTO TRAGEDY

Siskiyou Prosecutor Acts to Extradite and Raps Klamath "Powers."

YREKA, Calif., Feb. 17.—(AP)—After having denounced what he described as "the big political powers in Klamath Falls, Oregon," Siskiyou county prosecutor today against two men accused of having caused the death of another by an automobile.

Last Saturday Davis said he would enter murder charges today against Maynard Smith and French Johnson, previously accused of negligent homicide in connection with the death of Elmer Rock, Tule lake farmer. Rock was killed last December when he was run down by a car.

"I'll be damned," Davis said, "if Oregon politicians can affect justice being done in Siskiyou county, and I'm going to push this case if it takes the whole resources of the state."

He declared the "big political powers in Klamath Falls, Oregon," have attempted to hide Maynard Smith as a fugitive from justice. Extradition papers have been obtained to bring him over the line. Smith was arrested at Klamath Falls Saturday after Sheriff Shander of Siskiyou county had gone there.

District Attorney Davis said that at a preliminary hearing into the case at Dorris, Calif., French and Johnson shed very little light on the situation, and it was not made clear who had been driving the car or whether the driver was intoxicated.

The trial on the manslaughter charges had been set for tomorrow and it was not known whether the date would be affected by the filing of murder complaints today.

MOTHER OF MRS. COATS TO REMAIN

TENMILE, Feb. 17.—Mrs. Minnie Baker of Los Angeles, who was called here recently by the illness and death of her daughter, Violet August Coats, plans to remain in Douglas county for several months.

Mrs. Coats died here recently at the age of 27 years. She was born December 25, 1908, and leaves her father, Jess Baker, Seattle, her mother, and three sisters, Peggy Marcum, Los Angeles; Edna Jones, Los Angeles and Edith Lloyd, New Mexico.

Mrs. Baker, who resided in Roseburg for a number of years, has been residing in California for the past eight years, but came here several weeks ago when her daughter became ill. She will visit indefinitely at Oakland and other points in Douglas county.

NEW QUEEN OF MILK PRODUCERS NAMED

SEATTLE, Feb. 17.—(AP)—Carnation Ormsby Butter King, which cow owned near here, was proclaimed the new world's champion when the Holstein-Friesian Association of America approved her year's record of 38,606.6 pounds of milk (1,402.02 pounds of butterfat—the equivalent of 1,752.5 pounds of butter).

She broke the 1925 record of the Canadian cow, Dekol Plus Sigis Dixie, who produced 1,544 pounds of butterfat, and the 1920 record of Segis Pieterje Prospect, who produced 37,381 pounds of milk.
