ICY GRASP STILL CLUTCHES OREGON

More sub-zero cold struck the midcontinent today, hampering the month-long fight against piling snow.

Twenty to thirty below zero temperatures froze the faces of snow plow and shovel crews bent on rescuing imprisoned communities or farm homes.

The zero belt extended as far south as Memphis, and was spreading over the Atlantic seaboard.

Many new cold marks were established.

Not since 1871, when records were begun here, had Chicago seen as cold a 24-day period as when today's temperature sank to 15 below.

Although some moderation was predicted for tonight and tomorrow in most southern and some of the central parts of the north central states, the mercury was expected to remain far below normal.

The lowest reading reported was 16 below at Little Falls, Minn., its all-time low.

North Texas shivered at 8 to 10 above, a winter low. Some fear was felt for citrus crops. Tulsa, Okla., passed its 30th day of below-freezing temperatures breaking a 24-year record.

Detroit awoke to an 8 below temperature, the coldest Feb. 18 in the 51 years of records.

Traffic Delayed

More snow delayed trains and busses from one to three hours in northern New York. Niagara falls was locked in ice.

Fires broke out in various places. At Lorain, Ohio, 65 guests in a hotel were routed. Five homes in the street as 25 fire companies fought a \$100,000 blaze in a Detroit food plant. The firemen used acetylene torches to thaw out frozen couplings.

Mayor A. W. Thompson of Prairie du Chien, Wis., said he planned to confiscate coal and wood, if necessary, after closing schools to conserve fuel.

With most of the midwest's drifts slithering in bright sunlight, some of the new cold wave's temperatures were these: Antigo, Wis., 27 below; Milwaukee, minus 16; Jamestown, N. D., 17 below; Louisville, Ky., 7 below; Kansas City, minus 6; Cleveland, zero; Columbus and Cincinnati, 7 below.

SNOW-TRAPPED MISSOURI COMMUNITY GIVEN HELP

HATFIELD, Mo., Feb. 18.—(AP)—There was plenty of food in snow-trapped Hatfield today for the first time in a month.

But the small northern Missouri community remained a virtual prisoner of winter, cut off from the outside world by mountainous drifts of snow and ice blocking every roadway approach to the town.

A week's supply of plain foodstuffs was trucked across the caked snow by horse drawn bolsters yesterday in a 10-hour battle against a strong north wind, blowing in sub-zero weather.

The anxiety of residents, sharpened as shelves in the town's two stores gradually emptied, gave way to shouts of relief as the first of the four sleds creaked into town. It bore flour, sugar, rice, beans and kerosene for village stores, cold since the usual supply gave out three weeks ago.

Able bodied men of the town had spent ten hours driving the sleds six miles. In places they encountered snow drifts 20 feet deep.

Today, with food in the homes they headed out of town again, this time to chop down trees for fuel. The town's coal supply was exhausted a month ago. Since then people have burned shade trees, scrub wood and even floorings to protect themselves against the zero weather.

Neighborhood farmers were worse off than the villagers. One farmer reported 25 head of cattle had died of cold and hunger. George Heiden, with 100 head of cattle, had two truckloads of hay brought to within a few miles of his place yesterday, but it was impossible to reach the snow-bound farm.

PROHIBITION TO LAUNCH TICKET IN OREGON

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 18.—(AP)—The prohibition party of Oregon prepared to launch a slate of candidates today.

Preliminary work of organizing the group was completed yesterday, although the meeting did not draw the 200 required to receive recognition on the ballot.

Twenty-six persons were present. Edward E. Blake of Chicago, national chairman of the prohibition party, said another convention would be called or the party would seek recognition by petition.

Delegates passed a resolution to "place the (prohibition) party on the ballot in this state so that the dregs of Oregon will not be disfranchised." The resolution declared the major parties had forfeited the support of believers in prohibition.

FOUR BUILDINGS AT HOOD RIVER BURN

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Feb. 18.—(AP)—Loss estimated by the fire bureau at \$40,000 was caused here today when fire swept through four buildings in the downtown section.

Firemen, their clothing and hair frozen stiff and festooned with ice by the 10-degree weather, fought the flames for three hours before bringing the fire under control.

Eleven residents of an apartment house escaped safely through the dense smoke. They lost clothing and personal effects.
