ONE HEAD FOR ALL POWER UNITS URGED

Recommendation Filed for Northwest Plants and Other Projects.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—(AP)—The Pacific northwest regional planning commission recommended today creation of a single federal agency to market and distribute power from the Grande Coulee, Bonneville and other similar projects.

The commission's findings were transmitted to the president by Secretary Ickes, chairman of the national resources board.

The commission disregarded state lines and conceived of a federal authority functioning for the benefit of the Pacific northwest as a whole.

It recommended early legislation by congress creating a federal corporation or agency somewhat different from the Tennessee valley authority.

The commission defined the Pacific northwest as "an unusually coherent sub-national region" embracing Washington, Oregon, Idaho and western Montana.

Adoption of a general plan of power and public works development for the region was advocated with all functions except the marketing and transmission of power remaining in the hands of existing agencies such as the reclamation bureau and war department.

Authority Outlined

In recommending a power authority different from the TVA, the commission concluded a federal corporation to market and distribute Columbia river power "should not be financially burdened with other types of service which were incapable of direct self-support."

The corporation would have authority to design, construct and maintain transmission lines, inter-

connect plants, exchange power with public and private plants, develop markets, sell power at wholesale with contractual requirements assuring rates to consumers reflecting the "economies in generation and transmission," regulate release of water from federal reservoirs subject to state rights and irrigation needs.

The federal agency would be empowered to specify the maximum resale rates of any distributor buying all or a major portion of its energy from the corporation.

The corporation's board would consist of three or five members named by the president with the consent of the senate. It would have power to issue federal securities, to pay state taxes in proportion to those paid by similar private enterprises, and give public and non-profit agencies priority in purchases of power.

Physical operation of the Grande Coulee and Bonneville projects would be delegated to the reclamation bureau and army engineers respectively.

With these objectives, the commission said, "we believe every public and private agency, relevant to the enterprise, in the whole Pacific northwest, can be marshaled to cooperate in an undertaking of such magnitude, and thus insure its complete and unqualified success."

Ten Dams Requested

The commission recommendations were based on the chief of army engineers general plan for development of the Columbia river and irrigation of lands in the Columbia basin. The plan of the army engineer calls for the construction of ten dams on the river between the Canadian boundary and its mouth.

Present and prospective power developments in the area, the commission held, if successfully used, would change the basic economy of the Pacific northwest from one "primarily concerned with agriculture and the production of other raw materials, to one in which heavy and light industry eventually will play an important if not a leading part."
