

TRANSIENT OUSTER ATTACKED IN SUIT

Mining Man of Hollywood Asks Injunction and \$5,000 Damages.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 19.—(AP)—In a suit attacking validity of the Los Angeles police blockade along the California border, John Langan, Hollywood mining man, petitioned federal court today for an injunction against any attempt to prevent him from entering California from other states.

The petition was filed by John C. Packard, attorney for the American Civil Liberties union, which contends the blockade violates the federal constitution, depriving persons of their liberty without due process of law.

Langan said he was detained by Los Angeles police at Blythe when he attempted to return from Arizona, where he had been three or four days on mining business.

He asked the injunction because he makes frequent trips between California and adjacent states on mining business, he said.

The police verbally abused and threatened Langan, calling him a "punk" and a "twice-gone" and threatening to put him on an Imperial valley chain gang, he said.

Langan declared his detention at Blythe caused him to miss an important business engagement. This, and the fact that he was abused in the presence of a business associate traveling with him, caused him damage of \$5,000, he said, and he will suffer \$3,000 further damage unless Los Angeles Police Chief Davis is enjoined.

He asked judgment for \$5,000 against Davis.

Packard also filed demands today with the city council, comptroller and treasurer that no money be expended on the border patrol. He asked that Chief Davis' salary be held up until he restores to the city money already spent.

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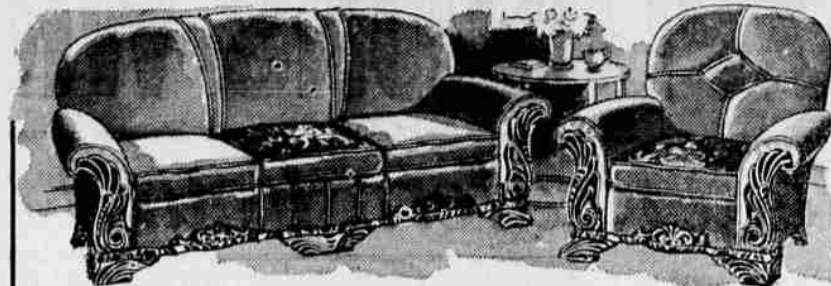

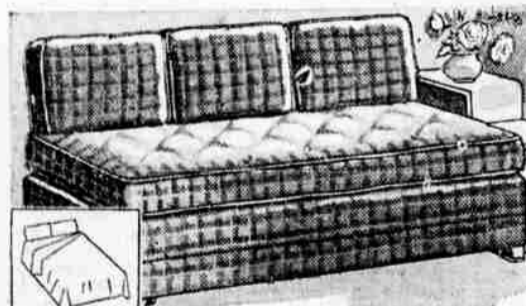

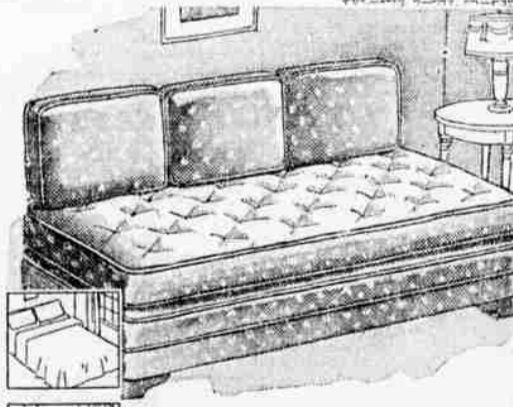
