GAS TAX YIELDS 9 MILLION FOR OREGON

SALEM, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Gasoline taxes paid in Oregon during 1935 would be equivalent to every man, woman and child paying \$9.15 each on the purchase of 153,002,862 gallons or 183 gallons each.

This was revealed today when the secretary of state announced the amount paid by the 51 counties which sold gasoline during the year. The total tax paid was \$9,150,143, and the average based on a population of one million.

The five high selling gasoline companies sold 70 per cent of the gasoline.

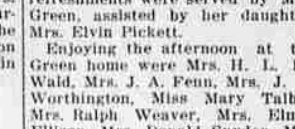
MRS. GREEN HOSTESS TO SUNSHINE CLUB
