## World's Greatest Dam Rises at Grand Coulee

As work progresses on Grand Coulee dam in north central Washington, the largest structure of its kind in the world takes shape, a mass of concrete which will rise to a height of 550 feet above a 500-foot thick base 4,300 feet long over which a cataract of water twice the volume of Niagara Falls will flow to drive the generators to produce power. The lake which will be created by the dam will be 150 miles long and 400 feet deep when the power project is completed.

## MRS. LIGGETT HAS NEW 'INFORMATION'

### Slain Publisher's Widow Told Murder Gun Came From Police Dept.

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Mrs. Walter Liggett today said she was informed by an "underworld character" that the machine gun which killed her publisher-husband "was furnished by the Minneapolis police department."

Chief of Police Frank Forester (termed her statement "a dream.") The chief offered to fire a test bullet from every machine gun in the police department, and send them to the department of justice at Washington to determine whether they are similar to the ones that killed Liggett.

Mrs. Liggett said she gave her information to the authorities several days ago, asserting it came from a St. Paul "underworld character" who has police connections. She said her informant formerly gave information to her husband. Liggett, who published the Midwest American, a weekly, was killed last December 9.

Refusing to divulge her informant's name, Mrs. Liggett said "he sent a message to me recently saying he was afraid to come and see me again because he might be killed."

"He told me the police officers and national guard use five-bullet clips in their machine guns—for economy's sake—while gangsters use 50 and 100-bullet clips."

"There were five slugs pumped into my husband's body. If the killers had a 50-bullet or 100-bullet clip with them they certainly would have killed me, too. But, with the five-bullet clip, they didn't take a chance to reload."

Chief Forester summoned two detectives who supported his contention and explained that police here use 20-bullet clips and 50-bullet drums on machine guns.
