BATTLES FOR LIFE WITH BARED BRAIN

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—(AP)—An egg-sized piece of his skull chipped away, a ten-year-old hit-and-run victim stirred fitfully on his hospital bed today as tiny drops of a life saving solution trickled down on his exposed brain.

Suspended six inches above John Nell's gauze-covered head, a tube, carefully tended by nurses on a 24-hour vigil, fed the drops, a modification of Dakin's solution, to prevent meningitis and death.

Last December 11, John was found unconscious in the street. Mastoiditis developed and to relieve the pressure on his brain,
