

NEW FARM BILL NEARING PASSAGE

fixing of quotas on imports domestic to compete harmfully with domestic farm products.

Dairymen Appeased Lines of a promised fight by the dairy bloc to change the bill materially were modified by Representative Boileau (P. Wis.).

Boileau's substitute proposal, designed to meet constitutional objections, would authorize the secretary of agriculture to "assist the voluntary growing of soil improving or erosion preventing crops for the purpose of soil rebuilding, but not for commercial purposes."

The wind erosion amendment was offered by Jones who estimated several hundred farmers would receive between 25 and 50 cents an acre for listing, Kansas, Colorado, and Texas, with more than 1,000,000 acres subject to dust storms, would receive the largest share of the \$2,000,000.

Assurance that tenants and share croppers shall share equitably in benefits under the temporary and permanent programs was written in through an amendment by Representative Tarver (D. Ga.).

SWOLLEN SACRAMENTO RIVER FURILS BIG AREA

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Rain of cloudburst proportions swelled the Sacramento river today and at Colusa, 125 miles north, the overflow was expected to inundate the entire countryside.

The weather bureau here forecast the approach of another storm with more precipitation.

It was estimated the river, now at 24 feet, will rise to 27 or 28 feet, the danger mark for Colusa, within 36 hours. The stream at Konnett was at 14 feet and rising rapidly.

COPCO INCOME FOR 1935 SHOWING GAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20.—(AP)—California Oregon Power Co. reported rising net income for 1935 today. The preliminary report showed net of \$481,621 compared with \$364,997 in 1934.

Operating revenues were \$4,012,000 compared with \$3,768,848. Earnings were still considerably below requirements to meet preferred stock dividends, which amount to \$413,788 on a regular annual basis. Dividends have been paid at half-scale on the preferred for more than 2 years.

RULINGS ON BANK QUESTIONS MADE

SALEM, Feb. 21.—(AP)—The state banking superintendent has no authority to release securities deposited with a bank except upon the order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

The opinion further held that Oregon statutes contain no provisions whereby cash deposits can be made in lieu of securities at any time. The questions were instigated by the receiver of the First National bank of The Dalles.
