HAUPTMANN FIGHT TO BE CONTINUED

shortly before the kidnapping, March 1, 1932.

The Rev. John Mattiesen of Trenton, Hauptmann's spiritual advisor, last night in New York, quoted the condemned man as saying he believed Dr. John F. (Jafse) Condon testified against him unwillingly under police pressure.

Condon was the intermediary in the futile payment of \$50,000 ransom for return of the infant.

In the New Jersey assembly last night Assemblyman J. Parnell Thomas demanded that Governor Hoffman drop his "will-o'-the-wisp justice," and Assemblyman Charles R. Geddes attacked his alleged neglect of state relief affairs for "an illegally entered alien."

Perjury Charge Urged.

A demand that prosecution officials bring a perjury charge against Hauptmann was made today by C. Lloyd Fisher, chief counsel for Hauptmann.

Fisher in a letter to Prosecutor Hauck said he wished Hauck "would proceed in the White case as you did in the Heier case."

He referred to Benjamin Heier, New York restaurant cashier, a Hauptmann defense witness, who testified in Hunterdon county for perjury at the Flumington trial.

Heier swore he was sitting in an automobile with a young woman the night of April 2, 1932, when the \$50,000 Lindbergh ransom was paid and saw a man jump from the wall of St. Raymond's cemetery. The man, he said, was not Hauptmann.

The state, in rebuttal, produced a witness who said at about the Heier testified he was in the Bronx he was involved in an automobile collision in midtown Manhattan.

Heier's case has not been brought to trial.

Fisher himself is reluctant to sign a complaint against White, who was accused by Governor Hoffman of "lying." White said he saw Hauptmann prowling in the woods near the Lindbergh estate shortly before the kidnapping.

SAYS GOVERNOR IGNORED FOUR IMPORTANT POINTS

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—(AP)—C. Fulton Ousler, magazine editor, expressed the belief today the questioning of the Lindbergh witness Richard White by Gov. Harold G. Hoffman of New Jersey disregarded "four important points" brought out by testimony at the trial of Bruno Richard Hauptmann.

Returning from a trip to Peru, Ousler, who contracted with Dr. John F. Condon, the "Jafse" of the ransom negotiations, for publication of his memoirs, commented he had talked with Dr. Condon in Panama and that the doctor had reemphasized the four points.

Dr. Condon left here several weeks ago for a vacation in Central America.

continuously for more than 24 hours raged in this section of the state today.

Klamath Falls, previously escaping the heavy weather hitting major portions of Oregon, this morning was fighting clear of a ten-inch blanket of snow. A brief, strong wind late last night piled up drifts to the depth of several feet.

All available equipment was working at top speed to maintain communication lanes. Early this morning there were no reports to indicate main highways were closed but plows were having difficulty in keeping the paths cleared.

Many secondary roads, however, were shut indefinitely and residents of the outlying county districts were finding it impossible to get into the city.

Mail service from Alturas, Medford and Lakeview was held up three hours. Trains from the north were on time but rail travel from the south was delayed.

With the snow coming down fast and the wind blowing hard at such high places as Sun mountain on the Dalles-California and the Green Springs route to the valley there was some question how long the roads could be kept open.

All motorists were urged to put on chains.

Minor damage was reported by the telephone and power companies.

Auto accidents were frequent but none was serious.

UPPER ROGUE RIVER AREA AGAIN IN WINTER'S GRIP

MEFORD, Ore., Feb. 25.—Near-winter conditions again prevailed over the central and upper Rogue river valley, following the fall of additional snow on the floor of the valley yesterday afternoon. The snow turned to slush in this city.

Ten inches of snow fell at Prospect on the Crater Lake highway Monday afternoon, and similar falls were reported from other mountain areas.

All southern Oregon roads were open to traffic, with autolists advised to use chains in traversing the Siskiyou.

Portland, Feb. 25.—A south-east storm, brewing at the Columbia river mouth and along the Washington coast, brought storm warnings out again today.

Oregon's weather tonight and tomorrow probably will remain all wet, the weather bureau announced.

Rain or snow was expected in the western part of the state and snow in the east.

OREGON INFLUENZA "MILD" THUS FAR

PORTLAND, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Influenza is widespread in Oregon, but most cases reported are mild so far, Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer, said today.

"No deaths have been reported to us yet from influenza, although deaths from pneumonia are above average," he said. "The pneumonia deaths are not numerous enough to be alarming."

"Cleanliness is the best preventative I know for influenza," Dr. Stricker said. "Wash your hands thoroughly before touching food, and avoid eating at places where utensils are not sterilized."

"Avoid contact with persons the least bit sick, and avoid crowds."

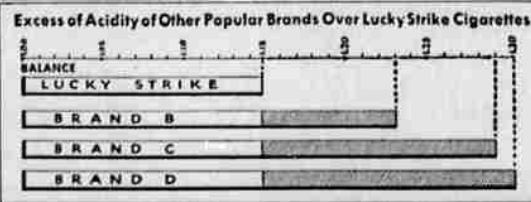
