

## STUNT MARRIAGE REAL, BRIDE SAYS

PORTLAND, Feb. 25. (AP)—The marital misadventures of Phil McIntosh of Laconia, N. H., and Vancouver, Wash., were a closed book today as far as police were concerned.

The former Cecile West of Laconia said today at Boston that her marriage to McIntosh during a walkabout contest was "a matter of love and not publicity."

McIntosh surrendered to police here Sunday, saying he was under the impression his first marriage three years ago was annulled before he took another bride at Vancouver, Wash.

He asked police to help straighten out the tangle and advise him if he was a bigamist. The first marriage, he said, was a publicity stunt.

Municipal Judge Donald E. Long gave him a suspended \$5 fine on an after-hours charge—it was after hours when McIntosh unburdened his perplexed mind to the police.

Police said today they didn't know where McIntosh was, and indicated they didn't care much.

Mrs. McIntosh No. 1 said she was still his wife, but her husband was "the forgotten man" as far as she was concerned.

"He got himself into this trouble. Now let him get himself out," the woman spoke.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Custom tailors urged today that men, like male birds, wear more gorgeous attire.

"If midday can affect reds, blues, old rose and pastel shades, there is no reason for men to appear on the same scene in 10 or 20-year-old evening tails or tuxedos," said the tailors, here for their seventh annual style show today.

"But, before we hope to acquaint men with their inherent right to color—a fact the birds and animals set the precedent for—we hope to have each man, regardless of his station in life, acquire a full and complete wardrobe."

Man's greatest fault is in his choice of accessories, all at the show agree. As a result custom tailors will strive to familiarize men with what should go with what, and when.

Sports clothing is stressed in the show. The one-time favorite Norfolk jacket with belted effect has many variations this season. Many coats lack the belt but have shoulder pleats for fullness and back, hidden, pleats for the man of immense shoulder but lesser waist proportion.

Colors in evening attire especially for hosts' coatings, are startling. One, a hunting red tuxedo with contrasting kammerbund, caused many eyebrows to be raised.

Others are in pastel and deeper shades but with each, it was said, the black or midnight blue dress trousers will be worn.

They are called host coats, the officials said, because it is realized that for the present the departure would be too much for all to digest.

"But if we can get the host wearing them, others will fall in line in turn and eventually more men may burst forth in regal splendor which after all is his inherent right."

### REFORESTATION PLANS ADVANCED

SALEM, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Nearly one million acres of forest lands in Oregon will be classified for reforestation purposes by the end of 1936, the state board of forestry was informed by John W. Ferguson, forester.

The classification of these lands for reforestation also involves a change in the taxation base, to five cents an acre, which Ferguson stated did not materially change the rates. Under the law reforestation lands will carry a flat rate of five cents.
