

OREGON HIGHWAY PROJECTS PERILED

SALEM, Feb. 26.—(Special)—Unless the 1937 regular federal aid road appropriation is made a part of the deficiency bill at this session of congress all major highway improvements in Oregon will come to a standstill this fall, officials of the Oregon Pacific Highway association said today. Results affecting U. S. highway 99 will mean suspension of work on such vital projects as the Skokholm road, Roseburg to Canyonville, Turkey hill-Rice hill, Junction City to Eugene, and Salem south projects, it was pointed out.

Letters were sent out today to every chamber of commerce on highway 99, the association urging that they wire Oregon's congressional delegation pointing out the seriousness of the state highway plight unless pressure can be brought to include this federal aid appropriation in the regular deficiency measure. Associations and officials of the eleven western states, all of whom will be affected, are joining in asking their congressional delegations for action.

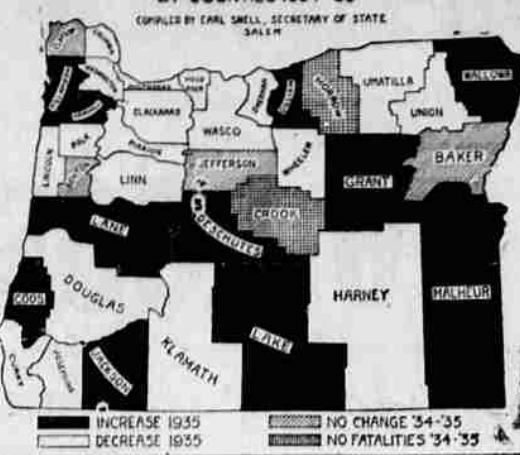

19 Oregon Counties Reduce Auto Deaths

OREGON MOTOR VEHICLE FATALITY CHART BY COUNTIES 1934-35



Nineteen counties of the state were on the right side of the motor vehicle accident ledger at the end of 1935 with decreases in fatalities, reports Earl Spaul, secretary of state. Crook, Curry, Harney, Morrow and Sherman led the list with no deaths from automobile crashes during the year.

Other counties foremost in achieving better records and aiding Oregon in reaching third place on the national honor roll were Columbia, Klamath, Marion, Union and Wasco, all of which showed substantial cuts in fatalities. In contrast, eleven counties showed a greater number of deaths while six counties had unchanged records.

Of the 259 deaths resulting from such causes in the state, 83 occurred in Multnomah county, 59 of which were in the city of Portland. Lane with 19 fatalities, Marion with 17, Clackamas with 16, and Klamath with 14, were next in number of deaths. Of these five counties, all had bettered their 1934 records, with the exception of Lane county, which had one more fatality in 1935 than in the prior year.

In addition to Lane, other counties with increases in deaths were Coos, Deschutes, Gilliam, Grant, Jackson, Lake, Malheur, Tillamook, Wallowa and Yamhill. Counties that showed no change in the number of fatalities were Baker, Benton, Clatsop, Crook, Jefferson and Morrow.

PALMBERG HAS BIG LEAD AS SCORER

SEATTLE, Feb. 26.—(AP)—Bagging ten points against Oregon last week, Wally PalMBERG, Oregon State's chief basket bomber, was 39 counties away from a new northern division Pacific coast conference scoring record today, and had three games left in which to get them.

The Beaver veteran ran his total to 14 points for an average of 11.2 per game, miles ahead of his nearest competitor in the standings. The present northern division scoring mark, set up in 1934 by Bobby Galer of Washington, is 716—an even 11-point average for the 16 games.

L. A. BLACKWELL OF SMITH RIVER DIES

SMITH RIVER, Feb. 27.—Lincoln A. Blackwell, 66, prominent Smith River rancher, died at Keizer hospital in North Bend, Feb. 25, after a three weeks' illness of pneumonia.

He was born in July, 1869, at Carthage, Mo., coming to Oregon with his parents in 1885, the family settling at Gardiner.

In 1896 he married Miss Etta Frater of Roseburg, who, with her three daughters, Miss Eva Blackwell, Mrs. James Hawkins of Corvallis and Mrs. Ira Andrews of Smith River, survive.

Mr. Blackwell also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Fred Wright and Mrs. P. M. Harding of Cottage Grove.

He was a member of the Gardiner L. O. O. F. and Rebekah lodge of Gardiner, the Elks lodge of Roseburg and Smith River branch.

Funeral services were held today at the Reedsport Community church with interment in the Gardiner cemetery. The Smith River school closed today in deference to Mr. Blackwell, who served several years as a member of the high school board of directors.

OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26.—(AP)—Nearly 70 per cent of the 24,000 acres burned over in the Tillamook forest fire of 1933 is in a state of partial or complete natural reforestation, the federal forest service reported. Dead timber was declared to comprise the worst fire hazard in the area.

ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 26.—(AP)—Dean W. S. Schoenfeld of Oregon State college told the Clatsop county agricultural conference that farmers should reduce present mortgages and pay up back taxes "to weather the next depression." He urged maintenance of a fair price level on seed.

THE DALLES, Ore., Feb. 26.—(AP)—Farmers from the southern portions of Wasco and Sherman counties, voiced optimism here that the 1936 wheat crop will be the largest in seven years. Ample moisture was declared available this spring.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 25.—(AP)—The vengeful horns of a four-point buck "gored" Mrs. Elmer Geiger, wife of Police Captain Geiger, in her own kitchen.

She shoved the breakfast table sharply against the kitchen wall, jarring loose the mounted head of the buck. One of the sharp horns gashed her scalp.

Surviving are four sons and daughters, A. H. Thomas, of Tamroy, Virginia; Richard Thomas of Bridge, Oregon, and Mrs. A. T. Weekly and Elmer Thomas of Riddle, Oregon. A brother, Thomas Pinks, of Madison county, Virginia, also survives. Mrs. Thomas' husband preceded her in death.

Funeral services were held in the Baptist church at Riddle this afternoon, Rev. L. G. Hicks officiating. Interment took place in the Riddle cemetery. Arrangements were in charge of the Douglas Funeral home.

U. O. 'FRATS' REJECT FREE BOARD PLAN

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 26.—(AP)—University of Oregon fraternities indicated a general disapproval of the plan calling for pledging and providing room and board to one athlete a year, a checkup of house sentiment showed today.

Only three living organizations took definite votes on the matter at their regular weekly house meetings, and two turned it down. One house accepted the plan as it stood.

Most of the other 14 groups tabbed the suggestion for further discussion, but revealed much negative sentiment.

James Blais, student body president, suggested each fraternity grant a scholarship to help boost the university's athletic program.

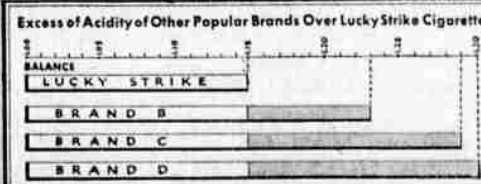
The plan would violate house and pledging rules, many fraternity members said. Several houses, however, expressed willingness to aid through substitute plans or by soliciting outright donations from members.
